

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

White Christmas is Dove-award winning vocalist Lynda Randle's first full-length holiday project in over a decade. In addition to ministering through music, Lynda has written a book of testimonies entitled God on the Mountain. She is creator and host of the popular conference "A Woman after God's Own Heart." Lynda is a regular at Gaither Homecoming events and videos. Her well known song "God on the Mountain" is the most popular video on the GaitherTV YouTube Channel, having over 43 million views. Two songs on this project feature Michael Tait, Lynda's Grammy winning brother. Tait is a founding member of DC Talk and front man for the Newsboys.

The project opens with a sentimental version of "The Christmas Song." You can almost taste the hot chocolate and feel the warmth of a crackling fire.

The title track "White Christmas" is a sweet and smooth classic jazz rendition made even sweeter with Randle's lush vocals prominently mixed in.

"Do You Hear What I Hear?" has touches of Middle Eastern mixed in with an almost mysterious feel. Typically, background vocals are filler, used to cover empty spots and make a song bigger. Not the case with this track. The backing vocals season this arrangement with loads of spice. Definitely one of my favorites from the project.

"Little Drummer Boy" has an almost regal arrangement with plenty of strings. The drums are there, let's face it, they need to be. You can't have a song about a drummer without the drums -- but they're not in your

face. They enhance, rather than rule, the song. The thing that's missing on Randle's version: no bass in the background prum-prum-prumming. All I can say is thank you, Lynda Randle and the production team, for leaving those out.

"Sweet Little Jesus Boy" is a tender but yet powerful song which connects our sufferings to Christ's.

With a noble intro of horns, "O Little Town of Bethlehem" reminds us of the wondrous gift that would be His life, teachings, and sacrifice.

Michael Tait joins Lynda on a jazzed up, toe tappin' rendition of "Go Tell It on The Mountain."

We are reminded of just how lonely and empty Christmas would be without our Savior on "The Loneliest Christmas."

Michael jumps in again and helps Lynda on vocals on the classy jazz styled, old favorite "Winter Wonderland."

Lynda's smokey vocals will warm your heart on "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas."

The project wraps up on the beautiful "Thank You Baby Jesus," written by Lynda and Brandon Divine. It's a song of praise and worship. There's no better way to wrap up this project. It sets the tone for the Christmas season and every day as we go about our busy lives. We all need to take the time to stop and say thank you to the one that set aside His throne. To be born in the humblest of ways for one purpose, to die on a cross for our sins.

Wrap up

Before you look at the track list and roll eyes with that been-there-done-that idea in your head, let me assure you. This isn't your typical, ho-hum, heard-it-all-before Christmas album. I know, I know. Most of the songs are all familiar. I get it. Every year when the Christmas music begins streaming from the radio, I cringe. They're stale and I'm tired of hearing them. They've been recorded by every singer in the free world and done to death, so to speak. After listening to this project, with music and backing vocals tracked by Gaither Studio talent, blended and laid down under Lynda Randle's luxurious vocals, it's like listening to brand new songs. These are the songs that will be playing in my car and in my home for Christmas.

Elvis Presley would introduce him as his "alter ego."

According to Larry Strickland, "It doesn't sound like much but it was thrilling for me. Being a part of his show and getting to experience the energy, sound, and excitement night after night was an amazing, unbelievable time in my life."

Larry had the privilege of traveling with and being a part of more than 200 of Elvis Presley's shows over a four-year period. Through Legacy Larry has found a way to carry on the songs that Elvis loved. The project consists of four songs that Elvis loved and recorded as well as two country songs that Larry loves.

Larry kicks off the project with "Long Black Train," Josh Turner's big hit that makes use of a train to symbolize the temptation of sin. We either make the choice to fall into that sin or resist Satan's temptations. Larry delivers this number in his own distinct style. One of my favorites from this project.

The old standard, "Just a Closer Walk with Thee," is an old school, jazzy country style, loaded with fiddle and swing guitar. Larry's rich voice and smooth style is a perfect fit on this great old song that you'll be singing right along on. It's a simple song with lyrics all Christians should be longing foracloser walk with Him.

The arrangement and style of "Take My Hand Precious Lord" is a throwback to an Elvis Presley gospel song. These songs have been around for a long time. They have been recorded so many times that we fail to listen to the words and get the message out of them. This song is one of encouragement that He's always there, holding our hand and guiding our steps through all the day to day trials and struggles that we face.

If I had to pick the weakest song on this project it would be

"Lord I Hope This Day is Good." Not that it is bad, but to me it feels like it was an after-thought. As with all the other songs on the album, Larry handled it superbly. However, when compared to the other cuts, this one seems out of place to me.

Larry's rich, smooth-as-cream voice delivers on a great old hymn of the church. "In the Garden" urges us to spend time in prayer and open our hearts for Him to speak to us.

This six-song EP closes out with another popular hymn that we all grew up singing, "Love Lifted Me. " This song is all about the love of Christ and how it delivers us. I've heard this song performed and recorded in every possible way. Larry takes it back to the roots in an upbeat, and folksy, mountain gospel arrangement. There's no better way to close out this long-awaited project than a song about His love for us.

Wrap Up

If you were a fan of the gospel songs recorded by Elvis, you will enjoy "Legacy" as much as I did. If you're not familiar with them, what are you waiting for? Give this EP a listen and see for yourself!

Harold and Don Reid, Phil Balsley, and Lew Dewitt, aka the Statler Brothers, taught me how to sing harmony. Their albums were filled with duet lines and verses. I would run to the "open hole" to fill in the 3- or 4-part chord. I owe them a lot.

Recently I was blessed to spend the morning with Don Reid, lead vocalist for the multi-award winning Statler Brothers. We talked about everything: their childhood, the early years (touring with Johnny Cash), the award-winning years, the TV years, their retirement, and finally, the Hall of Fame years. They took Southern Gospel quartet music with them all the way – from day one to retirement.

Don just released The Music of the Statler Brothers, An Anthology. This book gives great detail about every song the Statler Brothers ever recorded, including songs we've never heard before. And, of course many of those songs were Southern Gospel songs. They weren't your everyday type of songs either. If you don't believe me, take a listen to their double album, Holy Bible, Old and New Testament and the songs like "In the Beginning," "Samson," "Beat the Devil," and "The Brave Apostles 12," "There's a Man in Here."

Except for "Beautiful Star of Bethlehem," the best Christmas song I've ever heard is "Who Do You Think," written by Harold and Don Reid. And, you may not know that Harold and Don have written for the Cathedrals, McKameys, Ernie Haase, Kingdom Heirs and more. Speaking of the Cathedrals, this book is full of memories of their special friends, the Cathedral QT.

The Statler Brothers have won nearly 100 major music awards including Grammy Awards, CMA, ACM, AMA, People's Choice, Music City Awards and countless others. They have been inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame as well as the Gospel Music Hall of Fame. They also received the prestigious James D Vaughan Award from the SGMA for their deep contributions to Southern Gospel Music. They recorded Southern Gospel quartet music on nearly every album, recorded multiple Gospel albums and of course, featured Southern Gospel quartet music on their #1 ranked TV show on TNN every Saturday night for 7 years.



Oh, and don't think we didn't talk about Lester "Roadhog" Moran and his Cadillac Cowboys, the Statler's alter-ego. If you can't recite the majority of the WEAK "radio shows," you can't get your "Southern Gospel Membership Card." Ain't that right, Jeff Easter? Roadhog rides on every Southern Gospel bus.

In 1982 Lew DeWitt had to retire from the road due to illness. Enter, Jimmy Fortune. I've been blessed to tour with Jimmy as a member of his band early in his solo career after the retirement of the Statlers. We played his homecoming in Staunton, Virginia, several years ago. I get very nervous when I preach, but I never get nervous singing and picking. Except on this day. Harold, Don and Phil filed in and sat right in front of me and my keyboard for the entire concert. After the concert there was a special gathering for Jimmy, the band and the Statlers. Harold walked up to me and said, "Les, if you were our piano player we may have never retired." Now, I assume he was just being very kind. But, that's just a reflection of how the Statler Brothers conducted themselves on and off the stage. Class acts!

And now, my friend, Don Reid.

Les Butler: I understand that Harold got to read the manuscript prior to his passing.

Don Reid: My greatest dream was that brother Harold

had written this Anthology book with me, but he was not strong enough to have done that in the past couple of years; it was just not meant to be. So, as I wrote each chapter, I took it to him and he read it and gave me his approval. He said, "I remember everything just as you remember. There's nothing I would add or change." That was the stamp I was looking for and needed.

LB: What were your ages in 1959 and were your personal conversations about singing for a living or did you each have other aspirations?

DR: In 1959 I would have been 14 years old and Harold would have been 20. Singing was always our one and only dream. We dreamed of having a Southern Gospel quartet and becoming something near our heroes such as James Blackwood and J.D. Sumner. As it was, these men and all our childhood heroes became our friends and our dreams more than came true. God's blessing.

LB: It sounded like your love for harmony was birthed from hearing the music of the Blackwood Brothers and the Statesmen. Is that a correct assessment? What about their music caught your attention the most?

DR: That is exactly where it came from. We would go to all-night sings and watch Hovie Lister and the Statesmen and James and The Blackwoods and buy all their records and then go home and learn every song, note



for note and word for word. We loved the camaraderie of four men on stage with one mission, and we loved the showmanship and the harmony that just lifted us out of our seats.

LB: Some folks may not know that the Statlers were a part of the monumental recording of "Daddy Sang Bass" with Johnny Cash. How did that come to be?

DR: Carl Perkins and the Statler Brothers were a part of the Johnny Cash touring company and TV in the 60s and 70s. Carl was a great friend, and we were in the room with him backstage one night when he got the idea for this song and wrote it on the spot. We sang along as he put it on paper. We told him we wanted to record it, and he said, "it's all yours." But things took a turn. When John heard it, he immediately grabbed it up not knowing of our interest in it and called us to come do the session with him. So, we were a part of the hit and later we did record a version of our own. No hard



feelings at all over all the mix-up. What a great country/gospel song for the ages.

LB: We gotta talk about The Saturday Morning Radio Show and Alive At The Johnny Mack Brown High School. Where and when was this zaniness born?

DR: This story is covered in my new book, The Music of the Statler Brothers: An Anthology. I explain there that Lester "Roadhog" Moran and his Cadillac Cowboys were born on a flight from New York to Holland one long night in February of 1972. We wrote a nine-minute comedy sketch for our upcoming album, Country Music; Then and Now. It became so popular the label, Mercury, asked for a complete comedy album featuring Lester and the boys. So, the four of us wrote it and performed it, and it was a hit and we were constantly plagued with and begged for appearances of these guys. We did them in costume on a few TV shows and realized we had created monsters we couldn't keep up with. Doing the Lester voice just destroyed Harold's throat so we couldn't do long skits even when we agreed to a performance. But we loved those guys. They were fun!

LB: I want to talk about what I believe is the second greatest Christmas song, "Who Do You Think." How did you and Harold come to write that?

DR: First, thank you very much. We were writing music for our Holy Bible albums and when it came time to write about the birth of the Lord, we wrote this song --not as a Christmas song, but as a history. We followed the scriptures and then after telling such a miraculous story, capped the chorus with the title. Who do you think could believe such a thing, could believe that this story is true? Who do you think could believe such a thing? Well here's hoping to heaven you do.

LB: I love the simple way you chose your songs for recording. Tell the readers about that.

DR: We voted. It was that simple. We listened to a stack of songs, then applied either 1,2,3,or 4 stars to it and then added up the totals. The most a song could get would be 16. Then 15 and on and on. The top rated songs got on the album. So, every man got equal say in what they wanted to record. Could never be a hard feeling with that kind of democracy.

LB: Talk about the transition from Lew DeWitt to Jimmy Fortune. Also mention that last song you recorded



with Lew.

DR: Lew retired for health issues in 1982 and Jimmy came on board. He won us over the first day; the first song we sang together around the piano in Harold's living room. We liked him immediately and loved his singing. He fell right in singing all the hits we had had with Lew singing tenor and never once tried to emulate Lew. He had his own style from day one. Lew had a lilting, crooning thing in his style. Jimmy was a flat out power singing tenor. And he never wavered from that. He walked on the stage that first night in Savannah, Georgia, January 28, 1982, and the fans fell in love with him. And so did Harold and Phil and I. The "transition" was complete with respect for Lew and acceptance for Jimmy. And the Lord smiled on the Statlers again.

Yes, the last song we recorded with Lew was "Life's Railway to Heaven." I promise you we didn't plan it that way. It just happened or I should say the Lord planned it that way because we didn't know at the time. Listen to those lyrics written in 1890 by Baptist minister M.E. Abbey. It's as if he had written them especially for us and our present situation. It was a perfect song to be our last

together.

LB: The Cathedrals recorded "I Believe I'll Live For Him" written by yourself and Harold. Have you had other Southern Gospel artists record your songs? If so, whom?

DR: Off the top of my head, Signature Sound. The McKameys. Booth Brothers. I hate when I start listing folks and can't think of everybody.

LB: You recorded at least one song in your career that got significant airplay in both Country as well as Gospel music. Tell us about Jimmy's songs, "More Than a Name on the Wall."

DR: From the time he wrote it, we sang it every night on stage. It was a big hit for us. So well written and so well received at each concert. It was about a time in my life, personally, that was very emotional for me. I went for my physical during Vietnam and failed and was sent home. But I carried the bodies of a number of friends of mine who weren't sent home. It was a sad time and that Wall is a wonderful memorial. Each night when we



sang it, the audience would stand at the end. They were standing for those soldiers whose names were on that Wall. God bless them, everyone.

LB: The Cathedral Quartet was mentioned several times in your book. Tell us about your relationship with the Cathedrals.

DR: We had known of George Younce and Glen Payne since we were kids and followed their careers from one group to the other. From time to time, we were in their company on TV shows or certain events. We just became easy friends and we would go to their concerts whenever we could. And George would show up at ours just anytime. We recognized they were probably the best quartet of all time and fell in love with everything they did. I tell a George story or two in the book. What a man. I smile just thinking about those two guys.

LB: You mentioned that you had so many memories that tie into the song, "This Ole House." Share some of those memories.

DR: Rosemary Clooney had a monster hit on it when I was a kid. Stuart Hamblin wrote it and we knew him later in life. We sang it on our gospel shows before we went country. Then we recorded it I don't know how many times. It was a favorite of Johnny Cash's dad and he always had us sing it whenever he came to a show. We were still singing it on our final concert in 2002.



Harold and I even wrote a comedy routine around it that we would pull out of the old hat from time to time. It can be country. It can be gospel. It can be pop. Just whatever you want it to be.

LB: Tell us about your TV series that debuted on TNN on Oct 12, 1991.

DR: The Nashville Network offered us a deal we couldn't



refuse. They gave us an hour on Saturday nights and told us we could do anything we wanted. Total freedom. And we did for seven years. Harold and I wrote every show every week starting with a blank piece of paper each week. We did comedy; we did past hits; we had people from every field as guests; we closed every show with a gospel song. It was probably the hardest work I ever did, but it was the most fulfilling work I ever did. It even took a certain toll on me physically but I cherished every moment. And still miss all those wonderful people we worked with.

LB: Your last studio album was recorded in 2002, titled Amen. Why go out with a Gospel only recording?

DR: It's obvious to anyone who knows us that it's just who we are. Our core is Southern Gospel. And a more fitting title was never used. AMEN. It says it all in just one word.

LB: The single song that you devoted the most ink to in your book was, "Hide Thou Me." You had much to say about this song. Please share.

DR: I had a lot to say about this one and I really say it all in the book. But to put it in a nutshell it has been a favorite of mine since I was a preteen. After we retired,

whenever we got together for a Christmas dinner or whatever occasion at one of our houses with our wives, we would invariably end the evening around the piano singing this song. The power and majesty of its melody will just lift you off the ground and then add in the love we had for it and for each other and it closed the evening with tears and good memories every time. It's definitely a closer and I want to use it as a closer for me when that time comes.

LB: Tell us about the first song you sang as a QT, which happened to also be the last song you sang as a quartet.

DR: That first day Jimmy came to Staunton to audition, we sang around the piano. The first song was "Amazing Grace." On our final tour, and you can see it and hear it on our final album, Farewell Concert. We knew we wanted the last one to be that same song. It was and I never felt a lyric and melody so deeply as I did that night; standing those last moments beside my brothers, knowing we would never come this way again. It was special. Those guys were special. Our career was special and I cherish the memory of every moment we spent together.

What a labor of love this was for me. I own every album they ever released and can sing every lyric of every song. What an impact, what gentlemen! If you would like to see a video of my time with Don Reid, please check it out on Facebook at https://www.facebook.com/les.butler.50.

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

Vonda Armstrong: Tell us about your job at WSNL. When did you start? And tell us about a favorite interview.

Donnie Cox: I started playing Southern Gospel music in 1976 and have been music director for Southern Gospel Music at the Christian Broadcasting System. I have hosted Quartet Time for 44.5 years.

To name one particular interview as my favorite would be tough. I have a lot of favorites, including former President Jimmy Carter, Bill Gaither, Governor Jimmy Davis and Cliff Barrows, to name a few.

VA: Share your testimony.

DC: I accepted Christ as my personal Savior when I was eleven years old – at our church revival – on the second verse of "I Surrender All." (I had just been released from prison for stealing the neighbor's bicycle…jk).

VA: In addition to being a radio DJ, tell us about your position at the hospital.


DC: Director of Spiritual Care at a 400 bed facility. After working over 100 days during the pandemic, a memorable story I have would be...During the pandemic, there was an elderly gentleman in the hospital, and during that time there were no visitors or no family allowed in the COVID unit. When the gentleman passed away, only in the presence of myself and a nurse, I had to walk across the street to the parking lot where his wife of nearly 70 years and the family were waiting. I had to share with them that he had passed away. This is one of the saddest experiences I've ever had.



VA: Tell us about your family.

DC: I am married to Judy who has co-hosted Quartet Time with me for 20 years. We have four children and five grandchildren.

VA: Share some bucket list things you would love to do in the future and why.

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

TURN TO THE CROSS

Have CA Blessed Thanksgiving



The Great Depression ran from 1929 to 1933. All of America was in need, and together, people held fast to their faith and to music during this trying time in history.

In the East Texas town of Paris, Charles Johnson was born in 1931 in the middle of it all. In his time Charles Johnson would affect Black Gospel music and later impact Southern Gospel music with his unique delivery and energy. All Charles Johnson wanted to do was sing.

In those depression years, radio was taking root in the homes of all Americans. That trend continued through WWII and into the 1950's. Homes were filled with music, preaching, radio sitcoms and live programming as the broadcast norm. Yet in local communities, the church was a priority to American families of all ethnicities and regions.

If the doors were open, people were in church. Church singings were common place. Choirs sang hymns with an occasional radio quartet or church group in the mix. Like many artists from this era, Johnson's musical background was singing in church with his family. As the story goes, "all he wanted to do was sing."

In the late '40s as a teenager, he was working on several ranches in Texas and singing on the weekends with friends. In the 50's he moved to California to work and sing. Charles Johnson was a guitarist and songwriter, but all he ever wanted to do was sing. He stayed in California singing regionally until joining the Sensational Nightingales.

The Sensational Nightingale were a superb gospel ensemble that had been active since the Second World War. Upon joining the Sensational Nightingales in 1961, Johnson became



their lead singer. The group embarked on a series of domestic and international tours while regularly recording music singles for labels such as Malaco. He established himself as one of the leading singers and songwriters of the time in Black Gospel.

During his twenty-three-year history with the Nightingales, Johnson's ever popular song, "It's Gonna Rain" remained on the Billboard charts for 100 weeks, while the same titled album sold over one million copies. According to Billboard Magazine, during the 1970s, the Nightingales placed three albums in Billboard's Top 10 albums chart at the same time. In late 1983, Charles Johnson left the Nightingales to spread his music in different areas and with a different flare. Shortly thereafter, in 1984, Johnson joined with brothers Darrell and Ricky Luster, forming Charles Johnson and the Revivers. Without a bus, a sound system, or scheduled concerts, Charles Johnson and the Revivers completed a final project on his Malaco Records contract entitled No Man Can Stand Alone.

With their unique harmonies and by staging a successful merger of Black, Country and Southern Gospel music, Charles Johnson and the Revivers became one of the top performing artists of the late 80s and through the 90s. Known for their guitars, their live projects provided added



intensity with drums, keyboards and other fill instruments. On stage, they shared a driving energy as well as happy songs that enticed audience participation.

One Night Revival featured mega songs "I Can't Even Walk" and "Sealed to the Day of Redemption" with crowd favorite "Going On With My Jesus."

Their next major LIVE project Let's Have Church recorded in Albemarle, North Carolina, became a classic in southern gospel music. From the title cut to "Jesus is With Me, Until Then" and "Going to the Meeting," each song captivated gospel music fans. The exuberant audience participation was captured on the DVD and audio recordings.

The Singing Americans were recording a live project that night as well. Then SA bass singer Larry Stewart (currently with Pine Ridge Boys) says, "They really sang the house down. People loved them and their songs. Charles and the group were great people. I do remember another time, when their bus broke down. We stopped and carried them onto their destination. Even when things were messed up with their bus, he was fun to be around. We really enjoyed being around them. He was always a gentleman and treated people well."

The first set of Revivers were gone by 1994, replaced by Gary Miles, Melvin Wilson and Greg Logins. In 1995, the Revivers experienced more changes as Michael Watts, Tracy Pierce took the stage with Johnson. In later times other Reviver members included Joe Yancey, Steve Boyd and Maurice Morgan.

Charles Johnson and the Revivers worked tirelessly and cultivated a radio audience that flocked to churches, concert halls and other venues for their concerts. Quickly they became a regular at many venues. Pastors and promoters booked them knowing the audience would be broadened. They regularly worked the Hallelujah Supper Club with standing room only concerts. The dinner club consistently booked the group four times annually due to audience demand.

Their multiple radio hits included "Signed 'Til the Day of Redemption", "I Believe He Died for Me", "We Cannot Stand Alone", and their signature song, "I Can't Even Walk Without You Holding My Hand."

The group was in regular rotation at radio stations that programmed southern gospel music. Local and regional gospel music television programs clamored for their videos and inperson appearances as people wanted more of this dynamic group.

With Johnson's devout faith and steadfastness, he honed his music to reach people of all walks of life. To this day, their music is in demand for download purchases and on YouTube channels.

In 2005, Johnson published his autobiography titled Another River to Cross. The book is a firsthand account of how a young black boy struggling in the cotton fields of Texas pursues his passionate love of music. How can he make his God-given dream come true in the face of racial hatred and discrimination?



This book is a slice of history straight from the hearts of those who lived it. It is a story of hope and love that proves that no matter how humble the beginnings and how terrible the oppression, God can cause the best to grow out of it all.

The answer is, as his Granny always said to a young Charles, "Now listen to me, child. Stead of complaining that roses get thorns, be glad that thorns got roses."

Charles Johnson passed away on October 6, 2014, following a period of declining health. His death, though a celebration of a

life well lived, created a void in gospel music. There has not been one group to come along with that driving energy that could deliver a song in the same manner as Charles Johnson and the Revivers.

But you could just tell "All he wanted to do was sing!"





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

Fans will remember Kevin Sorbo as Hercules in the popular television series Hercules: The Legendary Journeys. This hit show gained a cult following around the globe and ran for six seasons from 1995 to 1999. It became one of the highest rated syndicated TV programs airing in 176 countries.


In 1997, a beautiful young woman named Sam Jenkins guest starred in the series opposite Kevin as his love interest. There was an immediate connection, and it didn't take long for the couple to realize this was a match made in heaven. After a whirlwind courtship, the two were engaged.

While they were making plans for their upcoming wedding, an unexpected aneurysm and three strokes left Kevin incapacitated and in critical condition. This easily could have been the end of his story, but God wasn't finished with him. With Sam's support, a lot of prayer, and medical intervention, he survived. Kevin remembers, "It wasn't easy. It took three years, but I eventually recovered."

A New Kind of Battle

In Hercules, Kevin was busy fighting evil warlords, defeating enemies, and slaying dragons. He may have retired his leather pants, chamois vest, and demigod role, but he is now engaged in a new battle—a fight for America to return to its Judeo-Christian roots. These days he's slaying dragons of a different kind, and you will find his wife fighting on the frontlines right beside him. Together they courageously share their faith and conservative views on and off screen.

It is no secret a biblical worldview can be hazardous to an actor's career in Hollywood, but the couple refuses to be intimidated, bullied, or silenced by the entertainment industry's extreme leftist agenda. Kevin experienced firsthand how the big studios blacklist Christians. He shares, "Around 2010, Hollywood stopped knocking on my door, but God opened another door. Sam and I were invited to a barbeque at Amanda and Dallas Jenkins' home. Dallas is a film director and the son of Jerry Jenkins, the author of the Left Behind book series. Dal-



las shared about a film project he was working on called What If and asked if I would read the script and give him my thoughts about it. I loved the script and told him I wanted to play the part of Pastor Ben. He laughed and said he couldn't afford me. I shot back, 'Try me.'"

Bringing Hope and Healing through Family Oriented Films

A few months later, Kevin starred in his first faith-based film. It was like an epiphany for him. He realized his role had power to bring hope and healing to a broken world

Even though What If garnered Kevin a Movieguide award for "Most Inspired Performance," Hollywood still snubbed him. Kevin continues, "Let's face it. Hollywood is running the culture right now. They continue to put out movies full of sex, hate, and violence. My wife and I want to change that and offer more family-friendly films with good values." Hollywood's loss is the American family's gain. In the past twelve years Kevin has shot more than fifty films—and more than half of those are family oriented.

The couple is so committed to wholesome movies, they built and opened their own studio. Kevin explains, "My wife and I built Sorbo Family Film Studio. We are creating films that deliver inspiration and promote morals. Hollywood is great at making big budget movies, but we work with a lower budget and need people to show up and support them. People tell me they want more movies like this. We don't have a big budget to promote them, so we need people to help us get the word out. We also need people to invest in making these kind of movies."

Kevin's words on September 25 at THE RETURN: National and Global Day of Prayer and Repentance show the depth of his conviction. "We need more principled filmmakers and storytellers who can weave moral fabric back into our culture. We need to compete in the marketplace of influence in a positive way and shout Truth from the mountaintops."

The couple stood shoulder-to-shoulder and led the massive crowd at the event in a prayer of repentance. Sam prayed, "Heavenly Father, grant us the strength to resist temptation and vanquish pornography in all parts of the culture. Lord, we pray with fervent hearts for Your forgiveness of our sins against the family, for our breaking the covenant of marriage, and our unfaithfulness to each other and to You."

Acting Is a Family Affair

The Sorbos have been blessed with three children: Braedon, 19; Shane, 16; and Octavia, 14. In 2017, act-



ing became a family affair when their two sons, Braedon and Shane, joined them in Let There Be Light, a film Sam co-wrote, produced and co-starred in. Kevin was the director and Sean Hannity was the executive producer. Let There Be Light became the fourth highest grossing faith-based film of 2017.

A Look at What Is Coming

These days, Kevin is busy promoting the release of a feature-length documentary about the life, work, and mission of the renowned University of Oxford professor, mathematician, and philosopher Dr. John Lennox. Against the Tide: Finding God in an Age of Science will be showing in more than 600 theaters nationwide for one night only through Fathom Events on November 19



Dr. Lennox and Kevin traveled together experiencing firsthand many of the sites that are key to fully understanding the false choice between science and faith. Kevin says, "We spent three weeks in Oxford and two weeks in Israel, which was unbelievable. I am proud of this documentary and I hope people go check it out."


The film shares Dr. Lennox's life-long passion to present compelling evidence that science and history not only align with Scripture but also support the biblical narrative. Dr. Lennox breaks down the arguments and issues most often cited in apologetics debates, reflecting on the several very public, sold-out encounters he has had with well-known atheists Richard Dawkins, Christopher Hitchens, Peter Singer, and Michael Shermer, among others. Steven Huff, the executive producer of the documentary, says, "Now, more than ever, there are powerful voices portraying science and Christian-

ity as fundamentally incompatible. Dr. Lennox is one of today's leading academic voices dispelling this false choice and standing strong against the tide of misinformation and confusion."

Kevin is also excited about a second film, Faith Under Fire, set to release in multiple formats. The film will debut in theaters on November 27, 2020, then release on DVD and through streaming formats beginning December 1. The faith-based film features Kevin, Dean Cain (Lois and Clark), and Nick Vlassopoulos (Detroit).

"Joel Reisig directed the movie, and we are really proud of it," Kevin says. "The movie deals with a fireman named Tom Hatcher. He loses his wife to cancer and then his daughter gets sick. I play a doctor in the movie, and it's just another really great story about finding your own faith."

The Sorbos are convinced that we need more stories of inspiration and hope on the big screen now more than ever. In these unprecedented times, people need to be reminded that God is in control and has not forgotten them. The underlying theme throughout Faith Under Fire is this: faith has and always will shine brightest in the fire.





According to Kevin, "COVID-19 shut down movie theaters and delayed the release of three new movies: One Nation Under God, Miracle in East Texas, and The Mustard Seed."

One Nation Under God explores the fight to put that phrase back in the Pledge of Allegiance in schools, first amendment rights, and personal convictions. The Mustard Seed is a film about a little girl "who can perform miracles," and Miracle in East Texas, is a comedy based on the true story of two conmen and the world's biggest oil strike.



Taking A Closer Look



Many of us have heard our parents and grandparents talk about the Great Depression. Our grandchildren will be hearing about the 2020 pandemic known as Covid-19. One thing we know for sure about both is that there was Southern Gospel music then and there is Southern Gospel music now. Many groups have been affected by the virus but most seem to be coming out of it and are getting back on the road. Some have had changes during this time and Avenue is one of those groups.

They started with a desire to help other ministries. Owner/ Manager Kasey Kemp states, "Our goal was to partner with local ministries in different cities to minister from the stage, but also raise money for that local ministry. Obviously we do other concerts but that is what this ministry started for, and we are working towards that goal." During this crisis, Kemp has seen a change in the group with two new members: Daniel Rivera singing tenor and Kyle Smith now singing lead. Kasey Kemp, singing with his mom and dad while growing up, learned the value of gospel music and the church. He states, "I was blessed to be born in a Christian home. My dad led me to Christ when I was seven years old. I was also raised in a musical home and my parents afforded me music lessons, for which I'm grateful. I started singing in a quartet when I was 14 and have never stopped singing gospel music. God has blessed me to do this full time since I was 23 and blessed me with a family that supports this call." Over the course of his career, Kemp has seen how God has directed his path. He had his own group at home called Eastern Sky and then joined Naomi and the Segos for seven years before a brief stint with the Toney Brothers. Upon leaving the Toney Brothers, he helped form Declaration who later changed their name to Allegiance. During this time they toured with the Booth Brothers. You can also find the Kemps

singing for church services as a family with their two chil-

dren, daughter Avaline Jewel and son Autry Clark. Two men in particular have been a big influence on Kemp. "Danny Funderburk took an interest in me as a 14 young man," Kemp recalls, "and always encouraged me spiritually and musically. He's still a dear friend to me this day. I'm grateful for his friendship. Steve Hurst is my Pastor and our groups vocal coach. He also serves as a spiritual mentor." The group's tenor, Daniel Rivera, also has a legacy in music.






Rivera grew up singing with his family in church. Both of his parents can sing, and his dad was minister of music when he and his mother married. Daniel said, "I got started singing as a teenager in a local Christian bookstore in our area, and we had several groups come sing at the bookstore where I would open for them. One of the groups asked me to join in with them on a song, and I would later go on to eventually







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join that group." That led him down a path singing with The Hallmark Quartet, Blackwood Legacy, Promise, Woodsmen Quartet and Third Row Boys.

When asked about who had influenced him most, Rivera stated, "Believe it or not, on a personal basis, Pat Barker. I was singing with Promise and we did a concert with the Mark Trammell Quartet and I was looking at their CD's and told Pat I'd love to have their performance tracks. He ended up really encouraging me as a young artist and giving me those tracks free. I'll never forget that. He has been a huge encouragement to me over the years. Vocally, David Phelps and West Hampton."

Closing Daniel said, "I was raised in a Christian home but I ended up getting involved in drugs and alcohol at a young teenage age. I was so involved that it started to ruin my life. God got a hold of me one night as I almost took my life, God saved me and changed my life and I'll never be the same. I'm so thankful to sing for Him and serve Him. He is so good to me." Born in Hammond, Indiana, Rivera now resides in Shelby, North Carolina, with his wife Ashlee and two daughters Braelynn and Briella.

Kyle Smith is the youngest member in the group. He started singing at the age of 15 when he was in high school at Columbia Academy in Columbia. He said, "They had a great music department and I was very fortunate to have great teachers. After high school, I received scholarships to sing at

Jones County Junior College. I departed from there after one year to go sing at Peral River Community College." Growing up, Kyle was not a big music fan most of his time was consumed with sports and friends. He put music last after baseball and basketball.

Smith stated, "What's funny is no one in my family sings or plays. Julie and Cedric Smith are my parents and I have four siblings: Ashley, Cassady, Caden and Taylor." His family, including his grandparents Betty and Wayne Smith, Tony and Beneaka Fraham and also Uncle Casey, are among his biggest supporters. In 2012 his grandmother talked him into singing "The Cross Makes The Difference" in church for his first time during revival, and he never looked back.

"He doesn't know this but Bill Shivers is my favorite artist, I try my best to mimic his tone and stage presence. Steve Hurst is one of my dearest friends. I attended his school last year. Through that, Steve and Kasey contacted me, and I'm grateful for them both," Smith said. He then became a part of Avenue.

He remarked, "Growing up, everyone has their own challenges. Coming from a split home did not make life difficult for me, just different. I love my family very much. I'm thankful for them and the people around me who helped me get through my struggles as a teenager and early adulthood. The most influential in my life is my papa, Tony Graham. He always taught me to do my best and work hard. Jesus Christ has not only changed my life, but He has become my


best friend. I'm so thankful He died on the cross so that we all can have eternal life. He is more real to me than you are. He didn't come to condemn, He came to save. He loves you. I'm going to do my best to let the world know that through Avenue."

Keith and Misti Sammons are not your average newlywed couple.

Although their love story would make a great movie on the Hallmark Channel, it's more than that. Both having to endure loss from previous spouses, God had a plan for both of them that even they couldn't have seen coming.

Their admiration and love for the Lord is contagious, and little did I know that their story would be helping me through the unexpected loss of my father just days ago. They both have been able to take two tragic life events and turn them into not one, but three, beautiful ministries to help and encourage people like you and me in times of trial and grief.

Having both grown up in loving Christian homes, Keith and Misti met and married their spouses pretty early in life.

Misti was married to Scott, an adventurous man of many skills and talents always willing to take on new things. He was a football coach, a bus driver, and a music pastor. He went from being a manager of a company, to owning his own bus company, and then becoming a pilot.

Misti was married 10 years before losing her husband in a plane crash. At the young age of 31, she became a widow and was unsure how she would be able to move on. She would go from feeling complete strength from the Lord, to turning to alcohol to drown the pain.

After one night of drinking to the point of alcohol poisoning, she told the Lord she had enough. She begged for healing and He instructed her to go on a 3 day fast. Once those 3 days were up, God told her, "The plan of the enemy has been thwarted." Misti, a little confused as this is not normally something she would say, said it out loud. "The plan of the enemy has been thwarted!" From the moment those words left her mouth, she felt the healing of the Lord.

When asking Him what had happened to her and why, He made it clear to her. The Sunday after Scott passed, the Lord told Misti to dance and shout before him at church. This not being in Misti's character made her a little hesitant, but she obeyed the Lord and did what He said. This was the moment He healed her. It just took



her some time to realize that. From that moment of realization, Misti has not grieved or cried over Scott once. Since then, her focus has been to help others through grief. God then instructed Misti to go to Seminary and she now teaches Bible at a seminary level.

Sandi, Keith's wife, was a wonderful Christian woman who became a mother to their son Parker and supported her husband wherever he went. She was also a lover of shoes, which if you are a woman reading this, I know that you can relate.

Keith and Sandi were married for 26 wonderful years with a son named Parker before they got the news that would change their lives forever.

While both were at their annual physical appointments, it was made known that Sandi had spots on her lungs and liver. She was later diagnosed with stage 4 Adenoma Carcinoma colon cancer that had spread to her lungs and liver. Genetically, this was the rarest form of cancer one could have.

Two months into treatment, Sandi had her shoes propped up and she was taking a picture of them. When asked by Keith what she was doing, she said she was going to make a post on Facebook. She called them her "happy shoes of the day." She wrote about the color, texture, and the inspiration behind them. People loved it so much they started sending her shoes, and she would write about a different pair every time she went into treatment.

After Sandi did this several times, Keith thought, "I wonder if there is a way that we could put these posts into little booklets to give to other cancer patients to encourage them and give them hope." The doctor said "Absolutely," and this was the start of their ministry, "Happy Shoes."

Twenty months and two days later, Sandi went to be with the Lord. Her lungs filled with cancer and there was nothing more they could do. Keith and Sandi were married a total of 28 years. Parker was a junior in college, and he and Keith were left with life to move on. After she passed, Keith was left with a choice. Was he going to wallow in his grief or was he going to make the choice to get up every morning and live life? There were some days where he would cry and scream in his house, but his journey to healing began from day one.

Strength became a gradual process that came from trusting in the Lord and knowing that He is always good, even in those toughest moments.

In December of 2018, Keith was sitting in church one Sunday when he noticed a woman sitting two seats down from him. Someone in church that day had told Keith that he needed to check her out because she wasn't wearing a ring. If you haven't figured it out already, it was Misti.

Keith did a little digging and found out who her brother was who also happened to be the HR manager of the church. He called him and asked about her and was told it probably wasn't the best idea being that she had just gotten out of an on and off again six-year relationship. For the next 3 months, Misti played a game of "Dodge Keith."

Finally, after 3 months, Keith and Misti had their first conversation at church that lasted 15 minutes. Keith walked her out to her car, and as he was walking, he heard the voice of the Lord say, "She is going to be your wife." They went out to dinner on a date that Saturday night.

The next Monday they were having a guest speaker at church and when Keith walked in, a woman stopped him. She had no idea that he and Misti had been on a date. She first asked him how he was and then said, "I need to tell you something. You see that girl up there? God told me that she is going to be your wife!" Keith said, "He told me that too!"



From that moment, they began the process of dating. Keith ended up taking Misti to a Happy Shoes packing. At this point, it had become so much bigger than just the booklets. They had a sponsor for totes by Thirty-One Gifts. Food City came on board financially and donated a beautiful throw for the patients. Keith has a music CD out that he puts in the totes himself. Vendors donate snacks for the totes along with gum, mints, and puzzle books.

And a voucher for shoes – which was the start of the entire ministry.

A sponsor has enabled them to put a voucher in the totes for a pair of shoes. The patients are able to go then online and enter their code number which tells them what hospital they are coming from and put in their name, address, and shoe size. Volunteers from the area are then able to deliver the shoes personally and see if there are any other needs.

When Misti left that night after packing for Happy Shoes she realized she loved Keith. After much prayer,



she knew he was the one that God had for her. They dated for 2 months, got engaged, and 2 months later they were married.

They have just received their

third grant for Happy Shoes, and the Lord has provided to where they are able to do this ministry full time. Last year, they were able to give away 600 totes, and this year, they have the potential of giving away 6,000 totes! Their ministry focus is "to inspire cancer patients to keep walking."

Shortly after getting married, God led them both to start a ministry where they could take their tragic stories and turn it into a beautiful journey. And so it was that Beautiful Ashes was founded.



Their focus is "to equip people who are grieving with the keys to living life after death." Speaking in churches, small groups, funeral homes, zoom calls, the couple go wherever the Lord leads them to be able to shine a light to those in a time of darkness.

What a beautiful reminder through Keith and Misti's story, that God can take the most broken people and use them in such a mighty way. I hope you all are touched as much as I have been and take away that God is always good, and He will do the caring for you if you let Him.

The team of Fortune/Walker/Rogers/Isaacs has collaborated to produce the new album entitled Brotherly Love for Gaither Music Group.

Jimmy Fortune, formerly of the Statler Brothers and Ben Isaacs of the Issacs are no strangers to gospel and country music fans. Mike Rogers and Bradley Walker may not be as instantly recognizable, but their talent on the album is.

Bradley Walker's first solo project with Gaither Music in 2016 was titled Call Me Old-Fashioned. The project came about after Gaither heard Walker sing at the memorial service of Joey Feek. He contacted Walker afterward and Walker was brought into the Gaither music recording family.

"It's been such an honor being a part of the Gaither music family. They have really created a home for their artists," Walker stated.

Ben Issacs and Mike Rogers had worked together on projects in the past, and Jimmy Fortune had also been recording for Gaither Music. Issacs approached Walker with the idea for the Brotherly Love recording, and the quartet was created from those talks.

The guys all gathered at Issacs house and started talking about songs they loved. They came up with a working list of what they wanted on the album. Walker and Fortune both have strong country influences and that has resonated throughout the album.

The album kicks off with the project's title cut "Brotherly Love." Mike Rogers takes the lead, and this Keith Whitley tune is brought back with a fresh arrangement.

"It's important to me to do songs about real life and struggles we all face," Walker said. "I want to reach as

many people as possible regardless of any genre but christian lyrics have always been a part of country music."

With Fortune's involvement in the group, a Statler Brothers hit song was in order so the group added the fan favorite "Class of '57" to the album.

The group reaches back to their Southern Gospel influences on the Ronnie Hinson penned "The Lighthouse."

Songs on the album like "The Lighthouse" reflect Walker's desire to be remembered as a follower of Christ. "I want to be remembered as someone who loved the Lord. Was honest. Loved people and someone you could depend on," Walker stated.

Another highlight of the album is the 1955 Statesmen quartet classic "Where No One Stands Alone" penned by Mosie Lister.

Jimmy Fortune stands out on the Vince Gill tune "Go Rest High On That Mountain."

Other notable songs on the project include the Don Williams tune "Lord, I Hope This Day Is Good." Ben Issacs adds his smooth vocals to the lead on this one. Fortune adds another soaring tenor lead on the Roy Orbinson hit song "Crying" while the rest of the quartet adds tight harmonies.

The Eagles tune "Love Will Keep Us Alive" is also covered on the album.


Fans of country, bluegrass and christian music have taken to

"I hope to touch as many lives as possible. I think about something Doyle Lawson said to me; he said the music we make will last long after we are gone. Hopefully it will continue to touch lives," Walker said.

With a solid effort like Brotherly Love, the group is well on its way to achieving that goal.











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





"I hadn't even thought that could happen. It wasn't even in my mind that they would pull books. And I began to do more research and realized a lot of the books-- they were waiting, just like movies. And it's like, parts of your life where you just never saw that coming." The line crackled as Karen Kingsbury spoke about Someone Like You, her first novel of 2020, published amidst the worldwide pandemic. "And it reminded me again that God is in control, and what we have today is not a guarantee in any way. Not your book deals, not your future. So what better time than now to lean hard into Jesus and to let him carry you from here to what's next?"

For her, the next thing Jesus carried her to is the release of Truly, Madly, Deeply. After a full day of interviews, Karen was kind enough to hop on the phone and speak to SGN Scoops about her upcoming release, a standalone novel in the Baxter Series focusing on Tommy Baxter, now a senior in high-school.

The novel centers around loss, love, fear, and hope regarding illnesses and the ever-present shadow of 9/11. Reflecting on that disaster from current adversity, she mused that people drew together during the dark days in '01, even when things felt hopeless. Revisiting that theme in her current novel, it now has taken on a whole new meaning. "I wrote it [Truly, Madly, Deeply] when fear wasn't a part of our daily life. And I think only the Lord could give me a story that was so clearly an answer to fear," Karen said. "So I feel like that's [her novel] going to be a message of hope to people who need to be

reminded that God walks through these things with us and he wants to take us from a place of fear to a place of





faith."

When asked about Tommy's choice to join the police force and the current state of affairs in the USA regarding the boys in blue, a smile beamed through the phone. "I honestly feel so honored that the Lord would so kindly let me be the one who would have a story that takes us right into the world of police-work and the reality of the sacrifices that they make every single day." Having come from a family who is either active in the police-force or has considered it, Karen understands the troubles policemen face. "It's kind of amazing that I would have written this story at a time where there was no controversy surrounding our officers and now there is and this book takes us right into their world and lets us see just what kind of things they face every day." Aside from penning her novels, Karen has spent the pandemic running You Were Seen, a new nonprofit launched in June dedicated to reaching one person at a time. The nonprofit sells You Were Seen cards on their website and the buyers can hand them out to anyone they wish to, a barista, police-officer, etc. The card then

points the receiver to the You Were Seen website where it tells them about the One who has seen them all along: Jesus. "It's a message of hope to people one by one," she commented, hope brimming her tone. "If the virus can come into this land from one person, so could the love of Christ."

Hope seems to have encompassed Karen's life in 2020, and that is the word she would use to describe her year, despite the stresses and fears of the pandemic. "I believe that through it all, there are good things that have come from 2020. I don't want to just write it off and throw it away. I want to walk away with lessons learned and believe that there is still yet much more ahead." For Ms. Kingsbury, there is much more ahead in the foreseeable future. Her Baxter series was acquired for television and has a total of three seasons filmed, has just wrapped up writing a novel centered on drug and sex trafficking titled A Distant Shore, and is just at the edge of broaching a new horizon: film.
