Tom's Picks for THE Movie & TV Show of "HIS" 2010

Kelly asked us to do a "Best of" list from 2010—in my case, for TV and film. Unfortunately, I often don't get a chance to see many shows and movies until after the calendar year is over, so I can't provide a comprehensive list. However, I can certainly think of the most interesting things I have seen this past year.

Best Film: Inception. How refreshing to have a big-budget blockbuster that's not just a rehash or sequel, but rather an incredibly innovative story. And the fact that it was such a huge hit shows that there is an audience for such films, despite what Hollywood would believe.

In the world of this movie, people can invade one another's dreams to get access to information guarded by one's subconscious: bank codes, company secrets, etc. Leonardo DiCaprio plays a man whose job is to prevent such interference from happening. I won't say more than that, because watching the plot unspool is the chief joy of the film.

Most movies seem to come from filmmakers who assume that the audience is stupid, and so dumb down the content as much as possible. Inception is the opposite. Christopher Nolan (the writer and director) throws the audience in the deep end of the pool, and then dares us to keep up. There's enough creativity and invention in this film for three movies. Finally, just when the last piece seems to have fallen into place, Nolan gives us a final shot that will be the subject of debate regarding its meaning for years to come.

Ordinarily, I don't talk about the visuals in a movie because I think effects are irrelevant in comparison

to a good story. The difference between *Avatar* and *Up* is that *Up* would still be a great movie on a tiny black-and-white TV. However, *Inception* doesn't just have great effects. It presents an incredible and unique world inside the dreams, with mind-blowing visuals much like *The*

Matrix with its backwards-bending heroes. This film has changed the way I think about what's possible with visuals in a movie.

Is there a profoundly Christian story here? Not that I can think of, but there's nothing un-Christian that I can think of either. There is a subplot dealing with DiCaprio's emotional struggle regarding his departed wife that can be seen as a cautionary tale about trying to manipulate the ones we love. One other character has a subplot involving his father, and when that storyline reaches its emotional climax, one is inclined to see it as ringing completely false, since we know how that character has also been manipulated in order to have that epiphany. But perhaps the falseness of it is the point; maybe Nolan is saying that we shouldn't accept everything labeled a "happy ending" just because Hollywood says it's so.

Inception is a great gift to audiences starving for an intelligent yet entertaining movie. It's the best film I've seen in a decade.

Best TV Show: The best TV show I finished




this year is actually a show that completed its run over a year ago. It took me a while to finish the re-imagined **Battlestar Galactica**, but I'm glad that I finally did. (More on the "why" in a minute.) As with the original series from 1978 by producer Glen Larson (Knight Rider, Magnum P.I.), the

story starts with a group of humans fleeing from their home planet, Caprica, after killer robots called the Cylons attack and destroy their world. But there the similarities end. While the original *Galactica* was a

cheesy *Star Wars* knockoff, the new *Galactica* by Ron Moore (*Star Trek: The Next Generation, The X-Files*) is a deep and profound series about the vagaries of war and the often terrible decisions that even heroic characters must make during wartime.

While the original Cylons looked





like low-rent Stormtroopers, the new Cylons look just like humans, and so can blend in to a crowd and attack at any time. Some don't even know they're Cylons; they're sleeper agents who can be activated and made to do things beyond their will. Soon, friends and lovers turn on

each other over false suspicions; others begin to doubt their

own identi-

ties; still

others are shocked to find out the truth about their own origins.

Intriguingly, the crux of the conflict between the races is religious in nature, even though one of the races is mechanical. The humans have a polytheistic belief in the gods of our world's Greek and Roman mythology (like the characters of the original). In contrast, Cylons believe in One True God that rejected the humans and blessed the machines. There are elements of Judeo-Christianity in both sets of beliefs, which left me as a viewer in the interesting position of not taking a side.

In fact, even though the Cylons clearly remind viewers of modern-day terrorists, the makers of the show often seem to sympathize with them and to point out as many chinks in the armor of the "heroes" as possible. However, ultimately the writers seem to take the stance that both sides have made grievous mistakes, and both sides need forgiveness and redemption.

The first season was difficult to get through, as Gaius Baltar (basically the Judas Iscariot of the human race) and a sexy female Cylon do all kinds of steamy things to each other in each episode. Their scenes together came off as nothing more than cheap titillation, as though the show producers felt they were trying to compete with late-night Skinemax. After Season 1, though, the sexual content of the show cools down a bit.

Also worth noting is that the show has a lot of

profanity, though most of it is made-up intergalactic swearing. The characters use these by-words frequently; don't say you weren't warned.

The show is often unremittingly dark and cynical, with horrible things happening to characters that the audience cares deeply about. Between the sexuality, the language, and the very dark storylines, I wanted to give up on the show altogether more than once. But having seen the finale, I now know that the major themes of the show are these:

There is a meaning and an order to life, even if we don't always see it. Trust what the prophecies say. Even when they seem to let us down, it's just because we don't fully understand everything the prophecies were trying to tell us. Miracles—unequivocal miracles—can happen. Someone is watching over us and has sent his servants to help us, even if we can't totally comprehend him and what he wants. This Someone loves everyone on all sides equally, yet he is always in control.

Isn't that a remarkable theme for a show to have? (Frankly, isn't it a deeper theme than anything in the Lost finale?) While far from a perfect show, Battlestar Galactica has left more for me to talk and think about than any other show I can think of this year.

So, while these recommendations don't constitute a "Best of" list because I didn't see a lot of films from this year, and *Galactica* actually finished its run a year ago, I think it's worth mentioning both as some of the best entertainment viewed by me during 2010.

In the New Year, we need to remember that we are living testimonies of the saving grace of Jesus Christ, the Lord and Savior of the world. When you are at work, do coworkers see your testimony? Or do you become frustrated easily because someone has not met their deadline, delaying the completion of your own daily tasks? When you sit in the pew at church, do the other members of the church see your testimony? Or do you remain focused on the fact that the preacher has preached ten minutes past twelve, which will cause you to lose ten minutes of your afternoon naptime?

It may be true that we should not worry what they" think. However, we do need to worry about what God thinks. How many times have you disap-

pointed our Heavenly Father? Did you ever skip church, cheat, use inappropriate language, or lie about something or someone? When was the last time you took five minutes out of your busy schedule to thank Him for waking you in the morning? Some New Year's resolutions are bound to be broken, but here is one you can keep. Make a resolution to pray. Pray when you go to bed, pray when you get up, but above all, pray! Pray that you can be a testimony to

> those around you, much like the gentleman I have described below. Take a look at this living testimony:





Many of the songs the Isaacs sing are written by Sonya and Becky. "The girls have written some of our most popular songs and songs made popular by other artists. I'm so proud and thankful for their talent," Lily said. "Sometimes when we're traveling, they will be in the back of the bus with a guitar and pen and paper, putting together a new song."

Asked where Sonya and Becky get ideas for their songs, Lily said, "They draw from life experiences, from

> sermons they hear or from a thought that God gives them. They some-

times awake at night with a thought, and will get up to write it down. Sonya is good with lyrics and Becky is good with the melody. Sometimes we might need a song for a recording, or another group might need a song and will ask them for help," Lily continued.

When it comes to putting all the music together, Lily tells us each member of the group contributes. "When we get a song we look at who is best suited to sing it," she explained. "We always try to feature everyone on a song when we record, and in our concert performances."

"Everyone picks a song they like when we're about to do an album. We listen to all the songs, then everyone gives their opinion," Lily explained. "For instance, when we were do-

While they can't do this with all their recordings, they are very open to the leadership of God in choosing material.

Best of 2010: BRIAN FREE

Gimmicks vs Gospel

In a world that celebrates mediocrity in talent and moral fiber, Brian Free has worked to uphold both musical and ethical standards in Southern Gospel for almost 30 years. Assurance may push the envelope on style but they don't blur the lines on integrity. Brian Free and Assurance is all about class, credibility and clearly communicating the message of the Cross.

Last March, Brian spoke with us about his views of gospel music, right around the time he commerorated 29 years in full time ministry. "I'm nearly three decades in the industry," says Free. "The decisions regarding our music often come from watching trends, seeing what works on stage and what doesn't, and it is not an exact science by any means."

Free continues, "Musically, I trust the Lord to deal with my heart and deal with the guys' hearts and tell us the songs to pick. As far as interpretation of the songs, we pretty much stay with the writer and work together with them. I mn't pick a song that I don't think the writer and I can work together to allow us to deliver the song the way we need to deliver it. It can be a great song, but not every song is for every group. So if we can't deliver the song from our heart and do the song justice, then we won't do it.

"We are here to serve the audience," says Free. "So if I see we are serving up a dish they like, I will serve some more of it!" Assur-

ance is very frank onstage regarding their desire to deliver straightforward lyrics and to minister to their audience, without a lot of extraneous flare that Free compares to a 'circus'.

"When it gets to the point where a gimmick has to be what my ministry's success is based upon, personally, I would stay home. We don't need to have a gimmick; we are presenting the message of Jesus Christ. Everyone is not going to like our ministry. I'm not concerned about that." Free shares, "We do the very best we can to do what God has called us to do. We present our ministry and the people that like our ministry support us. Thank God there are a lot that do."

"The people that don't like us, I understand, I don't hold it against them and I don't get upset with them," Free continues. "But in turn, I'm not going to change what we do simply because a gimmick comes along. I've seen many gimmicks come and go. What remains and what stands the test of time is the heart of the ministry. That's where we are and that's our focus. We do music we enjoy doing, which touches us, that we are excited about doing and that stylistically we enjoy. There is an audience for it."

The pressures of the industry and performance can be incredible for artists, even those with years of experience and a firm grasp of their place in ministry. Some artists find it difficult to remain grounded in the midst of life events and career stress. Free admits that this can be a challenge in the Christian music industry. Assurance members have strong church ties to assist them in remaining firm in their faith.

"We all have home churches and pastors we talk to," says Free. "I'm with my Pastor quite often. We talk at least once or twice a week and email as well if I have questions. If I want to share what's on my heart or have an opinion on something, he's there. He and my wife are my accountability partners. You need that."

Free says his wife is his biggest accountability partner. "You get out of line and my wife, she'll tell you really quick. She doesn't hesitate. She is a five-foot-four fireball."

One of the dangers of not remaining focused on the purpose of ministry is that artists become too affected by the attention and hype surrounding the industry. In some cases, it can cause people to become disillusioned and leave their calling. Free says he has always felt blessed to be able to sing Southern Gospel and knows he is being allowed the privilege to minister in this way because God decided to use him for this purpose.

"It's not anything within me, so there's no ego to burst," says Free. "If I have a bad night, so be it, I do the best I can. I am far from perfect, I'm human and I'm going to make mistakes. I'm going to mess up and when I do, I'm the first one to say, 'Ouch, that hurt!""

"There isn't any ego to deal with in any of our guys." Free contin-



ues, "We are down-to-earth guys. If you aren't going to be real, you can't connect with real people. After nearly three decades in the industry, I'm jaded when it comes to people that are not real. I can't handle it and I don't suffer fools very well. That's just one of my faults. I have problems with anyone who thinks they are anything because as humans we are only dirt when it comes right down to it."

"My righteousness at its best is just filthy rags in the eyes of God. And the filthy rags that the scripture is referring to here are the rags off a leper's body, if you research the original Greek and Hebrew. So that's the nastiest rags you can imagine and that is my righteousness at its best. I have no reason to be haughty and no reason to have an ego, so that's never been an issue with me. And if I ever made a comment that was the least little bit in that direction, my wife would quickly stop me. So I've always been focused."

Brian Free is an ordained minister and takes his calling to rightly divide the Word of truth very seriously. "When you are given the privilege to stand on a stage and preach and sing the Word of God, you are also given a great responsibility. That comes at a high price. We have to be careful because we are responsible for what we say to God's people, what we do and how we present ourselves."

"The Bible is very plain," says Free. "If you do anything to mislead, you'd be better off having a millstone tied around your neck and cast into the sea. The millstone the Bible is referring to here would weigh about 800 pounds. So if they tie that around your neck and throw you in the ocean, you aren't coming back up!"

"I don't want to responsible for misguiding or misleading anybody." Free continues, "This includes how you present yourself, the places you go, how you walk, the way you talk, your facial expressions, your attitude, everything. You only have one chance to make a good first impression on somebody you haven't seen before. That's it. You only have one time. For those that take that lightly, that's because it's all about them. If it's just all about you, you don't care what anyone else thinks, so it doesn't matter. You are your own little universe."




Just as an artist has to have goals for their music, they also need to develop personal spiritual goals to remain focused. "My goal every day is to be closer to the Lord," says Free. "I need to be a better Christian. I need to think more on Godly things, to act more on faith, to do everything we need to do on a daily basis to grow. I've got a long way to go before I become the kind of Christian I want to be."

"If God allows us greater popularity, that's great, because the more popular you are, the more people you reach," says Free. "That's what keeps you on the road. If no one wants to hear you, you aren't going to be doing it very long. I want us to become more popular within the Christian community and within the Church, so that we can share our hearts and carry the message that God has given to us."

But to know Susan was to also know that more than any role she could play in the world, her role as wife to Deon and mom/stepmom to her children (Scott, Amy, Chris, and Leslie and Aaron) was the most important. Her loyalty, generosity, and integrity were something to admire. Though SGNScoops.com also publishes daily news and monthly features, Susan never acted as though we were competitors; rather, she worked alongside us all the way by sharing her wisdom, experience, and support. To say that is a special quality is an understatement, and to say it is rare is a an admonishment.

Susan passed away on January 5, after a long and difficult physical battle that left her dependent on a wheel-chair and oxygen tank. Yet, her focus and determination never wavered.

My life enriched today because of Susan Unthank...I never heard her complain once, and I always saw her put everyone in front of herself. 10 years ago...We were SO excited! Susan Unthank was all about giving the underdog a chance. God was and will continue to be honored by the motivation of her life and ministry"

And Susan's devoted and beloved husband Deon had this to say, "She was the back-bone of our family and the [AbsolutelyGospel.com] site. Susan put more time and energy over the course of the last 15 years in SGN than most people put in in their life. She lived and breathed Southern Gospel for the past 15 years. While our family grieves the loss of this very important member of our family, surely the industry must mourn the loss of one of its most prized possessions." Indeed, we have, Deon, and we do. May God be with the Unthank family...and may they be comforted in the promise that Susan is completely restored and with our Savior!



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In an interview that so closely captured our vision for SGN Scoops magazine, Oak Ridge Boy Joe Bonsall shared his thoughts on what it means to be a gospel singer. Originally published in May 2010, Joe's words continue to ring true.

Joe Bonsall, one of the "ORB" or "Oaks," says most things with a lightness in his voice. This is a man with serious accolades and a seriously prestigious career who rarely takes himself too seriously. Whether you get to know him from the countless ORB songs woven into America's musical culture, one of his memoirs, over a plate of lasagna at Hendersonville's Nana Rosa, or as one of his near-3000 followers on Twitter, you'll know that Joe has a lot to say about a lot of things, and all of it with an enthusiasm for life that is contagious, kind of like an Oak Ridge Boys song. *By Kelly Capriotti Burton*



Best of 2010: Oak Ridge Boys Gospel Music, Rock & Roll Attitude

The Oak Ridge Boys have a 50-year history that spans across and often defies genres. While many of their charting songs and general successes have occurred in the country music industry, gospel music is at their roots and their core, and that is a subject Joe does not take lightly. Joe and members Duane Allen, William Golden, and Richard Sterban have made up the current and iconic iteration of the Oak Ridge Boys for the past 36 years. Together they have musically transcended the gospel, country, pop, and rock and roll genres. In the 1970s, followed by a change in direction at shift to the Columbia record label, their music began to be more heavily promoted to country radio than to gospel. In that timeframe, the group who at one time was often seen in SG-matching-suits was widely accused of leaving gospel music or going country. Joe explained throughout our talk and from the stage at the Harmony Honors that this wasn't quite the case. More so, the ORB have been blessed with variety of success and opportunity.

"[One week in early spring], we were singing [at the 50 Years of Kenny Rogers concert taping) with Kenny, Wynonna Judd, Lionel Richie, and Smokey Robinson. [Two weeks later at the SGM Guild Guild Harmony Honors] we shared the

stage with Triumphant Quartet...there's never a reason to limit ourselves," Joe says.

Incidentally, Triumphant Quartet recently scored a hit with ORB's "Everyday," the song they would perform together on the stage at the Gaylord Opryland Convention Center. It was there that Judy Nelon, president of the SGMG, told the crowd that the Oak Ridge Boys, "Have touched people all over the world with gospel music."

Indeed, it seems that the industries showcasing ORB music agree. With numerous country accolades (among them, the Academy of Country Music's lifetime achievement/Pioneer honor),ORB was also inducted into the Gospel





Music Hall of Fame in 2000, have won numerous Dove Awards, Christian Country Music Awards 2004 Mainstream Artist of the Year, and was honored by the SGMG with the President's Honor in April 2010.

"I fondly recall having the opportunity of presenting a Gospel Music Award to the Oak Ridge Boys in Los Angeles, California in 1973," recalls Nelon. "It just happened to have been Joe Bonsall's first week with the group. Now, thirty-seven years later, it is such a privilege to present the prestigious SGMG President's Honor to this same amazing group."

The night of the SGMG Harmony Honors and the presentation of the Presidential Honor showcased the gospel stylings of Oak Ridge Boys as well as the relevance they hold in the current southern gospel

It's no secret or even a touchy subject to say that ORB's place in southern gospel comes with a touch of controversy. So when the question is posed: How does the group balance songs about carousing with songs about Jesus? Joe responds with an answer that he's clearly given before.

"I've never had a problem singing any of them," he says. "Trying to Love Two Women' – if you listen to the words – is saying it's a bad idea! "Y'all Come back Saloon" is just about people who are down and out. There are blurry lines, but all the guys in the group are Christians who believe in the gospel... We pay tribute to it every night in our concerts, and we pay tribute to it with the lives we live."

A typical ORB show – and there are about 150 a year – has a set list that weaves in and out of the nearly-four decades of music they have made together. Those sets change nightly and consist of country songs, love songs, songs about family, patriotic anthems, and always, several gospel songs.

"To me, it's old news that 'The Oak Ridge Boys went country," Joe says. "We don't make our living in the gospel music industry, but we never quit singing gospel music."

Joe says the group talks to younger artists in gospel music who would also like to "step out of the box" musically but are afraid of "getting hammered upon."

"We're just surfing a different feed," he adds. "If some lady in the fourth row doesn't like my hair, who cares? That puts everything in the wrong perspective."

Bill Dykes of Mansion Entertainment, himself of a gospel music mainstay, shared his thoughts on the group: "The Oaks have always been true to themselves, be it in gospel music or country, and most importantly they have always been true to their God. That is the reason why I believe the transition of them moving back

towards Gospel Music again has been so easy. People always loved them and never forgot them from their original gospel music days; songs like "Jesus is Coming Soon" and "I Know" will live forever as sung by the Oak Ridge Boys."

The ORB's latest release, The Boys Are Back, an eclectic collection that put ORB on the playlists of a new generation of listeners, also includes selections that embody the gospel and family friendly thread that runs through the group. The single "Mama's Table," (written by Nashville-based Jamey Johnson) tracing a family's story through a kitchen mainstay, hit the Billboard Country Singles chart and is a sentimental fan favorite, while show-opener "The Boys Are Back" and the raucous "Seven Nation Army" (previously recorded by White Stripes) consistently bring ORB audiences to their feet. Meanwhile, "You Ain't Gonna Blow My House Down" and "Live with Jesus" continue to showcase the group's gospel music roots. The project as whole has been a creative turning point for the group, one that shows no signs of them slowing down or settling for the same old sound.

"We are four guys who are just like-minded," Joe says. "Nobody is ready to retire, and we're always thinking forward: How can we do it better?"

The new effort still resonates with long-time fans, such as editor of AbsolutelyGospel. com, Deon Unthank, who says, "I've been an Oak Ridge Boys fan since I was about 16 years old, and that was a long time ago. I was checking my old LPs not long ago and to my surprise I have more Oak Ridge Boys records than any other group. I watched all the changes as the Oaks morphed into who they are today. Several personnel changes, and a lot of years later, I will still go see the Oak Ridge Boys every chance I get."

While Joe describes the group as quintessential American music group, a middle American group, the one you see on the campaign trail with George Bush and at the state fair, he is perhaps happiest to say that an Oak Ridge Boys concert is one for the family: "There is nothing off color: you can bring your grandma or your little kids."

And when it comes to the gospel section of that American music scene, Joe states enthusiastically, "All of us are honored beyond words to be honored by gospel music."

He concludes, "We love gospel music; it is where our heritage lies. A lot of people's lives have been touched by Oak Ridge Boys music — including mine before I was ever a part of it. We're a southern gospel quartet singing country music with a rock and roll attitude."

It's a flavor all its own, and may many more lives be touched by it in the years to come.





Best of 2010:

THE PETTYS give thanks

For our November issue, Dee Ann Bailey put out a call for artists words of gratefulness. At the center of the story was Tracy and Libbi Perry Stuffle, who were plowing through an eventful year of successes, accolages, and transitions, and one that also brought serious threats to Tracy's health. Libbi shared the story of God's faithfulness and their own gratefulness.

On August 11, 2010 a time came that neither Tracy nor Libbi them were really prepared for. Tracy was experiencing pain and once the doctors saw him, things

began to move really fast. In addition to having multiple blockages Tracy learned he was a diabetic and also there was a small heart aneurysm. After determining that would this not be a problem, Tracy's surgery was set for August 13th.

What the hospital wasn't prepared for and what Tracy and Libbi didn't fully understand, was how much they were loved! The hospital switchboard was overwhelmed and the waiting rooms were overflowing. The love this couple had inspired was now surrounding them as gentle prayers was being whispered for them not only across the country but around the world.

This outpouring of love caused the hospital to ask them to begin a Caringbridge website to keep everyone updates as their lines could not handle the influx of calls. As he made it through the surgery and Libbi and Jared were allowed to see him, a collective sigh of relief was heard in many homes that had been praying for them.

"We didn't know that Tracy was diabetic and we thought the pain he was experiencing was from a hienal hernia, we had no clue he had anything wrong with his heart. But the doctors said that many folks in his shape, by the time they have a clue is already too late," Libbi shared. "The good news is he was there and able to get better. The bad news, he had to get in better shape because the doctors were not giving us options if he didn't."

As members of The Perrys and their friends pitched in to keep concert dates going, Libbi stayed right by Tracy's side. "Our vows said 'for better or worse, in sickness and in health' but I thought that would





be later in life, when we were old and grey, I didn't expect it to be now. But she has not left my side, she encourages me and has been with me every step

of the way" says Tracy.
"When they were wheeling him away from me were so many 'what ifs' that came to mind but there was no time, they said we have to do this now. All I could do was put him in God's hands" Libbi adds.

"God's been good to us," she continues. "We have felt the prayers and words can't express how much that means to us. Tracy is doing good

and losing weight, his insulin keeps being reduced and we believe before long we can begin to control his sugar with just diet. His blood pressure is still giving us a few problems but the doctors are pleased with his progress."

Just as with anything in our lives, change happens,

and as they finish out this year and look forward to 2011, there are changes with The Perrys. With the recent departure of Troy Peach, The Perrys have added

a young man who is no stranger to SGM or many other Americans for that matter. Bryan Walker, formerly with the Dixie Melody Boys and American Idol contestant, is their new baritone. The song and the singers will still carry on. They know what they are singing about and that message resonates with those listening: It's not about being perfect, it's about allowing Him to perfect us.

Update: According to Libbi, Tracy has dutifully changed his lifestyle and lost over 50 pounds since suffering his heart attack. However, he was hospitalized in early January after a knot formed on his leg. With Libbi by his side, he is healing. Please keep them in your continued prayers.

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
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Where does Christian Fitness Begin?

"And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God" (Romans 12:2).

Does fitness begin by doing a lot of acrobatics (physical or mental)? It does feel that way some-

times, doesn't it? Where do we begin? Most of us would say that to make physical changes, we must

begin with our body.

But what part do the spirit and soul play?

In 1 Thessalonians 5:23 Paul prays "may your whole spirit, soul, and body be preserved blameless..." You are a spirit who has a soul and you live in a body. Your soul consists of your mind, will and emotions.

What's on your mind? It's estimated that we think about 60,000 thoughts per day at a speed of 600-800 words per minute. Do you find your thoughts consistently running along positive paths or negative ones? When something bad happens do you think or say, "It figures. Nothing good ever happens to me."

Or do you say, "You know what? I'm not moved by this because God said in Psalm 34 that 'Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord delivers

him out of them all,' so we're coming out of this one, too."

In More Jams Than Smuckers?

While quoting scripture out of your mouth may be new to you, it's certainly better than quoting many of the slogans the world hands us. "If it feels good, do it" has landed people in more jams than Smuckers. How about the woeful outlook of "Murphy's law" which says if anything can go wrong it probably will. Why are people who quote God's Word called extremists and fanatics while those who quote Murphy's Law are considered realists who are just "telling it like it is?"

Does God "Tell it like it is"?

Did you know God never told us to "tell it like it is?"

In fact, if that were the way God operated, creation would not have happened.

Imagine if God had stepped out into the black void of space and said, "Hey it sure is dark out here." It would still be dark! What God says is truth. He cannot lie.

God chose not to "tell it like it is." Instead He "calls those things which do not exist as though they did" (Romans 4:17).

You can decide you won't allow yourself to be "conformed to this world," its thoughts and ways of doing things -- but you can "be transformed by the renewing of your mind" on the

Word of God.

Read and speak scriptures aloud -- especially God's promises to you about who you are in Christ and the victorious life the Lord has for you in Him. You'll start to be transformed.

The book of Ephesians is a great place to start - especially all of the "in Christ" and "in Him" scriptures.

Start Looking in a New Mirror

Thinking and speaking God's words and thoughts will change you. Your faith will grow as you hear the Word of God. You will begin to see yourself in a new light, a new mirror: the Word of God. It will become easier for you to encourage and bring hope to others, for you'll begin to know that the Lord can help them.

Situations that used to baffle you will become easier

to understand. Health and fitness issues will also become easier to solve, for godly fitness is tied more to the development of the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22,23) than any diet or exercise routine.

Look at yourself in the mirror of God's Word today.

You will love the way you look - in Him.


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
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LOVING WHAT WE DO
