## Life, Love & LEGENDS

My fervent prayer for this New Year is to glorify the Heavenly Father at every opportunity. In 2012, I am celebrating seventy five years of passionate involvement in Southern Gospel music---singing, hosting television, songwriting, publishing, serving on industry boards, speaking, authoring books, writing articles, and making personal appearances to encourage our next generation of gospel music lovers. Carrying the torch so powerfully this past year, and the year ahead, is our Scoops publisher Rob Patz, our editor Rhonda Frye, and an excellent staff of contributors. I thank God for their efforts.

few weeks ago, I flew to Nashville to be a guest on a new television series. It was exciting to tape "Blast From The Past" a segment of "Gospel Music Down South" owned and produced by Jim Hefner. Host group, the Southmen, Buddy Burton, Larry Beck, Buddy Poe, and Hefner, with Eddie Crook at the piano, sang the great gospel classics superbly. Some of the others at this taping were Ed Hill, Joel & LaBreeska Hemphill, Woody Beatty, Jerry & Jan Goff. It was fun to tape an introduction segment with Danny Jones, Singing News editor. I felt right at home with the television crew, David and Diana Thomas, Freshwell Media, and their son Aaron. Watch for "Singing Down South" on Family Friendly Entertainment and several cable systems.

As part of my celebration of 75 years in gospel music, with the encouragement of Judy Nelon, I taped the first session of a documentary about Southern Gospel music. We described the first Dove Awards in 1969, and Bill Gaither winning the first Songwriter's Award. John T. Benson and I were the co-presenters. A young crew-cut Bill came to the stage and said to us "I'm scared to death." Since that time, Bill Gaither has won so many awards, we stopped counting. Moving on to another event, as I looked into the TV camera to talk about the GMA Hall Of Fame, I thought about the

generosity of Bill Gaither who made a special trip to Nashville to present my induction into this hallowed Hall Of Fame in 2005. With the Gaither sense of humor, he began with this comment: "Lou Hildreth signed Mark Lowry to his first booking contract, and we are still going to induct her into the GMA Hall Of Fame??" After the audience stopped laughing, he proceeded with a precious tribute. Remembering this event for the TV documentary was emotional, and I moved quickly to another subject, the SGMA Hall Of Fame in Dollywood, describing opening day in 1999 and painting a vivid picture of that event. Several legends are scheduled to contribute to this worthy project, and we will keep you informed at SGNScoops. Looking into the TV camera and recalling the excitement of being involved in these events reminded me again of the blessing of God on my life in Southern Gospel Music. This scripture speaks to all of us as we work together for our beloved music---Matthew 5:16 "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and GLORIFY your FATHER in Heaven."



Many times in the music industry you come across those people that make "it" happen. If there was ever one person that I could say has that quality it would be the one and only Ms. Donna Beauvais. Take a minute and read this very candid interview with Donna and get to know her.

Rob: Donna, as most people know every story has a beginning so let's start there and tell us a little history behind the wonderful person that is Donna!

Donna: Hmmm... Wonderful...? You're too kind, but here's a little history: I was born in Detroit, Michigan, so I am starting with a confession. I am a Yankee! But, I'm a Yankee who loves Southern Gospel music and southern people and northern and eastern and western and so on. Hove people. I love that GOD gave us blessings like music to connect each other and draw us closer to Him. The interesting thing for me is that "the chicken came before the egg" so to speak. I was not raised in a Christian home, but I have always LOVED music. From the time I was a little girl, I sang non-stop. I sang at breakfast, lunch, and dinner, I sang in the car, I sang everywhere. To be honest, my mom and brother used to ask me to hush, until I started to

finally carry a tune, I guess. Then the whole family was always asking me to sing. That was nice of them, but not always very pretty! HA! But I just loved it. All my school years were completely engulfed in my music education. I actually went on to study opera and opera theatre as a young adult. My relationship with Jesus, the most important of all the relationships in my life, began when I was 18 years old. I actually read a Gospel tract. I had already been seeking and wondering about who God was and where He is. All I had to do was wrap my heart and mind around His Word and I realized HE was, is, and will always be the answer. I think having

a love for music, prior to accepting Christ, actually increased my faith, because I realized that something so beautiful couldn't possibly have been created by simple human beings. I will never forget the day I asked Jesus to be my Savior. My life has never been the same since. He is a gift beyond description, and, once I came to know Him, He brought music to a whole new level for me. He defined its role in my life, from that moment and into the future, and the beauty of the message came to life for me.

I was a young wife and mother, married at the age of 18. We were blessed with four beautiful children; Jessica, Jason, Josh, and Jenna. (Notice a trend...HA). Life rushed by, but music always went right along side it. I began music ministry in my 20's. I also began song writing. Many years later came a season that God used so powerfully. It was a music ministry that began with me and my daughter, Jessica, and eventually included my wonderful son-in-law, Eddie, named Hope's Call. This was a precious time in my life, and at times, a challenging one, but I'm quite sure this magazine only allows for so many pages per article, so I will wrap this up by saying how grateful I am, that in all seasons, God walks with us and HE talks with us and He tells us WE ARE HIS OWN. He has been faithful to me and the gift of music is the thread that sows HIS love around my heart every day.

Today, I own the company Vertical Sky. I have the privilege of helping others in music to reach for God's dreams for their lives through production, promotion, publicity and so on. I am honored by the opportunity to work in this way. I went through quite a life transition in 2007. It's a word that many find hard to talk about, and I am no exception, but I experienced divorce. It was a very tough time, but also a time of learning, growing, and seeing God in a new and

loving way. And, now, five years later, in just the way He does, God has brought love, hope, and restoration to my life. Just a couple of weeks ago, the most amazing man God has ever placed in my journey of life, Zane King, asked me to be his wife. I am absolutely beyond blessed! Oh, and can I throw in that I am a NANA?! Jessica and Eddie had my perfect little grandson, Bennett, over two years ago. I am in love with that little guy! God is GOOD!

Rob: Wow, so much life experience! You mentioned that you are a songwriter, how old were you when you wrote your first song and what was called?

Donna: I was about 22 years old when I wrote my first song. I sang all my life, and I loved to write poetry, etc., I just never put two and two together until I came to Christ and realized that singing and writing were not hobbies. They were actually a calling on my life.

The first song I wrote was called "New Life" and although the premise was good (coming to new life through Christ), the song was terrible. But, HEY, you gotta start somewhere!

Rob: Where do you derive your inspiration for writing from?

Donna: There are so many things that inspire me, but my main source of inspiration is truly life experience. I believe God takes us through life's struggles, joys, hopes, and trials to teach us and to give us opportunity to encourage others. He instills different, yet equally valuable, gifts in all of us. Songwriting is a way for me to put into word and song who God is to me and how He has worked in my heart and life, and often, in the lives of amazing people around me. It will always astound me that God chose to move in us in so many incredible ways. I am so grateful music is one of those ways.

Rob: If you could ever have a co-writer past or present who would it be?

Donna: Every songwriter I have had the blessing of writing with has been and continues to be an honor! I'd like to mention all of them by name, but since I am writing a novel with each answer, I should probably fight that urge!

There are two people I want to mention specifically though. I LOVE the heart and energy of Kenna West, and although she is my dear friend, I've never actually gotten to write with her. So, Kenna, if you're reading this-LET'S WRITE!

Donna: I am quite sure I couldn't answer that with one artist in particular. I have tremendous love for many Christian musicians. My biggest influences are really other songwriters who turn a common thought into a masterpiece. I am constantly learning from people who are a whole lot more talented than I am! Rob: You have many other

roles in the Southern Gospel industry; tell us a little about what all you do.

The other person I am

truly overwhelmed with the opportunity to write with may not come as a surprise to everyone, but it is the love of my life, Mr. Zane King, who is soon to be my husband. We did actually co-write our first song in this last few months and it felt completely comfortable and right. (I guess that should be the case, huh?) The simplicity and realness of his lyrics and beautiful melodies have always just blown me away. (I've known Zane for 18 years!) I am excited to see what God does as we write together. I suspect it'll be that Zane will write these great songs and I'll get my name on them for adding an "it" or an "and!" HA! Rob: What artist has had

the biggest influence on you as a song-writer?

Donna: I am overwhelmed by the opportunity to work in this industry. Probably my first love, besides songwriting, is production. To get to join hearts with other artists and help them make an album, filled with songs that will impact the lives of others, is just unreal. I feel like a kid in a candy store. I also LOVE the radio promotion side of what I do because it is another mode to bring Jesus to someone who needs to hear about Him. I am also very thankful for the friendships with program directors, music directors, and dis at radio stations all over the world. What a gift they are to me! I also enjoy helping artists with staging and presentation of their ministry, vocal coaching, publicity and promotion, and consultation. The bottom line is, whatever it

is, if it involves music and furthering the message of HOPE that Jesus has given us, I am completely blessed to get to be a part of it.

I'd also love to mention that when I came off the road in 2007, I was blessed with the opportunity to work with Daywind Records and some of the best of the best in our industry. I will be forever grateful to Daywind for that experience. Dottie Leonard Miller, Ed Leonard, Norman Holland, Tana Lonon, Dani Lintzenich, Michael Turner, and others at the company taught me so much about the how business and ministry can walk hand in hand. I am honored to have had such a wonderful association over the years.

The thing that caught

my attention many years ago as a young adult (new) Christian, having never heard a Christian song in all my life as a child, is that the message in Gospel music is so biblically focused and so God honoring. I love that we don't have to search for the meaning in a song. I believe this music hits people where it counts, in the heart. So, to get to work among my peers and others to help it to grow and continue forward is a true privilege.

Rob: Besides writing and all the your other responsibilities, what are some other hobbies that you love?

Donna: I honestly can't say I have another hobby...My hobby is my work. What a blessing! However, if you ask me my favorite thing to do outside of my

work, I'd have to say, it's playing with my grandson, Bennett, when I am able spend time with him, and golfing with Zane. I cannot claim golf as my hobby yet, because I'm not good enough at it for it to qualify as a hobby!

Rob: What drives you to do what you do?

Donna: The HOPE of Jesus and a LOVE for people and the art of music.

Rob: I know this may be a difficult question to answer but if you had to pick one of the songs you've written as your favorite, which one would it be?

Donna: It's a song called "In Jesus' Name." I cowrote it with my amazing daughter, Jessica, and her husband, Eddie. We wrote this song just before we



went on our first trip with Compassion International; A child hunger relief organization whose focus is on ministering to the entire scope of needs in an underprivileged child. They not only focus on the physical needs of children, but also, on their spiritual needs. Over 100,000 children came to salvation in Christ, through Compassion, last year.

Becoming involved in Compassion changed our lives and our ministry, Hope's Call, for the better. From the moment we began sharing Compassion with churches and concert attendees all over the United States and Canada, we saw God move in very powerful ways.

As a body of believers, we not only need, but have a responsibility to look for ways to reach others for Christ; we can reach out to our neighbor down the street and a child across the ocean at the same time. Compassion taught us to look beyond this corner of the world, where we live, in a country where there are more blessings than we can contain, and see the faces of those who need our love, help, and spiritual encouragement.

I actually had the opportunity to meet the child I sponsor. Her name is Ana Maria Flores and she lives in Bolivia, South America. There are really no words to express what seeing this precious little soul did to me. In all of her lack, she was the very picture of gratitude. We continue to communicate regularly, through letters and pictures. This is a wonderful way that

Compassion provides to help EVERYONE who sponsors a child to have a one on one relationship with their child.

I can't say enough about how great Compassion is, and, the interesting thing is, we came to be involved, as an artist, through Zane, who works directly with the organization, helping to educate and equip artists to share this hope as a very important aspect of ministry. He himself was deeply impacted through the ministry of Compassion, and, he continues to help others to be a part of it, to this day.

I want to encourage everyone reading this article to visit compassion. com to learn more about what they do and who they help. Rob: A song that you co-wrote with your daughter and son-in-law, "In Jesus Name," is a very well written song about how we can reach out to people down the street and around the world. Tell us the story behind that song.

Donna: Well, what a perfect final question! The answer is in the previous question! And, by the way, thank you for allowing me to share my heart. It's an honor. I deeply appreciate your magazine and each and every one of you. God bless YOU!





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### WHY?





Born in Germany to holocaust survivors and raised in a Jewish home, Lily Isaacs later encountered Jesus Christ in a small church (actually- a converted garage) in the middle of the country. Lily Isaacs walked away from that little country church, in 1971, a new creature with a new work budding in her heart. At the time, little did she know of the enormous calling on her life and the plans God had in store for her and her family.

Becoming a Christian in and of itself presented an obstacle. Lily's parents and family rejected her and her new-found faith in those early years of following Christ. Nonetheless, she pursued a meaningful relationship with Jesus and became the matriarch of a multi-award winning gospel group known as "The Isaacs" as a result.

The Isaacs are known for their rich family harmony, exceptional song-writing and for their talents using acoustic instrumentation. The art of blending those dynamics along with Holy Spirit anointing has made them tremendously successful

throughout their ministry. The Isaacs are regulars at the Grand Ole Opry and Gaither Homecoming Events/ Videos/Concerts. They perform in various venues internationally each year and have been recognized by their peers, the industry and fans for their work. They have received numerous nominations and awards including, GMA Dove Awards, The Singing News Fan Awards, ICGMA and Grammy Awards plus many more honors.

The Isaacs consists of Lily and her three children, Ben, Sonya and Rebecca. All of them sing and play a variety of instruments. Ben is known for studio production in addition to his playing upright bass and his vocal talents. Sonya Isaacs Yeary plays mandolin, sings and collaborates with sister and guitarist, Rebecca Isaacs Bowman with songwriting. There are only two words that can describe the combination of their voices, songs and music: "Simply Gorgeous!"

Sonya and Rebecca have written many number one hit songs for their

family, but also for other artists such as The Bowlings, Gold City Quartet, Mark Lowry, Jeff and Sheri Easter and more. Their hits have expanded past the gospel community and into the world of country music as well. Country greats such as Vince Gill, Trisha Yearwood and Martina McBride have recorded their songs.

The Isaacs have released many amazing records through the years, but there is something absolutely special about their latest release, WHY CAN'T WE. The message of this album asks questions of God that perhaps most of us think, but don't have the courage to ask out loud. The Isaacs have written, sung and recorded about some of the toughest questions in life and have given us strength by their message of hope. The reason? Although they are Christians and despite their success, the Isaacs have experienced loss, pain and suffering like everyone else in the world. In a sense, the album contains the Isaacs' personal emotions and their voices of experience from their personal

lives.

During the National Quartet
Convention, Lily and son, Ben Isaacs
sat down with us at the SGNScoops
booth and discussed the thoughts
behind WHY CAN'T WE. "Our new
album is on the Gaither Music Label,"
Ben shares. "My sisters Sonya, Becky
and Sonya's husband Jimmy wrote
probably 80% of the album and
then we went back and re-visited
"I Believe in a Hill Called Mount
Calvary" by the Gaither Vocal Band
and one written by James McFall
called 'I Still Trust You.""

"Ben produced this new album for us," Lily explains just like a proud mom (and rightly so!) "And he has been so busy this year in the studio. He just recently produced the Gaither Vocal Band's new record and he just finished with the Oak Ridge Boys."

"And," Ben continues, "I have Charlotte Ritchie's new project and Wilburn and Wilburn's. I've been busy!"

Ben laughs and shares: "We could have easily called this album the WHY album because we have a lot of questions! As you get older you find out the things that were really important to you when you were young don't really matter as much anymore...You know, It's {life is} really all about the family, dealing with age, with kids and problems. So I would call this probably the "life" album. It deals with life questions and it's our interpretation of answers. We tend to shy away from God, but He already knows what we're thinking."

Lily adds: "There's actually a song on there called 'Why.' It asks the tough questions. Why do some die before their time? Why do the old outlive their minds? Why is there abuse? The way the song is worded is amazing, but at the very end of the song it says, 'God I know you have a reason why...One day when we get to heaven and we talk about this life, You will help me understand why,

'cause I know You have a reason."

At times, the subject matter in the album is heavy. The Isaacs explain WHY they recorded an album tackling tough issues: "There are a few people that have lived through a miracle and are on the other side of it," Ben explains, "but there are a lot of people that are in a situation that still need a touch."

"This album is just good," Lily adds.
"I don't know how the industry is going to receive it because there are so many subjects that are deep, but you know-we just go into the studio and whatever God gives us to do is exactly what we do! With the day and time in which we live with the economy and suffering, I think people need to hear it! We are all human and these are all questions we all have."

As Lily and Ben discussed their favorite selections on the album, their passion was evident by their tones and expressions- even to the point of Ben singing some of the lyrics right there on the spot in our Scoops Booth. It was nearly overwhelming to experience a mother and son's passion and mission to touch a hurting world. Their confidence in this album really touching lives was convincing. One selection in particular that captures raw emotions from

personal experience is "I'm Gonna Love You Through It." Lily's personal bout with breast cancer 27 years ago prompted her children to write a deeply personal song about this experience. Martina McBride recorded and climbed the country charts with it as well.

Lily shares: "This one is personal and really touching. I love it because it's so personal...so VERY personal! The second verse talks about forced smiles and baggy shirts to hide what the cancer took from her. Only anybody that has ever been through that type of disfigurement knows what that feels like! So just to address that issue and for people to identify with that (and it doesn't have to be just about breast cancer because a lot of people suffer from disfigurement from disease or surgery) and the suffering you go through is important. It takes family, friends, and church family to support you and to just be there to give you strength. I could have never made it without my family. I don't know how people do it without that and the Lord. My family and the Lord are my two strongholds today."

"That's probably my favorite song," Ben reflects, "but I also love 'Why Can't We?" Ben tried to explain what the first verse was about and just broke out singing the lyrics. "He lies awake there all alone most every night lookin' back on all of his mistakes wishin' through the tears that he could just go back 'cause there's a lot of things he'd like to change. He just can't forgive himself and forget even though God already did. If he can love someone and find the good within- in spite of what they've done no matter where they've been. If He can let it go and set the debtor free-If He can keep forgiving you and me, Why Can't We?"

"That's a killer," Ben said with tears in his eyes as if he knew exactly when to stop singing to keep tears from spilling all over the Scoops booth. "It's a great song; it talks about how people won't let things go. I'm telling you- this album to me is the question album."

Another favorite is "Waiting In The Water." Ben explains: "This song talks about when Jesus healed the blind man- the one where He put the mud on his eyes. Looking at the map from what Bible Scholars say, it was a 2 mile journey for the blind man to make it to the specified pool of water. Could you imagine how much he stumbled and fell and the faith that it took for him to get there?" Ben asks. "It wasn't until he did his part before the miracle took place!"

"He just told him to go and wash," Lily adds. "Jesus could have healed him like that (snap)! He didn't have to put the mud on his eyes. Jesus wanted him to trust Him and that's why Becky had the idea of the song. She received her healing that way and she's been 7 months off all of her medications that she has been taking for two years. It's about that little space of time that she had to walk those dates with God to the water."

Ben adds: "The hook line of the song is-'the miracle that's promised by our Father is waiting in the water.' It's all about the process of getting to the water."

The Isaacs write songs that grip the heart, for sure! Their inspiration comes in a variety of avenues. "I'm a little bit of a writer," Ben admits, "nothing compared to my sistersthey are incredible! Inspiration comes from sermons, things people say, and just ideas. I think they're God-given."

"Their dad is an amazing songwriter," Lily says, "they got their gift inherited from him."

During our interview, Lily and Ben discussed how they stay spiritually refreshed. "There are two ways I get fed," says Ben. "Number one, I love my church! I'm very faithful to my church. I get to go on Wednesdays and my pastor preaches every Wednesday night. We have class, so every week I get Sunday school and church." Ben's face lit up as he continued: "My kids refresh me. I feel that my number one calling in life is to show my kids the way. The right way. That's my obligation. In the ministry- I just show it {the Christian life} to people, but I live it in front of my kids. My kids refresh me! I love being home. I love my family."

"I have a different perspective on that," Lily adds. "My kids are grown, away from home and I live by myself. I enjoy being with my family, I love my children, my grandchildren but a lot of times my refreshing, other than church, is just selfexamination and having quiet time with the Lord in the privacy of my home. Home is where I can reflect. We are around people so much a lot of the time. Those quiet moments alone that you spend with the Lord sitting in your family room with a cup of coffee reading the Bible or just kneeling down by the bed in the evening or even being outside in the sunshine are refreshing times to talk to God one on one. Personal time with the Lord is what I thrive

## FAN based, FAN driven, at the Diamond Awards, ... the FANS speak out! by Laura Kennedy

As a Pastor with over 40 years in the ministry, Reverend Allen Smith became involved in Southern Gospel music through concert promotion in the churches where he was ministering. In the mid-90's he began to DJ at a radio station in DeSoto, Missouri. He and his church started a southern gospel magazine, which grew quickly and became the Southern Gospel News Magazine. A weekly email newsletter followed, SGN Scoops Ezine. Today the publication is known as SGN Scoops Magazine- Home of the Prestigious Diamond Awards.

The Diamond Awards were originally started by Gospel Voice Magazine 20 years ago. After a time of seeking God's provision, the ceremony was handed over to Smith, a soft-spoken gentleman who loves Southern Gospel music and whose innovative direction has led the Diamond Awards to their current status.

In an industry that currently has many award ceremonies occurring throughout the year, the heart of why the Diamonds are special lies within the fans. Fan Based, Fan Driven, the fans even select the nominees. The decision

was made to let every Southern Gospel fan vote if they wanted to. So, in addition to a printed ballot, there is also an electronic ballot available on the website. We, at the Diamond Awards, were the first to do this, and it has worked quite well in allowing the fans the opportunity to speak out and be heard.

In 2009, Rob Patz, CEO of Coastal Medial Group, parent company of SGMRadio, acquired SGNScoops and the Diamond Awards from Smith. Since that time, Patz has been amazed at the growth in popularity for both the magazine and the Diamond Awards. Last year's voting participation broke all records to date. Due to substantial growth of SGNScoops magazine, this year's voting is projected to top that of last year's.

Other industry professionals appearing included Lou Wills Hildreth, Hearts of Faith, Deon Unthank, Bev McCann, and Chris Unthank. Coastal Media founder and Diamond Awards head, Rob Patz, remarked that the evening was truly special. He added, "We are so excited that another Diamond Awards is in the history books. We had a blast this year, and know that everyone involved loved being a part of the show as well!"

The ever resounding excitement of true southern gospel music fans is sure to keep the Diamond Awards an exciting ceremony for many years to come. The culminating efforts of industry professionals with many years of experience as well as some newer ones will bring their combined efforts to a diverse planning and advisory board. Rob Patz, Rhonda Frye, Eric Frye, Lorraine Walker, Sandi Duncan Clark, Lou Wills Hildreth, Denise Salchow, Jonathan Edwards, Matt Dudney, Anthony Facello, and Stephanie Kelley are working diligently in making decisions and planning a memorable night for 2012's Award Show. Even now as they have begun their efforts, we ask you to remember them in prayer for the sake of encouragement and for God's ultimate praise and glory.

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No doubt, most of us are staring into the mirror of the past trying to figure out how well we performed in our ministry assignments in 2011. lsn't it great to know that only God is the fair judge? He knows us and our motives better than we even know ourselves. It doesn't matter how far off course we have strayed nor does it matter how miserably we've failed. It doesn't matter how impossible the task seems to be. Nothing matters except that we keep pressing toward the finish line! Today is a new day. This is a new year. The slate is clean. The leaf has been turned over. It's a new season. If God has placed a dream in your heart, never give

Oblivious to me standing near her doorway, I watched her struggle to put her heavy Bible on the night stand. The moment I saw she needed help, I darted through the door and said, "Can I help you with that?" She appreciated my help as I told her how it blessed my heart to see her curled up with God's wordobviously still cherishing it. We talked a minute and she asked me to remember her in prayer. I told her I would and asked if there was anything I could do for her before I

left. She said she was really thirsty. I noticed her cup waaaaay across the room, so I offered to get it for her. The little lady sipped and sipped like she had been thirsty for hours. As I held her cup and she drank, Jesus so sweetly reminded me... "Mercy to the needy is a loan to God." It dawned on me that I had just loaned (or "lendeth") unto the Lord and needless to say, tears filled my eyes, I felt His presence so near. I asked her if it would be ok for me to pray for her right there and she was most appreciative. Just as I said "amen," the lady said, "Now I'm going to pray for you!" Boldness and authority from within boosted her frail voice as she prayed for me and my family and specifically for protection and for God's blessings. Needless to say, the tears spilled over because the second half of the Bible verse that I had barely noticed earlier

had now pretty much hit me over the head... "And God pays back those loans in full!" Oh how I needed someone to pray over me that day!!! God delivered full payment on the spot!

God needs us to be His agents of mercy and grace. He needs us to be vessels of His love. He is counting on you and me to lay aside our agendas and accomplish HIS will! Ministry is tough and when we're making progress, you better believe we are a target for the enemy. Friends, don't lose hope, don't give up! We have a calling on our lives! Many adjectives could describe Ernie Haase and Signature Sound, but throw "conventional" out the window! "Original" fits best. Known for stylish appearance and energized performances, Ernie Haase and Signature Sound ascend charts, claim accolades and tour the world with music that transcends genre, age and culture. Since the journey began in 2003, EH&SS have been honored by numerous awards and nominations. They have won Dove Awards, achieved gold status in record sales, and have even been nominated for a Grammy! The word "zealous" perhaps matches "original" in description. Beyond passionate when it comes to God, music and people, Ernie Haase is advancing into new territory with the love of Christ. With a new album in hand, Sig Sound could be described as "armed and dangerous" - a serious threat to the enemy camp!

Twenty-five years ago, Ernie started out with the quartet of his dreams! "I was very blessed and very fortunate to have as one of my very first jobs to be with what I consider to be the Cadillac of all quartets-The Cathedrals," Ernie recalls. "George Younce and Glenn Payne hired me in April 1990 and man I was young! I was

skinny, green, wet behind the ears and just so excited to be singing with THE group that God used to bless my heart and make me fall in love with this music." Shortly after joining the group, Ernie became Younce's son-in-law and was greatly influenced by the life he lived. George Younce lived out the common-sense advice and life lessons he passed to Ernie.

The Cathedrals retired, but passion drove Haase to assemble a group of like-minded men to form a Signature Sound. (AND a Signature Sight!) The sound consisted of tight harmonies and time-tested songs and the sight included trendy clothes, dazzling lights and thrilling action! Ernie Haase, Ian Owens, Doug Anderson and Devin McGlamery blend their unique style with deep gospel roots and add the love for God and people as fuel.

When Ernie formed Signature Sound, being different just for "different's" sake was never part of the plan. "It wasn't a calculated thing," Ernie explains. "It's got to be IN you... part of you at some level for it to be believable and for people to believe you have some level of authenticity. People see what Signature Sound has become and some of it is planned- but a lot of it is this: I love flashy clothes.

I love a nice suit and I love having a good time and performing when I sing."

And...Ernie always has, but his spirited personality wasn't always a good fit for the other groups he sang with. "There were times as an employee (and I wasn't beaten over the brow or anything), but there were times I was called to the back of the bus and told, 'Hey Ernie, I think you're being a little over exuberant with your hands on that particular song-bring it back a little bit," Ernie grins. "I remember there were three or four times that Glen said to me'l hate to do this, but as owner of the group-the suit that you're wearing isn't Cathedral you need to go change clothes- You just wasted your money' and then he'd laugh at me," Ernie laughs. "Had it not been IN ME a little bit, I don't think I would have explored new boundaries and tried to bring my personality to what the group is."

Sig Sound blurred the line dividing Southern Gospel and Contemporary Christian Music topping both charts simultaneously with their first DVD. The guartet knocked down the fence dividing the Christian and Secular worlds by singing the National Anthem at the Atlanta 500 two years in a row. Ernie Haase and Signature Sound are now smashing the borders separating America from the rest of the world. NASCAR to Europe- now that's a broad audience! How did that happen? It's a "God-Thing!" Ernie shares: "You always get invitations and nine times out of ten you just don't think they're ever going to come about because of logistics, conflicts in the calendar, or sometimes the finances can't afford to take a crew of twelve or fifteen guys. When the invite comes in you're not cynical, but you're like... if this is meant to be, we're going to go there, but not everything happens. It must be led of the Lord. You get an invite, pray about it and you kind of let it simmer on the stove, let it ferment on the vine so to speak and you just wait and see if the Lord brings it to fruition." Sometimes it takes two or even three years to plan events. "You just have to plan your calendar the same way you plan your life- and that's by faith," Ernie adds.

Recently, EH&SS completed a European tour playing in nine different countries. The invitations to perform abroad continue to roll in. Currently, a three-day campaign in India is in the making. Also- In March, Sig Sound will be performing at one of the largest outdoor Christian concerts- Easterfest in Australia. Sig Sound is on the same program with Casting Crowns, Michael W. Smith and Third Day.

EH & SS completed their most recent tour and the time has come to fire new bullets. (yes, bullets!) Ernie explains: "We've been together ten years and the last two we've

been paying our tribute to the Great Cathedrals finishing our tour last month....So- we needed some new bullets to shoot!"

New music and a new tour are on the way, but the guys are not forsaking the classics. "We've got the older songs that people come and love to hear and we will always sing those like 'O What A Savior' and 'Get Away Jordan,' but our people who follow us are ready for another SIGNATURE sound. They're ready for us to give them what brought us to the party," says Ernie.

"With 120 concerts a year- 80 of them are in northern America and those other 40 dates of the year, we're literally around the world," Ernie shares. The international crowd is young- less than age 40. "I feel old at a concert in the international market," Ernie laughs and continues, "You've got to be able to give them something that is going to keep their attention. We don't change who we are, how we dress or our approach, but you have to have some content. To be able to reach a broader audience, you have to give them what THEY expect and hopefully we have and will exceed that."

HERE WE ARE AGAIN, hits stores February 7, 2012 with pre-order sales beginning January 10th. The album is destined to delight current and new fans here and overseas, but it is also bound to change lives! "Out of the twelve songs, we did three remakes- three classics," Ernie explains. "I love going back and grabbing a classic and giving it our feel." Sig Sound brought back "Stand By Me," "Swing Low Sweet Chariot," and Ian brought back the classic. "I Believe."

"We have nine brand new songs of which I had the opportunity to help on seven of them," Ernie says. "They were written with scripture in mind, our crowd in mind and they were written out of life experiences- Out of our fears, hurts, failures, questions and our victories." Everyone has their own personal taste in music, but some songs have the ability to rise above genres and culture. Ernie explains: "You may not be a praise and worship fan, but when you hear a song like 'I Can Only Imagine, you realize that it is something that transcends Southern Gospel and Contemporary Christian Music and speaks to the world. That song spoke to the world. And that's probably one thing that I can brag on the most about this record that hopefully it will transcend without divorcing from our fan base to a whole new wider world of people."

"Some of the clichés we say in the Southern Gospel world didn't work in Romania, in Berlin, Germany or in the Netherlands." Ernie continues, "It's been an eye-opening experience going around the world realizing some of the stuff we do here that works in Atlanta, GA doesn't work

there. It doesn't mean Altanta, GA is less educated, it just means that several things we do on a record are just very cultural and only our culture understands it. I didn't ask for it, but it looks like the Lord has opened the doors for us to go to a broader audience, so therefore I needed more ammunition to reach the audience that we're singing to."

Bullets? Ammunition? How about a grenade- well maybe a bomb?! With track twelve, "Any Other Man" the word "traditional" joined "conventional" and got tossed out the window! This explosive number captures a live performance complete with an introduction by interpreters and a Romanian crowd gone wild! Energy can be felt seeping from the speakers on this one! Ernie explains: "We were in Bucharest, Romania and the crowd was just going crazy! It's Signature Sound doing what we do best and that's performing live! The song itself is probably one of the strongest lyrics I've ever written and it came out of a circumstance in my life. You're either in the front or in the back. If you're in the front sometimes you've got a bulls-eye on your back! There was a time period a while back that I just felt like there was a bullseye on my back whether or not that was warranted, but it got to me and I got mad. I struggle just like anybody

who struggle with their temper, injustice, road-rage or whatever.' So- we made it a southern rock kind of song and it's been resonating and probably, in my opinion, is going to take us to a broader audience."

Another song destined to change lives was birthed out of a deep understanding of the biblical truth-"The goodness of God leads to repentance!" A while back, Ernie invited 200-300 friends to a retreat. Once there, the guests realized the invitation was conditional. Ernie boldly told the audience to leave if they planned to pass judgment on anyone for anything. "If you're perfect and you've got it all figured out, please leave... because I don't," he said. Those who weren't perfect were invited to stay and the location was claimed as a safe place-as a hospital for the sick. Ernie's moving message fell onto the ears of Wayne Haun and resonated with his spirit. Up from the heart and off his fingertips came the song, "You Are Welcome Here."

"The church has to be held accountable for the culture and what's happening is... it's becoming less and less godly because we don't want to be challenged with the people who come to our church," Ernie explains. "It's not my job to condemn and try to figure everybody out and set them straight. My job is to write songs in such



else with my temper. I told Wayne {Haun} 'I would like to say what I think, but I can't because Jesus didn't do that and I want to pattern my life after Him.' We kept talking... 'Any other man would have done this... or that, but Jesus wasn't any other man!' We wrote the lyrics and music and it first it was nice and fluffy. After listening to it, I went back to Wayne and said, 'This is not going to work. I cannot drive home this message with red-blooded men

a manner that leads to God's Spirit." The song, "You Are Welcome Here" does just that.

There is something for everyone on this album. It includes styles with thick orchestration to big ballads, to big band and even one that's a little country with an acoustic feel. Doug's favorite is "Any Other Man." Doug says, "It is SO different than anything we have ever done and has a message that speaks across generations." Ian

has a harder time naming a favorite but says he'll go with "Sometimes I Wonder." Devin's pick is "I've Been Here Before" simply because it speaks to his heart. Ernie's favorite? Well... probably all of them! Ernie says, "I'm excited about the new record. I could tell you things like

Devin loves what most people dread or totally neglect and that's working out!

Even with a crowded calendar and international travel, juggling family and ministry doesn't seem to be much of an issue. These guys have been singing for so long it's just a normal lifestyle. Ian says, "Megan and I met while I was singing/traveling. It's all we've ever really known as a family. I guess I'd say juggling family and ministry is just lots of face time with the kiddos when I am home and really high cell phone bills when I'm not."


"My family is my life and I feel when that is in order, the ministry will be where it needs to be! And my family loves what I do as much as I do," Devin adds.

Tis the season after the season. We've made our mad dashes through the holidays and its hectic times and now it's a brand new year. Many of us reflect on the previous year and look to the new one resolving to make some changes and do some things different. Here is a question to ask yourself as you approach the New Year and make your resolutions: "Have I been a squirrel?"

During the past few years my wife and I have determined we are both squirrels. Yep, those little rodents that for some reason run into the middle of the road and when faced with oncoming traffic can't decide which side of the road to run to. So they just stay in the middle and zig-zag back and forth, overcome with the indecision of which side of the road to run to. Car coming! Car coming! I think if we look back at humanity, it's a common trait we share with the squirrel. I can't think of any two mammals besides humans and squirrels that won't run directly to safety when in danger! The children of Israel, once free from slavery, left Egypt to zig-zag across the wilderness in constant indecision of whether to continue to the Promised Land or return to Egypt. Peter was an eyewitness to many miracles from Christ and even walked on water, yet denied even knowing Jesus when asked if he was "one of them." Paul said in Ephesians 4:14 that we should no longer be children, tossed to and fro and carried about with every wind of doctrine.

Being FAITHFUL and DILIGENT is one of those messages that have been popping up in my life for the past few years. As I look back over the years of my life, I have had many 'shoulda', 'coulda', 'woulda' moments. 
Jason selected a number of our favorite church hymns, and picked


member is featured on one or more songs and it is a blessing to hear Gold City at the top of their game.

Because the event lasted two nights and featured many groups, we presented the Friday night happenings in the December issue and now we'll cover the Saturday event in this one. A large crowd returned for the second night of Voices Won's Anniversary Singing. Voices Won, Greater Vision, Mark Bishop and the Perrys were the featured groups.

For more than 85 years, the Lesters have presented an example of servitude and Christ-like attitude with their Southern Gospel music ministry. Beginning in 1925, shortly after their marriage in late 1924, Harvey and Opal Lester began singing and playing Gospel music. When their son Herschel was old enough, he joined Harvey and Opal (Bobo) singing at all the local missions, retirement homes, churches and nursing homes in and around St. Louis, Missouri. Thus began the ministry of the Gospel singing family, the Lesters, and one of the industry's most respected and dedicated Gospel groups, often called the Missouri's First Family of Gospel Music.

The Lesters acquired a music store and began teaching music in St. Louis. They promoted the need for professionalism and correctness in playing and singing, especially in Gospel music. They worked hard to help other singers and urged many to sing Gospel music. One thing the Lesters taught and stressed were the old fashioned singing schools and learning to sing shaped notes. Before his passing, Herschel was disappointed that the singing schools seemed to be a thing of the past, very seldom taught today.

Today's group; Brian Lester and his sister Ginger Pitchers are joined by their sons, Jonathan Lester and Evan Pitchers, carrying on the legacy of Harvey and "Bobo" Lester and their father, Herschel. Brian Lester and Ginger Pitchers are fourth generation Lesters, and their sons are fifth generation keeping the family heritage alive. Over the years, various personnel changes have brought some very gifted singers to the group. These talented singers added their own style and testimony to the front line of the Lesters, and as each one moved on to individual pursuits, they took with them part of the Lesters' ministry.

Brian said, "We have been so very blessed down through the years to have some of the best singers in any genre of music. Every one of them brought something special to the Lesters and we are forever grateful to them." Ginger agreed, and commented, "I have been pleased to know each of the people who came to us for a season. I call each of them friend, and they were so much a part of our family."

Both Brian and Ginger are grateful for the fact that their children are part of the family ministry. "My daughter,


for us, and certainly knows how to get the best from each of us. We're really looking forward to getting in the studio again."

# Eating Clean: It's in The Bible!

"Bless the Lord, O my soul...who satisfies your mouth with good things, so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's" (Proverbs 103:1, 5)

Jesus, being a devout Jew, did not eat pork. In fact He used pigs as receptacles for the demons within the Gadarene demoniac (Luke 8:22-39). The man was set free when Jesus evicted the demons from him and sent them into a herd of swine. The pigs were destroyed when they plunged off a cliff into the lake and drowned.

God didn't arbitrarily forbid the Jews from eating certain foods. God doesn't operate under the law of "whim." Every meat deemed unclean by God is unfit for human consumption. In 1953 science caught up with that truth when Dr. David Macht of Johns Hopkins University published a study on the toxicity of animals listed as clean and unclean in Leviticus 11 and Deuteronomy 14. He ran tests to determine their toxic effects on a controlled growth culture in his laboratory ("An Experimental Pharmacological Appreciation of Leviticus XI and Deuteronomy XIV," Bulletin of Historical Medicine, Johns Hopkins University).

Not surprisingly, every animal God calls toxic science finds toxic, too. Unclean animals include: swine, horse, rabbit, squirrel, dog, cat, bear, opossum, groundhog and rat. The clean animals (cloven-hoofed and chew the cud) include cattle, goats,

sheep, oxen and deer. Interestingly, the blood of all animals is more toxic than the flesh. God commands us not to eat the blood of animals (Leviticus 19:26).

Many of the animals God calls unclean eat flesh or have parasites that would sicken or kill humans. Pigs, bears and vultures eat decaying flesh. Wolves, lions and other predators often prey on the weakest, sickliest animals in a herd. Clean birds include poultry (chicken, turkey, geese), ducks, pigeons and quail. Many supermarkets now carry chicken raised without antibiotics or hormones such as the MBA Brand Smart Chicken® or Beyond Organic products. We certainly don't need to be ingesting synthetic estrogen (a hormone typically given to chickens). Pre-menopausal, perimenopausal and menopausal women need to be especially aware that hormonal imbalances may be linked to synthetic estrogen and estrogen-producing foods.

Instead of pork, how about turkey franks or kosher beef hot dogs once in a while? There are many good soy products available now from soy sausages and burgers to taco "meat" and chili. A stir fry with fresh vegetables, crumbled soy burger, slivered almonds and

water chestnuts is a quick and easy dinner your family will love. If you're concerned about estrogenproducing foods, try fermented soy products such as tempeh instead of regular soy.

## Archeological Evidence of Benefits of Eating Clean

Moses, who received the dietary and hygiene system from God, had been trained as a prince of Egypt in the most advanced medical system of his day. Yet Moses did not advocate the Egyptian way of avoiding disease. Forensic examinations of mummified Egyptians show that the wealthiest Egyptians didn't seem to benefit from the best that their physicians had to offer. They suffered from many of the same diseases of our day. Many researchers believe this is due to their taste for unhealthful foods and disregard for hygiene, contrary to God's directive to the Hebrews through Moses. In short: Eat clean, eat lean and always eat green (lots of veggies!).

and other moving songs performed and all were astounding. At one point, the hilarious Mark Lowry became serious and was the first on his feet with hands lifted during the Isaacs' performance of "Waiting In The Water." Also, the elegant Gloria Gaither spoke directly to the Father and was visibly awe-stricken with who He is! As she prayed, time stood still- but not for long!

As the clock advanced to midnight, The Gaither Vocal Band sang in the New Year with "Let Freedom Ring!" The party continued with balloons descending and Homecoming Family members flooding the stage. With an excitement level maxed out, music tipping the top and joy overflowing- One can only imagine what Heaven will be like! Thank you, Mrs. Boatman, you're right! A Gaither Concert perhaps is the closest thing to heaven that we'll experience on this side!

Brian Free and Assurance is a multitalented, award-winning Southern Gospel group with a unique sound and a drive for excellence. Any listener unfamiliar with this genre of music will quickly learn two things when Assurance takes the stage. First, all accolades are highly deserved. Second, none of this group's rise in popularity and musical distinction was achieved through dilution of the message. For Brian Free and Assurance, being a Christian music artist is not just a job. It is their life and a reflection of a lifestyle and strong, abiding faith. The recent release of the vinyl LP A Season To Remember, is a showcase of the group's highlights of eighteen years of making music. This walk down memory lane is not a type of project containing only one or two must-hear tracks. For the Assurance aficionado, the recording contains all your favorites. For the uninitiated, the project is a recording of all that is Southern Gospel: strong lyrics,

unforgettable harmonies and music that will keep you humming for hours. For the members of the group, A Season To Remember takes them down memory lane and the changes that have happened within the industry.

Tenor and owner Brian Free, along with Bill Shivers, lead for the group, have both seen an evolution within Southern Gospel. Other than the disappearance of platform shoes and bell-bottoms, Free says there are other positive changes as well. "If I had to narrow it down to one thing, for the most part, it's the ministry. It is more ministry-oriented now than it was 35 or 40 years ago, which is very, very good. It's been a long time coming, but it's here."

Shivers agrees that Southern Gospel artists have become more cognizant of their responsibility to present the Gospel. "I've been with Brian for ten and a half years, and before that I was with Heaven Bound for four and a half years. So I've been around

about 16 years, and I've seen quite a few changes in that area in the short amount of time I've been here."
Free laughingly adds, "People come and go in this industry every six months, so sixteen years is a long time."

When asked to describe to someone what is Southern Gospel, and to define the sound of Brian Free and Assurance, both men find it difficult to respond. Free says, "You can't describe 'Southern Gospel.' That's like saying, 'Narrow down Contemporary Christian Music.' You can't do it because there are so many different categories. When they hand out the Dove Awards, there are more than 15 different categories." Brian Free and Assurance has been a recipient of the prestigious Dove Award, given to them for the song, 'Long As I Got King Jesus.'

"We don't fall under the umbrella of hard-core Southern Gospel, but we are in the industry," states Free. "We are not Contemporary, but we are not Traditional Southern. We are somewhere in-between. We do the traditional quartet music and some traditional songs."

Shivers says, "I like to think that we have created our own niche. And that's a good thing."

"Absolutely," continues Free. "If someone hears us on the radio, I want them to know that's us. We don't want to sound like one of twenty other quartets. We like music that is a little more progressive. The more creative you are, the more progressive it is. And if you aren't going to create, then what fun is music anyway.

"That's the artistic side of music."
Shivers adds, "It makes it more enjoyable for us as singers."
The creative process comes into play in the recording process.
When creating a new project, the group members spend a lot of time choosing songs that will fit the group. Their previous recording, Never Walk Alone, has many incredible tunes with enjoyable melodies and lyrics that touch the mind and emotions of the listener.

Free notes that regardless of the melody, the words are the most important part of a Gospel song. "That is 99% of it. We have to remember it is 'Gospel' music and that comes first. The music is just the vehicle to carry the Gospel." "The music is important and you want to do the very best you can, spending time arranging and producing, making it what it needs to be..." Shivers adds, "...But it all should enhance the Gospel lyrics." "Because without the words, what have you got?" says Free. "When we sing the song, the message is most important," continues Shivers. "As Brian says every night on stage, each one is like a mini-sermon. You want that threeto four-minutes to count for every song. You don't want it to be wasted." The songs recorded by Brian Free and Assurance can become very personal to group members. Free says, "With each songwriter, the music they write reflects where they are at that time. That is not necessarily the case with groups like us who don't write our own music.

It is, in certain ways, for our ministry because the songs we choose and that really appeal to us reflect where we are. God has never failed to send great songs. We have some great writers that write for us who are very consistent."

Shivers adds, "We have been blessed with some wonderful, anointed songs. Where the message of one song might hit Brian one way, it might affect me differently. The Lord speaks to us in different ways." The title track of Never Walk Alone was one song that touched the group deeply. Shivers says, "That song ministered to us majorly because we had been going through a tough time. Three of the guys in the group have lost parents recently. Brian lost his mom and his dad within six months. I lost my dad back in January and Jeremy lost his dad two years ago. So God really knew what He was doing when that song came along. It ministered and blessed us. The song was definitely intended for Brian Free and Assurance and it is amazing how God can work through that."



The last two releases by Brian Free and Assurance have been especially well-received by audiences and radio alike. Melissa Flores, General Manager of He's Alive Radio, says, "The Southern Gospel industry is enhanced by artists such as Brian Free and Assurance. Because [they] are fearless in their progressive approach to quartet music, they have coaxed in an appreciable number of listeners to the genre. Their latest single, 'The Part Where You Come In' is a glorious hybrid of country instrumentation and quartet vocal harmonies. A number of He's Alive listeners have commented how they appreciate artists who are willing to modernize."

Some people are under the mistaken idea that Southern Gospel listeners are, as a whole, very selective and staid in the style of music that they find appropriate. The audience of He's Alive Radio have proven otherwise by these comments regarding Brian Free and Assurance. Flores continues, "Although we love the traditional sounds that Southern Gospel is known for, people like

Brian Free and Assurance give us hope that the genre will live on for another generation. Brian Free has pushed the envelope, creating space for other avante garde groups to express their creativity. Southern Gospel music is not at the risk of losing its identity over artists like Brian Free and Assurance. As the genre has evolved, it has produced a number of talents that possess certain expected key qualities, but a characteristic sound. Brian Free and Assurance embodies the heart and soul of Southern Gospel: rich harmonies, solid gospel lyrics, and a radio presence that draws in listenership."

As the group continues to 'push the envelop,' Brian Free is conscious of retaining that certain indefinable it factor that makes Assurance the unique quartet with a sound that people recognize. Free notes, "We are always looking to reach out into different areas and people we haven't reached yet with our music. If something doesn't grow, it eventually dies. So we want growth. Stylistically, we plan to stay where

we are. We have found our niche. Not everybody is going to love it, but every style doesn't appeal to every body."

Shivers adds, "That's why there's bluegrass and country and other styles. It would be boring if everyone was the same."

"If everybody liked the same thing, there would only be one kind of automobile made or one type of house," laughs Free. "But we need to keep fresh for our supporters. Our fans and friends are the most dedicated ones. We love them more than anything in this world. They are the reason we are out here."

Shivers agrees: "They take care of us like family."

Free adds, "So we continue to do what we do and pray that God will continue to use us more effectively and that we don't grow stale or stagnant. We don't want to sit still." Even though Free notes that the group's style isn't everyone's forte, the increasing fan base and continued award nominations prove that Assurance is appreciated nation-wide. Free comments, "Our





music allows us to go into a lot of places that will not have traditional Southern Gospel. What we do may be more appealing to the church crowd and I guess we are more of a 'church crowd'-type ministry. We are not a dancing-fluff, fair-date, putting-on-a-show, type of group. We are more at home in the church, and we are more focused and more effective when we can present our ministry from our hearts, present our songs and testimonies and who we are."

"Our heart is in the church market," continues Free. "We do a lot of concerts and we have a good time and we do the same program in a church or an auditorium or a fair." Shivers affirms, "We love to do those too!"

Free laughs, "We do the same thing, so if they don't like it, they know what they are getting so they'd better look out!"

Shivers adds, "You don't have to wonder what you are getting with Brian Free and Assurance. We let the people know where we stand and what we stand for, by our music."

For these artists, singing the Gospel is not just a job. As the title of one of the tracks on Never Walk Alone states, it's their 'life.'

Brian Free and Assurance is an example of a group of artists committed to their calling, their faith and their music. Stay tuned for Part Two, in which Bill Shivers and Brian Free discuss the ministry of Southern Gospel and standing strong in the message of God.

## Soups On!

Did you know January is "National Soup Month?" We've collected a few Soup Recipes for our readers to enjoy during the cold wintery months ahead!

#### Cindy's Turkey/Chicken Soup

Lorraine Walker Shares:

"One charity in our City, City Kidz, has a "Soup Fest" on Feb 2 every year. Dozens of local restaurants cook wonderful soups, and every one who goes gets three tickets with their entry fee to try 3 different soups. Rolls are free, lol. It's very awesome, always packed and a great way to let people know about the work they do."

#### Directions:

Take Chicken Broth (from cooked turkey/chicken and add 4 cartons of Campbell's chicken broth) (\*\* if starting from scratch: cook 6 chicken thighs in 8 cups of water, 1 tsp. poultry seasoning, ½ tsp salt, ¼ tsp pepper: cook on medium heat for 1 hour, remove skin & bones, cube chicken) (\*\* or for a simple start: use 6 cartons of Campbell's chicken broth)2 -3 cups of cooked & cubed Chicken/ Turkey1 large onion, diced1 ½ cups diced celery2 or 3 large carrots, peeled & sliced 1 ½ cups pasta noodles \*\*or 1 ½ cups of rice or 3 large potatoes, cubed Salt & pepper to taste Poultry seasoning to taste Simmer on low until pasta/rice/potatoes are tender. \*\*Note: for extra calcium, you can leave the chicken/turkey bones in the soup for each re-heating

#### "Tastes Like Lasagna Soup"

Pete Schwager's wife, Staci Shares:

"A favorite soup at our house is Paula Dean's Tastes Like "Lasagna" Soup! This is GREAT to have at home on a cold wintery day and is

also great to take to pot-luck type church activities as well. Make sure you have plenty of French bread or Texas Toast. I actually caught this recipe on TV, but it's also on Paula Dean's website at: http://www.pauladeen.com/. This is a sure family favorite and crowd winner!"

Ingredients

1 lb ground chuck

1 onion, chopped

1 green bell pepper, chopped

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 teaspoon thyme

1 tablespoon firmly packed brown sugar

1 (32 ounce) box chicken broth

2 (14.5 ounce) can petite diced tomatoes

1 (15 ounce) can tomato sauce

2 teaspoon Italian seasoning

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cup broken lasagna noodles

1 (5 ounce) package grated parmesan cheese

2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese garlic crostini,( if wanted-recipe follows)

Garlic Crostini:

1 thin French baguette

1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil

2 cloves smashed garlic

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

#### Directions:

In a large pot, brown beef (ground chuck), onion, bell pepper and garlic. Drain well.

Stir in thyme, brown sugar, broth, diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, Italian seasoning, and salt. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat; reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes. Add noodles and simmer until noodles are tender. Stir in Parmesan cheese.

Staci says: "I leave mozzarella out and let each person put in the amount they want-OR- you can make it fancy like Paula Dean does:" Preheat broiler. Ladle soup into 8 to 10 ovenproof bowls. Evenly sprinkle with mozzarella cheese. Broil soups, 6-inches from heat, 3 to 4 minutes, until cheese is browned and bubbly. Add a garlic crostini slice on top. Serve immediately.

For the garlic crostini:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Cut bread into 1/4-inch round slices. Place on baking sheet and brush each slice with olive oil. Season with salt and pepper; place in oven and bake until golden and crisp, about 15 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool slightly. Rub each side with smashed garlic cloves.

#### David's Kickin' Chili

David Keel Shares: "Not only does my family love this recipe, but my church family loves it as well. Whenever we have an event it certainly is a crowd favorite. We like to serve it with Frito Scoops, sour cream and shredded cheese. I certainly hope you enjoy. God bless you all." Ingredients:

1lb medium sausage

1lb hot sausage

4(8oz) cans garlic roasted tomato sauce

1 c. finely chopped onion

2 cans pinto beans in chili sauce(undrained)

2 pkg. chili mix

1 T. garlic powder

1 T. Chili powder

1 tsp. basil1 tsp. chives1 tsp. Cheyenne pepper4-5 dashes of Texas PeteSalt and Black pepper to taste2-3 c. water

#### Directions:

Cook sausage until it is no longer pink, crumble and drain. In a 5 quart crock pot, mix tomato sauce, chili mix, garlic powder, chili poser, basil, chives, salt and black pepper. Whisk together with a metal whisk or wooden spoon. (I usually build the base while the sausage is cooking.) Turn crock pot on high and add sausage, chopped onion, and undrained beans. Stir these ingredients to get a good mixture. Add 2-3 cups of water. You can stop at this point for a mild rich blend chili. For a little heat, add the cheyenne pepper and the Texas Pete. Stir with a wooden spoon. Cook in crock pot for desired heat.

#### "Creamy Potato Soup"

Chari Watson shares:

Ingredients:

1 can cream of chicken soup

8 oz. cream cheese

4 cans chicken broth

1 lb. bacon, cooked and crumbled

8-10 c. potatoes, cubed

Salt and pepper to tasted

Grated cheese

#### Directions:

Boil potatoes. Cream together soup and cream cheese until smooth; make sure all lumps are gone. Drain potatoes when done, and then add chicken broth. Pour soup/cheese mixture on top and add bacon. Bring to a boil so soup/cheese mixture melts, stirring frequently. Let simmer 20 minutes. Serve with grated cheese on top.

#### Southwest White Chicken Chili

Angela Griffin Shares: "When temperatures begin to fall outside, it's time to mix up a bowl of my favorite Southwest White Chicken Chili. It is a delicious way to make me feel all warm & cozy on the inside." Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp. Vegetable oil
- 4 (1 oz) skinless boneless chicken breast halves cut into cubes
- 4 tsp chili powder
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 large onion, chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1 medium sized green pepper chopped
- 1 can of condensed cream of chicken soup
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 1/2 cups frozen whole kernel corn
- 2 cans white kidney beans rinsed and drained (cans 15 ounces each)

#### Directions:

Heat the oil in a 4 quart saucepan over medium-high heat Add chicken, Chili powder, cumin, onion and pepper cook and stir often until the chicken is cooked through and vegetables are tender

Stir soup, water, corn, and beans in the saucepan and heat to a boil. Reduce heat to low. Cover and cook for 5 minutes stirring occasionally.




