
OK, so this is the first mushy Valentine's Publisher's Point I've ever done. I love you, Kristen, and I'm thankful you are my valentine and my future wife.

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

"Ain't That What It's All About" is an old Hinsons song written by Kenny Hinson. While most songs are written to minister to the saints or to share the gospel to the lost, this number speaks to the artist and why we sing. While some show up to "perform" or put on a show, they can make you laugh and cry almost on demand, is there any meat to what they're presenting? Telling folks about Jesus should be the purpose. 

This is my first time hearing the Holden, Louisiana, native, Greg Sullivan. When I receive these CDs for review, I seldom know what to expect, unless it's someone I know.

If you know a group or soloist, you have expectations. Does it live up to previous releases I've heard? Is this project as good as another project? And so on. In cases like this, it's refreshing – and typically it's easier – to review because I am not judging them based upon any preconceived opinions.

In the case of Greg Sullivan, I was pleasantly surprised. Often, we look at a singer and "imagine" how they will sound based on their appearance. Now I realize how someone looks has no bearing on how they will sound, but how many times have you heard someone say, or maybe you've said to yourself, "He doesn't look like he could sing like that." When I opened the CD, I imagined Greg to have a rich, full voice with more of a low baritone range. Not at all what I imagined! I will tell you that he is an excellent vocalist with a great vocal range.

The project kicks off with "This Ship Was Made to Sail" which is an upbeat, toe-tappin' song that likens the Christian life to a ship sailing on seas stormy and calm, winds raging, and sun shining 'til we reach our treasures and more in our home port Heaven.

We're reminded of the miracles of Christ "Peace Inside" when He fed five thousand, spoke to the stormy seas that rocked and almost crashed that little boat, and of the mad man filled with demons. Christ spoke three little words peace be still. Throughout our walk with Him he speaks those same words to us and gives us that blessed peace inside.

Because of His blood we can say our sins are left behind! "I'm Forgiven." When Satan stands against us, we can look him in the eye and say I'm forgiven, I'm free to live in victory! Greg brings back an old Gold City song and does a great job on it. It's all about what Christ does when He enters our life and changes us. He transforms us from children of the darkness to a "Child of the Light." I've always loved this song and Greg has renewed that love for me in his performance.

The mid-tempo title track "I Know He Can" reminds of the faithfulness of the Lord, ever present, He is Lord of all. Loving us, guiding us through the storms and giving us the sunshine. Ever try to imagine God's perfect plan of salvation? How far God would go to redeem us? The price? He gave His son to pay the price on that awful cross. It was "His Blood" that made all the difference.

For many of us it's been a long time that we've been walking this highway to heaven. We've stumbled, we've fallen, and in some cases, we've strayed off that highway. Just like the prodigal son, we can come running back to the fold and start our walk again. "Beginning Again" reminds us of just that.

"I Just Wanted You to Know" when God called Abra-

ham to lay down Isaac in sacrifice Abraham was obedient. He led Isaac up that hill. Heartbroken, he laid Isaac on the altar and drew his knife to give his only son to God. God did this to show Abraham the price that would be paid for salvation. As we read that story it's a visual reminder to us of that sacrifice.

Everyday we get up and go about life. Some days there are struggles, and some days there's sunshine. There are days the cares of life are just too much to deal with and the storm rages around us, but we can find "Peace in the Shelter" of His arms. On this mid-tempo cut you'll be blessed and encouraged.

We wander this old world for so long in darkness, seeking something to fill that empty void inside of us, trying everything we can to satisfy that hunger we don't understand until that one day we find "It's the Blood of the Lamb" that we've been searching for. It alone can fill that void and make us complete and whole.

"Masterpiece" likens Christ to an artist that takes a brush and paints us what He wants us to be. Training us, teaching us with each stroke of His brush, until that day He has painted a masterpiece of our life.

The final cut on this project is a song dedicated to Greg's father. As they worked together day after day on summer breaks from college, at the end of each workday Greg's father would say, "I'll See You at the House." His father is gone now, home with the Lord, but with that blessed hope, Greg is able to say to his father – "I'll See You at the House." What a beautiful promise that all of God's children can claim. We all have loved ones that have gone on before us that one day we'll be reunited with.

Wrap up

I have thoroughly enjoyed reviewing this project. Greg has a wonderful voice. The arrangements on each song have been done perfectly – nothing overdone or over mixed. There's a good mix and balance of styles and tempos. I'll be keeping this on my iPad and I encourage you to give it a listen. I'm sure you will enjoy it just as much as I have. 

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Jeff and Sheri Easter That's What I Call Love

It was 1984. Ronald Reagan was President. Apple released the Macintosh computer. The Summer Olympics were held in Los Angeles, California. The Space Shuttle Discovery launched for the first time. The film Ghostbusters was a hit at the box office. Stevie Wonder singing, "I Just Called to Say I Love You" was popular on the radio as was Magnum, P.I. on television. On the Southern Gospel front, The Hinsons' song "Call Me Gone" topped the charts.

But 1984 was also known for something else. It was the year that Jeff and Sheri Easter met and later got engaged. And for this couple, it was definitely love at first sight.


"We actually met in Springdale, Arkansas at the Albert E. Brumley gospel concert," Sheri recalled. "And I was traveling with my family, The Lewis Family, and we were both back at the product table area. Jeff was traveling with The Singing Americans at the time. It was 1984 in August and I looked over and spotted him and he was just very attractive. I told my mom, 'Do you know who that is over there in that pink jacket?' And I said, 'Don't look now' and, of course, she looked! He caught us looking!" Sheri laughed as she reminisced about that time.

"Jeff is very much an extrovert; he came over and introduced himself to my mom," she continued. "He said, 'Hey Polly, do you remember me? She said, 'I don't think so.' and he said, 'Well I'm Jeff Easter. My dad is James Easter of the Easter Brothers.' Momma then turned to me and said, 'Well Jeff, this is my daughter Sheri.' So technically my mom introduced us."

The trip down memory lane was accompanied by laughter and joking, a hallmark trait of this pair. Jeff recalled how he had already spotted Sheri, and how on that first night, Michael English had fixed his hair so he was styling and was looking good. He told me he was sporting a Burt Reynolds mustache, to which Sheri jokingly interjected that the mustache was bigger than he was.

"I looked at Michael and said, 'Man, The Lewis Family must have like a movie star or somebody traveling with them' she was that striking to me," Jeff said, with a note of admiration in his voice.

"Sheri gave me a picture of herself, an 8x10 picture that she sold on the table, and I hung it up on the mirror on the bus that night, and Michael English said, 'She's way out of your league' and so of course I said, 'Well thank you for the encouragement there, buddy," he fondly recollected.



As both Jeff and Sheri recounted how they talked for hours that first night, Sheri recalling how she told her mom and aunt she was picking out her china pattern, I could imagine how she felt – the dreams she had for the future. I could see the sparkle in her eyes even though I was only hearing her voice. I could sense the excitement she must have felt as she laid awake that night on the bus, recalling the time spent with Jeff Easter. She knew.

The relationship was best described by Sheri in a statement she made to Jeff years later. "I know this doesn't sound like a compliment, but it really is. From the minute I met you, you felt like an old tennis shoe." She didn't have to get used to him; he just always felt like he belonged to her.

And it was no different for Jeff. He knew that night

that she was the one. For a few moments, he was once again 24, boldly approaching "the movie star" that The Lewis Family had traveling with them, staring at her picture on the Singing Americans' bus later that night as Michael English razzed him about her being out of his league.

There may have been a connection that day in August of 1984, but it wasn't God's timing. And if there's one thing I've learned in my life, it's that God's timing is perfect. Although there was a mutual attraction between the two, they were both in other relationships. But as Sheri dealt with the loss of her father, she realized more and more that the relationship she was in wasn't the one she should be in. "When you're in the throes of the toughest times of your life, if you will hold somebody away from you and you don't want anything to do with them, then that's probably a good sign that you shouldn't be with them in the good times too," she explained. On the other hand, she had no problems opening right up to Jeff. He was always a good listener. He was comfortable.

The following month they both found themselves at the National Quartet Convention but spent most of the week covertly looking for each other. "I was playing softball, and I was sitting with Michael English's wife on the bleachers," Jeff remarked. "But Sheri, all she saw was the back of my head and I was sitting with a good looking blonde, so she didn't speak to me at the ballgame." Sheri chimed in, "I respect boundaries." It wasn't until later on that night that they ran into each other as Jeff was on his way out the door. But it still wasn't God's time.

Jeff stopped mid-story. "Was you looking for me? I never asked you that." Sheri replied, "I looked for you that entire week."

As he floated back into his memory, Jeff continued his story, picking up a month later in October of 1984, when he showed up at a Peanut Festival in Dothan, Alabama, and saw The Lewis Family bus, wondering if Sheri would be there. "I walked in. Sheri wasn't with them, and Sheri's mom was there getting ready to go on stage. I said, 'So how is Sheri doing?' Her mom said, 'She's good, she and her boyfriend just broke up.' I said, 'Oh my, well me and my girlfriend just broke up.' I this second, right there," he joked. He asked for Sheri's number. "The Lewis Family recorded a song my family wrote called, 'They're Holding Up the Ladder,' and they came on stage with that song," Jeff continued. "They opened their set with that song, and I was on the pay phone, you know this was 1984. I was talking to Sheri, and they was still doing a three minute song – that's how fast I called Sheri. We talked and talked until I had to go on stage, and then we talked all night." "Kristen," Jeff explained, "You're going to love this. We were sitting in my '77 Firebird in her driveway. We were just sitting there under the street lights, and I finally looked at her and thought this was gonna be the night I kiss her."

He harked back to that day in '84, and in typical Jeff Easter fashion, told me about the line he used on her: "Boy, your lips sure do look soft." Sheri laughed, remembering this as well as her equally cheesy response:



The next day, Jeff was going to be singing in Rockmart, Georgia, and Sheri told him that she'd come over to see him.

Sheri picked up the story from there. "The funny thing is, now he knows I don't drive any place. So for me to get in the car and drive two and a half to three hours above Atlanta to go see him was a pretty big deal. But I drove over to see him and watched him in concert, and we went out to eat."

Where they went is a detail that neither could seem to remember. But what they do remember is how they felt. That's when Jeff really knew – when she would drive that far to see him.

"We were friends and I'll bet we didn't kiss for the first couple of months we were dating. I kept thinking that I don't want to mess it up," Jeff pointed out. "Well why don't you come over here and see?" I could hear the affection still resounding in their laughter, even after all of these years.

Sheri went on to tell me that she had never dated anyone for such a short period of time before things got serious. By December, Jeff had chosen to get her an engagement ring, after only two months of officially dating. "The relationship was only ten months from the day we met until the day we got married, which was crazy because it wasn't in my nature," Sheri said. "But we just knew."

"I knew that he had gone to get my Christmas present, but he didn't tell me what it was. So I asked him, 'Well did you get my present? He said, 'I did.' So I asked, 'Well, can I have it?' He said, 'Yes, it's in the glove compartment.' So I opened up the glove compartment, and he had cued up on his cassette player 'The Greatest Gift



As she had dreamed of being a June bride, once January hit, Sheri started planning her traditional, southern wedding. One of the things she agonized over the most was that her dad wasn't there to give her away. But that turned into one of the sweetest moments of the day for her. When the pastor asked, "Who gives this woman to be wed?" her younger brother stated, "In memory of our father, my mother

of All' by Dolly and Kenny. So this song starts playing, and I opened up the present and it was an engagement ring. And I seriously was so surprised that neither one of us, to this day, can remember if I ever answered him," she stated with a smile in her voice. "We don't know if I ever said yes."

But not everything went according to plan. Her little brother had only athletic socks, no black socks. The time on their invitations was wrong. Her dress got caught in her slip. The power at the church went off



just shortly before the ceremony was scheduled to start. But as Sheri said, "Don't panic, you're going to be just as married afterwards. I've never heard of a wedding that was fool-proofed."

As Jeff talked about his memories of the wedding, he described how he had planned on singing the song, "To Me" by Lee Greenwood and Barbara Mandrell, during the ceremony. "About fifteen minutes before the wedding started, all the power at the church went out. I had the cassette cued up and ready to go. And when the power came back on, the cassette deck went into record mode which recorded over the track – the only track we had. Sheri knew nothing about it. She was in the back getting ready."

Jeff told about how his brother Rabbit had a copy of the track with the rough vocals they did with it, which is what they ended up having to use during the ceremony. "I was crying so much through it that if I'd been singing you'd of never heard my voice," Jeff said. It wasn't until some time after the wedding that Sheri found out that there were vocals on that track. Like any marriage, there have been the "for better" as well as the "for worse" stages. But for them, the highs have far out-weighed the lows. For Jeff and Sheri, the highs included some of the many things they've done while on tour with Bill Gaither, cruises, the Grammy many rounds of surgeries and chemotherapy, he was by her side. "Hard does not even begin to describe how difficult it was," Sheri expressed.

They laughed, and they cried. But they did it together. During some of these times, they found themselves going back to a couple of songs that they had recorded, "Over and Over" and "Praise His Name." For both Jeff and Sheri, the song "Over and Over" has been pretty powerful. "When I'm in the middle of a trial and Jeff starts singing that one, it always reminds me that God is faithful through it all."

Jeff added, "We are tested. It's up to us if we pass or not. You have choices. And people make wrong choices just like I make wrong choices. Sheri makes wrong choices. But then again, it brings it back to Sheri. I made right choices, and I got Sheri."

Through the good times and the bad, they loved and respected each other. They communicated. Jeff was still Sheri's old shoe – comfortable, and never needing breaking in. That's what love is.

You could hear it in their voices. In their laughter. In their reminiscing. In the words not spoken.

It was L-O-V-E. And after almost 36 years of marriage, for this Southern Gospel power couple, it still is.

February is the month designated for love. We have featured many articles on artists and couples that were bound by love in one form or another. This article honors and features three gospel music power couples that were bound together by love and for the love of gospel music.

Their contributions are cornerstones of today's gospel music.



When looking at the history of gospel music, one cou ple is at the front in almost all historical gospel music conversations, Mom and Dad Speer: George Thomas (aka GT or Dad) Speer and Lena (Mom) Brock Speer.


Born in 1891, Dad Speer began his music career as a child. His father was a fiddle player and he learned most of his musical knowledge form the all-day gospel singing conventions that were commonplace at the time. At a shaped note music convention, he met Lena Brock, age 14 at the time. After serving in World War I, Speer returned to his roots. He married Lena in February of 1920.

The Speers began full time music in 1922 after moving to Double Springs, Alabama. The first configuration consisted of GT, Lena, GT's sister Pearl, and her husband, Logan Claborn. As their children matured, they joined the group as well.

In later years, four children – Brock, Rosa Nell, Mary Tom, and Ben – followed their parents' footsteps and became outstanding professional musicians in their own right. It seemed as if every day of their lives together filled with family and gospel music.

The Speers reached audiences throughout North America with their sincere, skilled performances and countless gospel albums. Among them are classics such as "Heaven Will Surely Be Worth It All", "Time Has Made A Change" and "I Am His and He Is Mine."

Mom and Dad Speer's theme song, "Won't We Be So Happy?" gave a glimpse of their love for each other, their faith and music. Dad's smile and calm demeanor always glowed when he sang to his Lena.




When visiting prior to her passing, Rosa Nell Speer Powell said, "Dad often told us young'uns, when he saw Mom at that singing convention, he said, 'I'm going to marry that girl.' As long as I can remember, I never heard them have a harsh word between

them. They truly were made for each other. That is how we all wanted it, to be like Mom and Daddy showed us."

Their desire to sing never waned. Even when illness took Dad from her side, Mom never stopped singing. When sickness stilled her powerful musical witness, America's first power couple were reunited in heavenly places. The memory of two loving gospel singers continues to reach audience anew.

The Singing Lefevres were from Smithville, Tennessee. The cornerstones of the group were the brothers Urias and Alphus. Their sisters Maude and Peggy sang with the group until they married. But things changed in 1934 when Urias married Eva Mae Whittington. She was the daughter of Evangelist H. L. Whittington.

Once married, the group name changed to the LeFevre Trio. They sang throughout the southeast in churches and for Eva Mae's father in revival crusades. But their musical career was so much more.

On the road to becoming one of the most versatile gospel music groups, they moved to Charleston, South Carolina, in 1937, and then Atlanta, Georgia, in 1939, where they would remain for the rest of their musical careers(except for a short stint in Philadelphia during the mid-1950's). On WGST radio and during concerts, they referred to themselves as The LeFevre Trio. However, as they added other family members and accompanists, they were simply as The LeFevres.

Urias is said to have been the quiet man of action. With Alphus they branched out in music with various instruments. As members were added, their musical prowess was utilized to make the group have a full live band, including Guitars, piano, fiddle and later the trumpet. A LeFevre concert was exciting and filled with energy.



They were one of the first to have transcribed recordings made in the 1940s. Later they would record on Bibletone Records, Word/ Canaan Records and on their own label Sing.

Urias was the guiding force in Sing Record Company, Atlanta, Georgia. Members of the group flexed their musical talents in the studio as staff musicians. They played on countless recordings including gospel and country genres at their LeFevre Sound recording studio.

Their business acumen was unmatched. During the 1960's, the group's Gospel Singing Caravan, one of the pioneering Gospel music television programs, taped with the Johnson Sisters, the Prophets, and the Blue Ridge Quartet. It was syndicated nationwide, creating more excitement and popularity for the Caravan artists. In later years Jerry Goff, produced The LeFevre Family Show for television.

Their Sing Music Publishing Company printed sheet music and songbooks for the Gospel market. Their ingenuity and forward thinking included their own booking agency to handle artist scheduling and concert promotion.

In later years, Urias preferred to be seen off stage. Eva Mae was forced to manage the group for a few years while Alphus and Urias fought in World War II. That made Eva Mae unique in that she was one of the few women who were part of professional gospel groups in the formative years of gospel music by singing and playing piano but was one of the first women to be the master of ceremonies for any group. Eventually Eva Mae earned the title as the First Lady of Gospel Music.



Eva Mae was the stage voice of the LeFevres but Urias was the quiet guiding force. Their love affair spanned 40 years of marriage and five children, thousands of concert road miles, untold radio appearances and television appear-

ances. A public love affair that was family solid.

Eva Mae and Urias LeFevre were inducted into the Southern Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1997. Given their musical talents, business longevity and gospel music impact, many historians believe Urias and Eva Mae LeFevre opened the doors for many of today's family gospel groups. Their contagious vision and results make them a contemporary gospel music power couple for the ages.

Governor Jimmie Davis is one who holds a spot dear to music lovers – gospel and country. His hit song continues to be a staple. "You Are My Sunshine" is a happy song that was recorded in February 1940. It was one of the first million selling hits of recorded music.



Davis ventured into politics at the urging of the then Louisiana Governor Sam Jones. He became the gov-

ernor of all in Louisiana in 1944. Davis reached across the aisle working with rival factions, appointed conservatives to high office while extending many social welfare programs. By Louisiana law he was unable to serve consecutive terms governor, he left the governor's mansion in 1948, with a surplus of \$50 million in the state treasury while increasing highway spending and increasing education, and healthcare spending. Some people did not like that he did not allow politics to interfere with show business. Davis spent much time traveling to make records and movies, including a depiction of himself in the film Louisiana.

Eleven years later, during the second gubernatorial campaign politics was second to music. His political rallies were handclapping gatherings that featured his favorite songs, especially "You Are My Sunshine," "Live and Let Live," and "Peace in the Valley."

Davis was re-elected in 1960 with a positive campaign that reached Louisiana voters. Davis enacted positive achievements into law, including one of America's most comprehensive education programs for developmentally



disabled children and the construction of new charity hospitals. He continued to make recordings while in office and even reached the Top 20 with "Where the Old Red River Flows."

Known for his country music, and after the death of

his first wife, Governor Davis married Anna Carter Gordon, of the "world famous" Chuck Wagon Gang. Many gospel music historians rank this couple as one of the first real power couples of gospel music. Governor and Mrs. Davis, married from 1969 until his death in 2000 at age 101, were one of music's more remarkable husband-and-wife pairs.

Anna's pure alto was an essential part of the sound of the Chuck Wagon Gang which was formed in 1936. The group spent over 40 years on Columbia Records, sold more than 30 million records, and was inducted into the SGMA Hall of Fame in 2005 and Gospel Music Association Hall of Fame in 1999. Governor Davis was inducted into the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1971, the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1972, the Southern Gospel Music Association Hall of Fame in 1997 and The Louisiana Music Hall of Fame in 2008.

Together their love affair was shaped by music. Each offered a unique talent and complemented the other. Davis with his folksy delivery and Anna with her class on stage and off. Governor Davis campaigned with Anna for select political rallies but stayed clear of the fray of politics that surrounded so many. Always the consummate professionals, they were iconic personalities in public, on stage and with family and friends.

Davis dedicated the non-denominational Jimmie Davis Tabernacle on the grounds of his old school in Beech Springs, Louisiana. There he hosted concerts that became infamous while continuing his folksy demeanor. The Jimmie Davis Homecoming events were listed as must attend events in the south.

The merging of two similar yet different music styles with their focus now on gospel music created the foundation that point towards being a gospel music power couple.

There are many sweetheart couples in gospel music, but none have impacted gospel music more that these three. Each unique, but each united in love of each other, their family and the love of gospel music.



The Parracks

Four Generations Deep

Well, they say music runs deep, and that is a true statement for the Parrack Family. Four generations deep to be exact.

It's the 1950's and John and Vada Parrack are heading to the East Texas State Singing Convention and dinner on the ground as they so often do on Sundays. This is the way of life for the Parrack Family.

One day, as they are practicing as a duet, they hear a third part in the background. Sure enough, it is none other than their 9-year-old son, Johnny (JWP II). Then and there they discovered that he could hear and sing all parts.

The very next road adventure very well might have been to Will Rogers Auditorium to see The Blackwoods and The Statesmen. After all, it was there that it happened – the music bug bit – and when it bit, it bit hard!

Little Johnny Parrack would soon grow up to not only to sing with his parents as the third part in the trio, but would also see his dream of becoming a gospel music singer come to fruition. The singers he went to see in Fort Worth, Texas, would soon become close friends as well as peers.

As fate would have it, a local trio Johnny sang with recorded an album with Joel Gentry, and he sent the project to The Kingsmen. Johnny flew from Arkansas to Asheville, and before they could get through the first song, he was hired on the spot. As a new dad of 3-month-old Jay (JWP III), he accepted the tenor position for The Kingsmen Quartet and moved his family to their home base in Asheville, North Carolina. It was there with The Kingsmen that he went on to win favorite tenor singer and became one of the most recognizable and most loved tenor singers to ever sing gospel music.

"One of the biggest surprises happened when we were singing in Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1976 on a Saturday night. Ken Turner of the Blackwood Brothers came out on stage and told me that I had just won Tenor of the Year for the Singing News Fan Awards.



After being with the group a few years, I mean everyone has an ambition but I thought, well that will never happen and then he came out and told me in the middle of our song," Johnny shared.

"There were so many great memories on the road like the one time we were snowed in on the bus for 16 hours together! I mean social distancing had nothing on us! We had so many friends back then and they would bring food to us and make sure we were fed real good! I am sure the original tailgate party started with The Kingsmen! There was a couple out of Rome, Georgia, that had this Chrysler Station Wagon about 4 miles long and they would pull up, anytime we sang in the area and they would open up the back of that station wagon to a feast! She would make the best homemade lasagna you have ever had! We would dig in!"

Of course Jay had already been introduced to Gospel Music very early on as Johnny had played record after record to him while in his mom's belly before he was even born. Jay got in on the early groundwork of it, often going with his dad on the road on the tour bus at a very young age. Jay would yell from the audience as a toddler, "Sing 'Old Time I Know"" (I'd Rather Be An Old Time Christian) which is still his favorite song that his daddy sang.

Jay remembers the family telling him all about how he would cry and insist on him singing it every night and how Jim Hamill would get so tickled at him and say, "Boys let's sing it for the boy!"

"I thought all little kids had tour buses pull up at their houses! All of the guys then, Ray Dean, Jim, Foxy, Nick, Gary, Squire, Hamill ... they were all my uncles. They treated me like family," Jay recalls. Jay would then go home, pull out all of his Kingsmen records and the turntable, put on his Sunday suit complete with clip-on tie and perform on his makeshift microphone made from tinker toys. "I wanted to be like my dad," Jay shares. "Still to this day, he is my favorite singer and my hero. When he is in the room and I am singing, I'm all shook up!"

With the apple not falling far from the tree, it was clearly destiny that Jay would eventually follow in his


dad's footsteps. But it wasn't until the teenage years at a Sandi Patty concert that Jay knew he was called to do something in music one day. Jay recalled, "After dad left The Kingsmen, he would do music for these revivals. I was in high school but I would go with him from time to time. I was with him when he went to a church in Glencoe, Alabama, which just happened to be Gold City's home church. That is where Tim Riley first heard me sing."

Jay left college in 1993 to accept a minister of music position at a church in Kentucky. The next month, he was engaged, and just a couple of months later, he was called by Eldridge Fox and offered a job by The Kingsmen Quartet.

"In college I was singing with a part-time group and we sang with The Kingsmen a couple of times and Jim would call me up to do a song or two with them. When Gary resigned, Eldridge called and offered me the job, but the timing was just off," Jay explained. "I did not have a peace about leaving the church that I had just committed to and ended up turning down the job with The Kingsmen."

"Just six short months later and a newlywed of two months, I got a phone call one day out of the blue from Tim Riley," Jay continued. "He said Brian is leaving and we would love for you to try out! I went for a try out and the rest is history. I started on Jan 1, 1994, which also happened to be Mark Trammell's first night with Gold City as well."

After much success and winning multiple awards, Jay came off of the road in 2004 after ten years with the group to focus on raising his family. During that



time, Jay was involved in the formation of a group called Vocal Event and traveled part-time while serving as full-time minister of music. It was there that his son L.J. (JWP IV) would join him on stage playing the guitar. This would bring the music full circle to four Parrack generations on stage serving the lord in song!

Jay and Johnny recorded a project together several years ago and rumor has it there could be one in the works in the near future that would feature the three generations together. When asked if anyone ever compares Jay's singing with his dad's, Jay replied, "People will always say you sound like your dad or they still ask me how he is doing. I always say, I never mind being second to the best!"

Johnny and his wife Judy live in Camden, Arkansas, and pastor at Elliott Baptist Church. He still sings from time to time with a local quartet.

Jay is back on the road full-time, singing tenor with The LeFevre Quartet. This past year the quartet sang in Smackover, Arkansas, and at his dad's home church where his dad joined him on stage for a few tunes.

As far as LJ (JWP IV) is concerned, he has no plans of pursuing music full-time, but we will be looking for that project featuring the three generations sometime in the near future.

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



Most of America first met Jon Mullins in early 2020 when he graced the stage of NBC's The Voice and caught the listening ears of Blake Shelton. With his wife, Whitney, supporting him in the wings, America was presented with just a glimpse of their modern day fairy tale love story. And just like with any fairy tale, Jon and Whitney have overcome enormous obstacles to truly soar above the clouds. Their unparalleled commitment to each other and faith in God has served as the main inspiration behind Jon's trilogy of recently released singles. But more so, their love stands as a beacon of light for anyone on the brink of losing hope.

Jon and Whitney's roots can be traced back to a college office building and wrong directions. Ironically enough, the twosome actually lived in three different cities at the same time but never ran into each other until the third city, when they were both attending Tennessee Temple University in Chattanooga. Whitney had walked into the office asking for the way to Walmart. An overzealous and confident sophomore by the name of Jon happened to overhear her request and the spark was lit (even though he gave her the wrong directions by accident). And although he had no interest in a serious relationship

with anybody, Whitney was so convinced that she called her best girlfriends almost immediately, and relayed that she had just met her husband. Jon on the other hand, was guarded due to the fact that his parents' recent divorce left him with a broken heart and extreme fear of commitment. But he knew how fond he was of her. After an exchange of numbers, long conversations and daily quality time soon followed, although it took Jon 2 ¹/₂ years to officially make her his girlfriend. Upon graduation in 2009, she moved back to Indiana and he stayed in Chattanooga, working full time for a reputable jewelry store and playing music. A four year long distance relationship and frequent weekend trips sustained them, even during his move to Nashville to seriously pursue a music career.



In 2013, Jon knew he was ready to make Whitney his forever. A carefully crafted surprise weekend in Chattanooga included the secret congregating of family and their closest friends at Sunset Rock, one of the most beautiful views in East Tennessee. Whitney arrived with the help of her best friend and Jon's sister to see Jon on one knee, next to a 6 foot hand painted banner that read "Will You Marry Me?" This was of course, only after Jon sent Whitney on a scavenger hunt around town to their favorite locations, with clues handwritten on letters. 18 months later, on October 25, 2014, the couple tied the knot in Northern Indiana, surrounded by loved ones and colorful fall foliage. The first few years of marriage were bliss for the young couple, as Jon worked full time during the day and spent nights playing writer's rounds and networking per the Nashville way.

And then, in early February of 2016, Jon got a call at the jewelry store and everything changed.

Whitney, a teacher at the time, had fallen on concrete at her work and hit her head. A visit to the ER showed no immediate trauma and she was told she only had a mild concussion. But the next day, she was forgetting super simple words, couldn't put sentences together, and had such crippling anxiety that she could not get out of bed. They assumed it was just short lived residual effects from the fall and that she would be fine. The headaches, anxiety, short term memory loss, speech and motor function, and panic attacks continued to worsen over the next several days and weeks with no explanation or prior history. Jon describes that block of time as a "wild goose chase" trying to find answers and constantly being led down a winding path of misinformation from doctors, lawyers, and therapists.

"Our world was flipped upside down in an instant and we were feeling hopeless. We were angry and frustrated, wondering if it would ever get better or if she would live the rest of her life constantly having to have a therapist come over and play the 'memory' game with her. Imagine going through the scariest, hardest time of your life and you can't even communicate that with the person you are closest to - the person you live with and trust. She couldn't tell me how she was feeling or what she wanted or what was going through her head. You can't write it down. You can't remember the words. All you can do is lay in bed and cry. I felt so guilty because my other half was suffering, and I couldn't fix it. I felt scared because no doctor was giving us the answers. I felt nervous because no doctor was telling us that she would get better. I got irate because all they wanted to do was find the answer on a prescription pad," admits Jon.

And on top of that, workers comp wasn't taking responsibility, and Jon was the only one working which meant that his music career was put on the back burner. And for a while, so was their faith. Having both grown up in Christian households and having attended a small, tight knit Christian college, both Whitney and Jon loved the Lord and had always trusted in His plan for their lives. But they were at a loss and constantly questioned why God would let this happen.

Through the tears, the fights, the frustration, and the relearning of communication, God brought them a gift in the form of LuLaRoe. Whitney had seen a pop up LuLaRoe ad and decided to give their leggings a try. One pair of leggings turned into \$900 worth of unexpected spending to which Jon nervously said, "Baby, you gotta find a way to make that money back somehow!" Whitney dug into her closet and within the month, had sold \$6,000 worth of her own clothing. Realizing she had an entrepreneurial knack about her, Whitney began selling LuLaRoe. Jon helped her wherever he could which resulted in sleepless nights and a constant rotating work schedule between the both of them for two months straight.



By the third month, Whitney was so successful he was able to quit his full time job and focus solely on music, which every Nashvillian will tell you, is truly living the dream. Going "live" by herself forced Whitney to start remembering orders and comments which, in turn, helped with her speech and motor functions, not to mention her balance and confidence.

"All of a sudden, I'm seeing my wife go from some-

one who is hurting and having a hard time to a BOSS BABE who is healing and making women of all sizes feel comfortable and happy in their own skin. It brought her purpose and life. Not only that, the CEO'S and owners of LuLaRoe treat us like family and are so invested not only in Whitney, but in my music and career. They have hired me to perform at their conventions and conferences around the country – truly a blessing."

And in 2021, Jon is jumping in with arms wide open when it comes to his music. He released a trilogy of back to back singles during the last half of 2020, no easy feat for an artist, considering the music industry took a huge blow and touring life has been put on hold. But his and Whitney's faith sustains any hurdle thrown their way, even a pandemic. And as is expected of a true songwriter, Jon's songs chronicle his and Whitney's life changing story. His September 2020 release, "Better Man", is what the musician calls a desperate "love letter" and says it came out of the most painful part of their relationship.

"We were fighting in our effort of learning how to re-communicate. And one night after a fight, I'm sitting at my keyboard and started playing these four chords over and over again. And all of a sudden, the words literally just flew out of my mouth. I think in our cancel culture of today, you lose sight of what's worth fighting for. And I wanted her to know that I want to be a better man for her. She's so incredible and I don't deserve her, but I am determined to be what she needs."

The second single, "Get To You", was written with Tyler Cain and serves as more of a "broken plea" according to Jon, because he felt they had run out of things to try in their effort to communicate. At one point, he relays that they had grown so cold to the situation, they exhausted all their efforts pretending to be fine to the world, when they had lost hope deep down.

And then came the third and final single, just released this past month, simply called "Survive." Written with Ryan Prewett, "Survive" narrates what it's like to have a problem so strong that it overtakes your life when you're awake, when you're asleep-even showing up in your dreams. Ever the compelling storyteller, Jon felt that the story wasn't quite finished and wanted to let others know that while we all have our struggles, there is a light at the end of the tunnel if you believe and fight for it.



And that is the message Jon and Whitney hope to pass onto others through their incredible experience—that hope exists, even in the darkest of times, if you're willing to ask for help, push through, and sacrifice to get there. Their pivot point came from a visit to a neurologist's office, where the doctor simply inquired about their relationship with God.

"After being so upset and angry, it took a doctor to help us understand that when God sees his children hurt, He hurts too. He knows it's happening and yes, He allows certain things to happen. But He works in crazy ways and sees the bigger picture. God is always giving us something – a love letter so to speak – from Heaven. When he said that to us, a light flickered, and we went from blaming the world and God to depending on Him to restore us fully."

Today, almost five years later, Whitney is "85% recovered" but still suffers from anxiety and panic attacks here and there. Jon credits her with being the "strongest, most beautiful, most courageous, giving, kind and caring person I know. She has made it through this – we have made it through this and come out on the other end stronger because we decided to fight for what we believe in and what we love. We realize that our lives are better together than apart." The pop vocalist hopes that their story and his music can help others know that they are not alone and that they won't always be stuck in the valley at rock bottom.

"Either someone will pick you up and pull you out or you can get out by yourself because you have the strength to do it. People are so much stronger than they give themselves credit for. But don't be afraid to ask support from family and friends. And especially from God because even when we felt like He wasn't there, his hand was guiding us through this whole thing."



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

Cream Cheese Cookies

These soft and chewy cream cheese cookies are simple to make and enjoyable to eat.

Course Dessert Cuisine American Prep Time 10 minutes Cook Time 8 minutes Total Time 18 minutes Servings 24 Author beckysbakingdelights

Ingredients

1/2 cup (8 tbsp) unsalted butter, room temp
4 oz cream cheese, room temp
1 large egg, room temp
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp vanilla extract
1/2 tsp almond extract
1 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

Instructions

In large bowl, combine butter and cream cheese with

an electric mixer on medium speed for 2 - 3 minutes.

2. Add in egg and blend until combined.

3. Add in powdered sugar, baking powder, and both extracts. Blend until combined.

4. Slowly add flour and blend just until combined. Cover bowl with saran wrap and refrigerate batter for at least 30 minutes.

5. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

6. Scoop chilled cookie dough onto silicone (or parchment) lined baking sheet. Slightly flatten top of cookie ball. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are golden brown.

7. Remove pan to wire rack. Cool cookies on pan for 1 minute and then transfer to wire rack to finish cooling.

8. Sprinkle cookies with powdered sugar.

LB: What's the first instrument you tried to play?

TS: My dad started showing me a few chords on the guitar when I was 5 or 6. I decided to be a bass player at 14.

LB: State the instruments you play?

TS: I'm a bass player by trade, electric bass for several



years. The upright bass came along later. I play the dobro on our records and a few songs onstage. I still play a little guitar.

LB: If you could only have one instrument on a desert island, which one would it be?

TS: Probably my old 1945 Martin D-18 which belonged to my grandfather.

LB: Who are your favorite musicians on each of the instruments you play?

TS: I would say Todd Phillips on the upright bass. Great mix of jazz and bluegrass. Jerry Douglas and Rob Ickes on dobro. Tony Rice on guitar. He's probably my favorite musician of all time.

LB: You are a founding member of the multi-award winning, Balsam Range. Bring us up to date on what's going on with Balsam Range.


TS: Well like everyone else we haven't played much since last March. We have kept busy in the studio. We have a new record mostly finished, and have a new single releasing in January. Our song "Richest Man" was the top bluegrass song of 2020. We sure are looking forward to getting back on the road!

LB: Tell us about the radio you've started hosting.

TS: I was missing the sense of community that playing music provides, and I started thinking of some way I could enjoy music and fellowship with all the friends I've made over the last 40 years. I started thinking about our local radio station, and maybe starting a show there. They were excited about the idea, and 10 days later I went on the air with it. It's called Papertown Roots Radio. Paper town comes from a Balsam Range song about our blue collar hometown Canton, North Carolina. I play bluegrass, classic country and a lot of Gospel music. It has been very well received.

LB: You have played with multiple artists in live settings and on hundreds of albums as a session player. Give me your most memorable live performance, as well as your most memorable album recording?

TS: Playing in Tony Rice's band was an amazing thing for me – he was my absolute favorite. Walking on stage for the first time with the Kinsmen was pretty surreal as well. I would have to say my first night with Squire Parsons was amazing as well. I was just so stunned as he sang "Beulah Land" that I almost didn't come in on the chorus!



LB: Which do you enjoy the most; playing live or in the studio?

TS: I love the studio to this day, but the connection with a live audience is the best for me. I learned from two all time greats, Jim Hamil and Squire Parsons. They had totally different styles, but both had a great way of relating to the audience. I still love putting songs together in the studio, and I'm glad to still get that opportunity quite often.

LB: You are a great singer as well. Do you recall the first song you ever sang in public? Who is your favorite singer?

TS: I think i sang "Thank God I'm A Country Boy" at a bluegrass show when I was 11 or 12. Ha Ha. I also sang "Jesus Is His Name" at East Canton Baptist Church about that same time. I was playing guitar with a family group at that church.

LB: When you're not picking and singing, what are you doing?

TS: My son is 12, and a good middle school baseball player. I love every second helping him practice in the yard or on the field. I even have a lefty catcher's mitt! Over the last year I have really enjoyed just being at home with my wife Hope. I've never really had this much time at home, and we really enjoy being together, just being normal. LB: Give us a brief testimony.

TS: God has blessed me so much more than I ever deserved. A beautiful wife, an awesome boy, and so many great opportunities to play music with so many heroes and friends. This year makes 40 years of traveling and playing, the last 14 with my Balsam Range brothers. Overall, the chance to lead my son to Christ this past year is the greatest blessing of my life.
