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



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

This month, Bill Dykes shares the words of Dr. Rudy Holland, a pastor from North Carolina, who has a particularly poignant story to tell. Dr. Holland shares the following in his own words:

"Rudy, you may need to consider getting a secular job with good health insurance and preach as you have opportunity."

These were the words of advice given me by my pastor, Dr. Jerry Falwell, after our son, Paul, was left mentally and physically handicapped resulting from a brain tumor and accompanying complications. My response was, God called me to preach and he will meet our needs.


Dr. Falwell encouraged me to follow the leading of God, knowing he and the church would be there to help in any way they could. For the next 24 years, my wife, Doris, and I, along with our daughter, Angie cared for our son in our home

Our son required around-the-clock R. N. nursing care. During that time, my wife went back to college and received her Bachelor's degree in nursing. We had private duty nurses with Paul for most of the day and we cared for him for what would be the third shift. Our son, Paul, had multiple seizures every day, with many of them during the night. We never slept one night in our home for all those years. We would take turns getting up with our son as he would have seizures

I have been asked many times how we carried on with our ministry while caring for our son. The answer will seem trite, but is profoundly the truth. God gave us grace and strength for the journey. He supplied every need.

The needs were many and beyond our abilities many times. Doris, my wife, has written a book detailing our struggles and victories during those years. Our Paul was to live only a year, according to the doctors, but due to the loving care of my wife, he lived 25 years, dying in 2004, at the age of 31. He had the appearance of an eight or nine year old due to having no growth hormones and no testosterone

The book, "Life's Tragedies, God's Grace" has enjoyed a large distribution, over 10,000 copies, although it has not been sold in bookstores.



God has allowed us to pastor churches for over 40 years, and now I travel each week, speaking in churches. Our ministry is named after Paul, PRH-Ministries. His full name was Paul Rudolph Holland. We define our ministry with the initials of his name: P-Preaching the Word; R- Reaching the Lost;



God gave me 1st Corinthians 10:13 as a life verse, just a few days after my conversion. I was saved in a revival meeting at the Thomas Road Baptist Church when Evangelist Lester Roloff was preaching. The night I was saved, I stumbled onto the verse, 1st Corinthians 10:13. I read it over and over. It has been the verse that has seen me through the trials of my life.

The verse says, "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it."







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Heritage and tradition is incredibly important in the Southern gospel music field. The quartets of today often look to groups of old for inspiration, while putting their own spin on their style of music. One of the groups leading the way is fittingly named Tribute Quartet. This dynamic quartet, founded in 2006 by Gary Casto and Josh Singletary, honors those who have come before and is dedicated to sharing the Gospel through their music. Their mission statement is simple: "preserving the heritage and promoting the future of gospel music."

Tribute Quartet will be celebrating their 13th year in full time Southern gospel music this year. Over the years, this powerhouse group has been delighting fans with their energetic style, humor, courtesy of Josh Singletary, and the message of the Gospel via incredible songs. The current lineup is comprised of lead singer and founder Gary Casto, baritone and pianist Josh Singletary, bass singer Anthony Davis, and the newest member, tenor Gus Gaches.

Casto has been singing full time in gospel music for 36 years and his classic lead voice has captivated audiences all over the country. He also serves as the group's emcee at their concerts. Josh Singletary has been singing in gospel music for 18 years. His unique, croonerstyle voice adds a great dynamic to the group, as does his crazy sense of humor. Anthony Davis has been with the group since 2011, for eight years of experience in Southern gospel music. His smooth bass voice has cemented him as one of the most popular bass singers on the road today. Gus Gaches is no stranger to Southern gospel music, having traveled with both the LeFevre Quartet and Legacy Five. Gaches, who joined the group in January, has 19 years of experience and has become a fan favorite tenor.

These talented vocalists are inspired by many of Southern gospel music's finest. Casto states, "To name them all would take a novel. We all have a vast variety of musical influences. But the group as a whole has influ-



ences from the Cathedrals, Wilburns, and Statesmen, to the Imperials, Oak Ridge Boys, and a plethora of others."

These influences are definitely apparent in their unique sound which can be heard on their latest album. Their latest CD is titled, "Tribute Quartet's Quartet Tribute Vol. 1."

"We paid tribute to quartets and their songs from the past," says Casto. "It was an honor to have Gerald Wolfe as producer on this project."

This exciting project is the group's mission statement in CD form. The current single from this project is doing well on the charts. Casto explains, "Our latest release is "Everybody Come See Jesus" written by Sue C. Smith, Dianne Wilkinson, Donna King, Marcia Henry and Gina Boe. This song is a fantastic way to tell how Jesus impacted the lives of towns and individuals alike. It would've been amazing to have lived then, hear of his appearances, and to actually follow him wherever he went."

"We are currently in the production process of a new CD," says Casto, as he looks ahead. "(It will) be released under Daywind Records and produced by Wayne Haun, later this year."

Tribute Quartet has been blessed with many accolades and more importantly meaningful experiences. In 2008, Tribute Quartet was named Breakthrough Artist of the Year and was also voted the Horizon Group of the Year.





In recent years, the quartet has experienced great success earning several industry awards including 2013 Traditional Song of the Year for "Homecoming Day," which featured former member Riley Harrison Clark, and in 2014 Traditional Song of the Year for "Good News From Jerusalem," featuring Josh Singletary. The group has been nominated for several awards including the Diamond Award for Quartet of the Year.

However, these awards are not the reason the group sings. In their 13-year career as a group, they have been blessed to travel the world and meet and minister to many people. Singing gospel music full time has made a great impact on the members of Tribute.

Casto states, "It's given us great hope and a deeper appreciation for the word and the gospel of Jesus Christ. It has also allowed us to grow new relationships with many around the world."

There have been many occasions where their music has helped people through difficult times. It is each member's hope that they can help people through hard times by sharing the Gospel.

Casto recalls a particularly meaningful story. "I must say one (occasion) would be the time we learned that our song, "God of the Storms" (Gerald Crabb/ Savannah Foust) was instrumental in helping deter the already planned suicide of someone that had never heard our music. It was quite humbling."

It is stories like this one that remind the group of there mission to spread God's word and show his love to all people. "We're constantly being reminded of the trust that we have to put in our Father," Casto reflects. They hope that through their concerts and music that people see Christ and that he loves you no matter the circumstance.

This ministry-minded group shows no signs of slowing down. God continues to bless them with the ability to sing and communicate his Word. Their future is looking brighter with a lot of great things in store for 2019. This incredible group is leading the way for the younger generation of Southern gospel music in a mighty way.

As their website states, "Tribute has remained steadfast in their goal to make great music that is both timely and relevant to the current musical scene and their loyal fan base while never wavering from their God-called mission to share Jesus with everyone with whom they come in contact." Autism Awareness Month Faces of Autism: Nolan Urbates

This year for Autism Awareness month I decided to feature one of my favorite people. He's a fun, humorous, outgoing 15 year old. His name is Nolan Urbates, and I had the pleasure of working with him at the Early Autism Project when I was his behavior therapist.

Nolan is a laid-back kid with interests in video games like Fortnite, and he also loves playing with his dog Bart. We used to enjoy having Bojangle's lunches together twice a week. Since I began writing this "Faces of Autism" article, I knew that Nolan had to be a feature because he was the only client that I knew in the past that might be able to speak from his

perspective. As a mother of an autistic, I know that other mothers of autistics want to know what's going on in their child's mind.

I got to speak extensively with his mother, Claire, about his history and was surprised at her strength. She began telling me that before his birth there were problems during her pregnancy. There was too much amniotic fluid and he ended up being a breech birth.

There wasn't much time for tranquility long after Nolan was born. What Claire and her husband, Ben,

didn't know at the time, but they fully believe now, is that he began having seizures at about six months old. However, he wouldn't receive his formal diagnosis until years later.

Nolan was one and a half years when he started having visible seizures. The first five years of his life, he was plagued with sickness, doctors, and medications. Twelve years were spent going from one costly therapy session to another.

Claire explained Nolan had seizures, fevers, pneumonia, numerous ear infections, sinus infections, upper respiratory infections, and digestive illnesses. He had Respiratory Syncytial Virus (R.S.V.) twice. They struggled with different types of medications. Nolan had multiple surgeries including tubes in his ears twice and then his adenoids removed.



During those early years, he also had significant dental chandeliers installed, as well as additional dental surgery. There were three instances, Claire explained, when Nolan had stopped breathing and had to be rushed to the E.R. by ambulance. During one of those occasions he ended up in the step-down I.C.U. unit at the Children's Hospital.

Nolan's therapies initially commenced with BabyNet, and then Bright Start was next on their therapy adventure. After that, at age three, he moved on to the Developmental Delay Child Development Class at the local public school.

When Nolan was three, they were referred to a hospital in Charlotte, N. C., to try the Ketogenic Diet for his seizures.

"The week we spent in the hospital with him was brutal and full of challenges we never imagined," Claire states. "But it worked for him. Nolan only stayed on the program for less than two months. Maybe it was the diet, maybe it was just timing, but he slowly began to improve."

It was believed Nolan's first diagnosis was a developmental delay, and a speech delay followed that. He had significant speech delays originally, and didn't begin speaking in recognizable form or complete sentences without stuttering until approximately



age five. Claire told me there were years where all he did was scream and cry.

"The first few years of his life were a roller coaster ride. For every step forward he took, he slid five steps behind. The gap between him and normally developed children was significant. I always say Nolan lost the first five years of his life. He struggled (for) the next five to make up the deficit," says Claire.

Nolan has been in therapy for approximately 12 out of his 15 years of life, explained Claire. It all started at around the age of three with the Medically Fragile Children's Program which had P.T. (Physical Therapy), O.T. (Occupational Therapy), and speech therapy. When he started school, he received all three. He completed a light therapy program and music therapy program in his younger years as well. The Medically Fragile Program changed due to insurance and hospital changes, and it then became the Special Care Center. It was under Dr. Brenard at the Special Care Center at about age seven when Nolan finally received the Autism official diagnosis.

Since that time two other doctors have evaluated him, and both have diagnosed him with Autism as well. Nolan also has a diagnosis of A.D.H.D. (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder), Mild Intelligential with a history of seizure disorder. Right after the Special Care Center, he joined the Therapy Place, but once he got the Autism diagnosis, he joined the Early Autism Project (E.A.P.).

"Eventually his services at school ended, E.A.P. ended, and last year Therapy Place, O.T., Speech (therapy), and P.T. ended," Claire states.

"The most challenging is his language barrier," says Claire. "Originally, he couldn't talk at all. The crying and screaming was terrible. We wanted desperately to help him but didn't know how. Now, even though he can talk and can describe his wants and needs, he is reluctant to discuss them and still struggles with memory, face recognition, and descriptions. He was previously diagnosed with ADHD, so his thoughts are random and all over the place.

"(Nolan) is a very concrete, hands-on thinker, so many questions he misses when it comes to conversation and language. It is tough for him to stay on topic. The most rewarding thing Nolan has given us is the ability to see things we would never have seen without him. For example, a common thread with autism is their inability to lie. Nolan is 100 percent honest even when it hurts. He'll ask me, 'Mom, why don't you wear lipstick?' Alternatively, he'll say to me 'Mom, I can't talk to him, he's a stranger!' That person may be okay, (for instance) someone from church. The list goes on and on. He always, always sees the good in people. His heart is the biggest I've ever known."

During their lowest time and much loss in their lives, Claire took Nolan for a walk in the park, and she began to cry. She then heard the almost audible voice of God saying "Get yourself together! This is my will. Not yours. I will not and have not forsaken you. I will guide you. I will show you. You will never be alone."

"As it turns out, every time one door closed, another one opened up," Claire states. The friends that they have met along the way are also incredible.

I asked Nolan whether he would change his autism, if he could. His short answer was, "No!" I am totally on board with his response because I love who he is right now. Taking away his autism would change the Nolan we know and love.

The Nolan that I love can also be comical. I asked him whether he would change anything about himself, excluding his autism. He looks over at his mom and says, "A new mom?" Of course, we all burst out laughing.

It's not hard to love this kid at all and it's evident in the video interview (posted on sgnscoops.com) that I recorded. He's always agreeable to everything, and still that fun Nolan. However, what you can't see, is how he fights so hard to stay caught up with everyone his age.

Claire's favorite verse is Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord. Plans to prosper and not to harm you plans to give you hope and a future." It seems that God has had Nolan's plans laid out long before Claire knew anything about it.

Claire has written a tune that she has titled, "Nolan's Song." It's a song that's made sense to them in tough

times. Even though Nolan can't remember the hard moments, they wish he could remember the people they knew from those times.

I am one of the behavior therapists from E.A.P. that was blessed enough to work with Nolan. He and I had some excellent times at E.A.P., and I wouldn't trade one day of it for anything. Now that he is 15, Nolan isn't able to access as many programs.

Nolan had a lot of great therapists that love him and enjoyed working with him. I know I can speak for them all when I say that we all love and miss you so much, "Noli-Canoli," now that we no longer work with you. May God grant you and your family a long and healthy life.

The best way to help a child with special needs at the Dentist

Many people feel anxiety when it comes to going to the dentist. However, for children with special needs, the unfamiliar environment of a dental office can make going to the dentist much more difficult. I have been practicing family dentistry for 17 years and it is my goal to ensure that a patient is as comfortable as possible during their visit.

With April being World Autism Month, I wanted to highlight some ways to help children and patients with autism at the dentist. Here is a list of tips that my patients have used in the past to have successful dental appointments.

1. Ask Questions

Talking to your child's dentist and asking questions that you may have is essential to the success of your child's dental appointment. Some common questions that parents ask are:

- Do you have any specialized training for caring with patients with special needs?
- What accommodations can be made for my child?
- Do you have any videos or books to help pre pare for my child's appointment?

These are just a few questions to get you started, but no question is a bad one, so ask your dentist anything that may be on your mind. Remember, that as a parent, you are in control of your child's dentist appointment at all times. If at any time you feel uncomfortable or can sense your child becoming too overwhelmed, speak up.

2. Schedule Familiarization Appointments

Familiarization or desensitization appointments are scheduled prior to an actual dental appointment and are a great way for children with special needs to see the dental office and meet the office and staff members. If your child struggles with sensory elements, scheduling one of these appointments could be very beneficial.

Most dentists are more than willing to schedule these as it's their goal to ensure the comfort of their patients. Your child will be able to become familiar with this new environment before any work is done on their teeth. This will make it easier for them on the day of their actual appointment as they will have an idea of what to expect and recognize the staff members.

3. Use Visuals and Social Stories

Visuals can be used in a number of ways to help overcome sensory issues at the dentist. They can be used while preparing for your child's dental appointment and at the appointment itself. Before the visit, you can create social stories about a dentist appointment that can allow your child to see what it may be like. You can also look up photos of your dentist and their office online which is another way for your child to make that



visual connection of what the dentist appointment will be like.

Using visuals during your child's appointment can be a great tool too. If your child has a favorite movie or TV show, consider bringing an iPad or portable DVD player to their visit to help distract them from what is happening in their math. Likewise, a favorite toy or fidget item can help be a great distraction from the work that the dentist is doing.

4. Reduce Wait Times

If your child is feeling anxious about the dentist, it's important to reduce their time having to sit in the waiting room before their appointment. When you schedule their visit, schedule it at a time that is best for your child whether it be in the morning or afternoon. Talk to your dentist and their staff members ahead of time to see if your child can get their appointment started right away. If there is going to be any wait time, ask if your child can wait in the car. This can help ease some anxieties surrounded around their dental visit. Dentists are good about making accommodations unique to a child's needs to feel free to ask for whatever will be best for your child.

5. Establish Dental Care Routines

Having a good dental care routine at home will help make your child's dental appointment easier. Your child should be brushing and flossing every single day. This is a great way for them to become familiar with the feeling of toothbrushes and it's an opportunity for you to teach them of the importance of dental care. Brushing and flossing can be a fun thing that you and your child can do together as it begins to become a habit in your child's life. Another great way to practice good dental care is by eating a healthy, nutrient-rich diet. This is a great way for your child to try new foods and find ones that they enjoy best.

While the dentist office can be an overwhelming place with a lot of unfamiliar sensory elements, there are many ways you can work to make going to the dentist a positive experience Your dentist will be more than willing to work alongside you and your child to make them as comfortable as possible. Embrace the learning experience of taking your child to the dentist and while it may be challenging at first, successful dental visits are possible so never give up.



Sue is gentle and down to earth, and has been so kind and gracious each time we have interacted with her. The imprint she has made on her children's and grandchildren's lives can be felt each time they minister through song as Karen Peck and New River. I hope you enjoy getting to know her a little better, as you read her inspiring inner views.

Cheryl Smith: Please tell us about yourself. Sue Peck Music: I am Sue Peck Music. I was born in Clayton, Georgia, on September 23, 1933. My father was James Wilson Tench, and my mother was Myrtie Loue Freeman Tench. When I was two years old, the family moved to Gainesville, Georgia, where my father owned a barber shop. Smith: What advice would you give to parents who desire to see their children develop into adults who are willing to lay down their lives in service to God? Music: Teach them Godly values and always know that with the Lord's help, you can accomplish anything.

Smith: What are some of the ways you currently support the ministry of Karen Peck and New River? Music: First of all, I pray for them and most of all I pray for the anointing. My husband, Bill, and I try to help out at the product table at the concerts.

Smith: What do you most enjoy doing? Music: We've always had a lot of laughter in our family. I enjoy spending time with my husband, Bill. Music: When I was diagnosed with cancer, I had so many people tell me that they were praying. I could feel those prayers. The Lord carried me through with his strength and his love.

Smith: What is one of the most pressing needs among God's people in these last days of time? What can we do to make a positive difference and fill those needs? 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

Les Butler and Friends:

Earl Wheeler of the Marksmen Quartet

By Les Butler

I've known Earl Wheeler, and his son Mark, for nearly 40 years. Earl has stood the test of time. Through decades of changing musical styles, he has planted a flag in the ground that says, "I ain't changing!"

Earl still sings and teaches shaped notes, and has attended the same church for nearly 80 years. The Marksmen Quartet sounds like a Southern gospel quartet with bluegrass instrumentation. When you hear Earl and the Marksmen today, it's like taking a time machine back 50, 60 or even 70 years. I'm proud to introduce you to my friend, Earl Wheeler.

Les Butler: What is your earliest musical memory?

Earl Wheeler: In 1946, Wahoo Baptist church ran a bus to Lyman Hall School where they held the Stamps Baxter singing school. I went for two weeks. Wahoo Baptist also had singing schools from 1946 into the 60's. They taught voice, theory, piano, etc.

Butler: Did you grow up in a musical family?

Wheeler: Yes, everybody in the family could sing and

my granddaddy was Georgia's champion banjo player two years in a row. My mom played guitar and sang alto, and my dad played guitar and French harp, and he pastored until he was 82. My other grandpa played a harmonica and all of my cousins sang and played.

Butler: How long have you been singing, and do you recall the first time your ever sang in public?

Wheeler: It would have been 1944 or 1945. Grand-daddy sat me on a piano stool and said, "Sang, boy!" And I remember thinking I'm a singer now. I believe that's what I was born to do...sing. The first group I ever sang with was in our church. We had a quartet and had a radio show in Gainesville, Georgia. I did some recording and traveling with a group called the Gospel Hearts Trio in the early 60's. We were Southern gospel; three singers and a piano player.

Butler: Early on, were you more of a Southern gospel fan or a Bluegrass gospel fan?

Wheeler: Both, because I listened to the Blue Ridge Quartet on a radio station in Spartanburg, S.C. and Carl



Story and the Ramblin' Mountaineers on a Knoxville, Tenn. station. We didn't have a TV when I was growing up, so I would go to my bedroom and listen to the radio and read. I ended up being friends with Carl. When the Marksmen recorded for K-Tel records, we recorded a Carl Story song. We sold tons of those albums and he liked getting those checks!

Butler: When did you start the Marksmen quartet, and were they originally a Southern gospel quartet or a Bluegrass quartet? If it started as a Southern gospel quartet, what happened to change your musical style?

Wheeler: I started the Marksmen in the fall of 1967. We were a Southern gospel quartet; four guys and a piano.

Around 1977, our son Mark played guitar, and we had a piano player quit one weekend and we sang with just the guitar and bass. Our tenor singer said he used to play mandolin in a Bluegrass band, so we never went back to a piano

Butler: Your son Mark is a master musician. Do you play any instruments?

Wheeler: I play a little guitar and bass.

Butler: Give me your all-star

quartet, filled with your favorite singers on each vocal part.

Wheeler: My all-star quartet would be James Sego on lead, Steve Gulley on tenor, Jack Laws on baritone and Ray Dean Reese on bass. James Sego could really get to singing and it looked like he was riding a horse. We used to sing a lot with the Kingsmen.

Butler: What is your favorite song and why?

Wheeler: "Oh, Happy Day" (the page 86 in the red book version) because it says it was a happy day when Jesus washed my sins away...and it was.

Butler: You teach shape note singing. When and where did you learn and how is it going today?





Wheeler: (I learned at) Stamps Baxter singing schools. It does well when you can get people to listen long enough to learn it. We are teaching it at our Marksmen Mountain Music camps and a lot of young people are catching on.

Butler: When you're not singing, what are you doing?

Wheeler: (I'm working) with my cows and my VW beetles, and eating my wife Shirley's cooking. She cooks the best biscuits I know of.

Butler: How much longer do you see yourself traveling?

Wheeler: (Until) I can't do it any longer.

Butler: Give us a brief testimony...

Wheeler: I had struggled with my salvation for about eight years (until) finally on August 10th, 1956 the Lord saved me in the morning service of a revival meeting, in the choir at Wahoo Baptist Church.

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This month we are shining the DJ Spotlight on Chuck Bryant. Chuck is the owner of WOTG Radio Network. When Chuck is not on the air, he enjoys going to gospel concerts and traveling to different conventions and events. We enjoyed visiting with Chuck and learning more about his ministry. Check out the questions and answers below.

Vonda Armstrong: Why did you decide to work in radio?

Chuck Bryant: God called me to work in radio. As a former computer technician, I started in radio with a weekly tech show on a local radio show. Given my love of old-time gospel music, it was a natural calling when God told me to start an internet radio station. I love the interactivity with the listeners, listening to new Gospel and Christian country music, and going to the conventions and meeting and working with the churches, the pastors, the artists and the fans.

Armstrong: Why Christian radio?

Bryant: Why not? I'm a Christian first and foremost. I'm an ordained minister. Southern gospel and Christian country music are my favorites. So, for me, it's a labor of love as well as being in service to the Lord. (I love) working with different types of gospel music, whichever they may be, (and) being able to see the fans at concerts and conventions throughout the country. That's why I love Christian radio.

Armstrong: What do you like about the music you promote?

Bryant: I have been a Southern gospel music fan since the mid-80's. The anointing I get from songs from different artists and groups, the feeling of the Lord being inside the song, is a feeling like no other. (I enjoy) attending different churches and concerts, (watching) people; for example being at NQC in 2018 and seeing the artists on the main stage was a powerful feeling. This is why—different artists, different venues and a wide variety of different people all with the goal of worshiping the Lord.

Armstrong: Who were your early influences or mentors?



Bryant: Marty Smith and Erik Remmel

Armstrong: What's your favorite Bible scripture? Why is that your favorite scripture?

Bryant: Luke 4:18 and 19, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, To preach the acceptable year of the Lord."



This was the verse God gave me when he called me to preach. It's the verse I use today for my radio, tv, and people ministry.

The Kingsmen "Victory Shout" 2019 Horizon Records

It's been two years since the Kingsmen released "They Don't Know," and since then three quarters of the quartet has changed. Josh Horrell who had replaced tenor Chris Jenkins, has now gone and has been

replaced once again by Chris Jenkins. Bob Sellers, lead, left to start a solo ministry and is singing select dates with the Old Time Preachers Quartet. Randy Crawford, baritone, resigned due to health reasons. In Bob and Randy's place, the quartet welcomed new baritone Alan Kendall and lead Chris Bryant.

Songs from established songwriters such as Sandy Knight, Kenna Turner West and Dianne Wilkinson, and newcomers Karen Gillespie and Rachel McCutcheon, make this Kingsmen album a must listen.

The album opens with a mid tempo Sandy Knight composition "Running To Win," that will make you want to keep in the race. "Just Climb," slows down the pace to feature what could be a single down the road. "I've Ever Been Glad," features Kingsmen bass Ray Dean Reese and he sings the fire out of it. "Victory Shout," is the first single pulled and is off to a fine start.

One of the highlights of the CD is the re-recording of the "Prodigal Son," that was first recorded in 1980 for their "Chartbreakers" LP. Listening to the new version and the original, Ray has not lost a step or a note. This, I hope, will become a single; it's so good.

Some strong songs and some strong singing from a new batch of Kingsmen will thrill longtime fans, and make fans of folks who may not have been fans before now. Visit the Kingsmen at facebook.com/kingsmenquartet/ and get a copy of "Victory Shout" when it's released and request "Victory Shout" at your local Gospel radio station.

This CD is not available yet; it will be released on June 7th and will be well worth the wait.

The Chandlers are a family group based out of Greenfield, Tennessee. They are: mom, Lana Chandler; dad, Tim Chandler; and their daughters, Lyndsey and Tiffany Chandler. Many may know Lana as Lana Jellison of the group the Jellisons in the 80's and 90's. This group as such has been around a few years, but Tim and Lana have been around since 1992 as Tim and Lana Chandler, their daughters have joined the group in the last few years, and they are now known as the Chandlers.

I first became aware of the Chandlers in the early years of N.Q.C. at Pigeon Forge, seeing them at the showcase. They absolutely blew me away, and that same year they were signed by Chapel Valley, to the Upper Room Record division.

This is another great album the Chandlers have recorded with Chapel Valley. All songs but one are

written by the Chandlers.

Great family harmony right off the bat with the first song "Anchor of My Soul," that tells us that "the one I'm serving, he's the 'Anchor of My Soul.'" Tim is featured on "He Made A Way," a bluesy number of the one who always makes the way.

"Who Would You Be," asks the question: If I had lived in Christ's time, who would I be? Lana is featured on "All The Way," and the sound that the Chandlers are known for, which is "get with it McGrudersstyle music," is heard on this song, and that's quite a compliment.

"Better" is my first choice for a radio single; upbeat and a wah-wah guitar make for a great retro sound. It's catchy, plus has a great message to boot.

"Turn Back To Jesus," "Go Answer The Door," "Seasons," and an a cappella reading of Fanny Crosby's "My Savior First of All," close out the CD. There's nothing finer than when the Chandlers go a cappella. Their last release featured an a cappella version of "Softly and Tenderly" with a new part, and that made it a fresh, new song that sparkled.

Since the passing of Priscilla and Carroll McGruder, I thought that the style of the McGruders would no longer be around. Boy, was I wrong. The Chandlers have a great anointing to carry on this style, both in their writing and singing.

Make sure, DJs, if you're looking for someone fresh to add to your playlist, may I recommend the Chandlers. If you as a fan of Southern gospel music are looking for someone new to discover, may I recommend the Chandlers.

It was in 1927 when four young college men from Keene, Texas, including Ray Turner and brothers Lewis, Waldo and Wesley Crane, got together to form a quartet. All four of them were nursing students at Southwestern (University). During that time money was scarce, and they didn't have enough funds to purchase any musical instruments, so they began singing a cappella.

Being from Texas, they used the name "Lone Star Four" and soon appeared on a radio program on KFPL from Waco, Texas. Later, they joined Voice of Prophecy, a radio ministry that stretches across the U. S. Rumor has it that the radio program promoted a renaming contest, from which was selected the name, the King's Heralds. They now have the honor of being the longest gospel singing group, still active on the road today.

In 1938, the King's Heralds begin traveling overseas, and throughout the years they have performed in over 50 countries and recorded over 100 albums in 32 different languages. There have been a little over 30 men in the group at different times. They have a rich blend,

harmony and balance of their a cappella style, and have added music to their sound, singing wherever God leads them. The members are now: Don Scroggs on first tenor, Joel Borg on second tenor, John Watkins on baritone and Jeff Pearles on bass.

Scroggs began his career with the King's Heralds in 1983. While he was in high school, a friend invited him to a concert. He knew Jerry Patton who was the lead tenor in the group and later this acquainted led him to become involved with the group. Scroggs has now been with the quartet for over 35 years and shows no sign of slowing down. After seeing all of the U.S. through travels with the group, Scroggs says he would love to live in Cozur d'Alene, Idaho, and vacations there when he can.

When asked what his favorite experience has been while singing with the King's Heralds, the tenor recalls, "(I) loved (seeing) the faces of people in China, Australia, New Zealand, Africa and Central America when we



(would) sing in their language."

Borg got involved in gospel music when he was three years old, while singing in church. He sang with Lone Star Four along with Scroggs and also with the group "Still Water." The length of time he has been singing with Scroggs undoubtedly is one of the secrets behind the group's beautifully smooth a cappella.

"My dad and my grandfather and their love for music and ministry influenced me most in music," says Borg, but confesses, "I get embarrassed when I forget the words to a song." The vocalist is married and loves his awesome wife and anything she cooks. He also is a video graphics editor and a photographer, and states Romans 8:28 is his favorite bible verse. Sadly, Borg will be leaving the group at the end of April 2019. His replacement will be Mike Ringwelski.

Smooth bass singer, Jeff Pearles, came from a musical family and he started singing gospel music because of their encouragement. Before joining the King's Heralds, Pearles sang with the Fox Brothers, Palmetto State Quartet and Old Time Gospel Hour Quartet.





"I got started with the King's Heralds when out of the blue they called and asked if I would be interested in singing with them," Pearles recalls. "At that time I was with the Old Time Gospel Hour Quartet."

Pearles looked up to another great bass vocalist. "Other than my dad, George Younce probably influenced me most. He was such a wonderful singer and great (communicator), he made it all look so easy."

This quartet-man loves writing songs, and has written or co-written several throughout the years. The King's Heralds and the Hoppers have recorded his tunes. He has seen a lot of stages, but he says a career highlight was singing in the Philippines to over 30,000 people.

The group's baritone specialist, John Watkins, sang his first song, "In The Temple," at age five at his church, but says he sang very little gospel music prior to joining the quartet.

"I was asked to fill in with the King's Heralds last summer and sang my first concert in Colorado," notes Watkins. "They were pleased and asked me to join the group. I was embarrassed when I forgot a line on the last song of my first tour." Watkins no doubt endeavors to prevent that particular source of embarrassment from happening again.

The youngest man in the group loves to sing happy music that inspires those listening to worship. 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Watch It: The Pilgrim's Progress

The struggles and weight of this world often seem too much to handle. We get bogged down, stuck in ruts, weary from climbing mountains that feel impossible to crest, and sidetracked by the easy way of things. But what happens if we keep to the path God has laid out for us? Will the reward be worth the trials and hurts?

Christian's journey is full of peril and lessons, hardship and grace, and it teaches him about himself, life, and perspective. Will Christian make it to the Celestial City? And if he does, will it be everything he's hoped and believed it to be?

Though written hundreds of years ago, Christian's

epic journey resonates with audiences today, and this animated version makes the story accessible to youth, children, those who've never encountered the Gospel, and believers alike. The movie, coming to theaters for the very first time this Easter, will be shown on April 18th and 20th.

Additionally, this is the first film since the Jesus Movie created specifically to aid missions worldwide. The film-makers have committed to donate the film to missionaries, home and underground church leaders, and others around the world in 100 languages. Since the film is both animated and an allegory, it's a wonderful tool to help missionaries share the Christian journey, particularly in countries where believers often face persecution. It's already being translated into 26 languages, and on Easter weekend, "The Pilgrim's Progress" will be aired on the second largest network in Iran, with an estimated






audience of six million.
