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

Looking for a moment of trepidation? Try the one just before a group of teenagers fresh from youth camp stands up to testify during the Sunday morning service. With microphones. And messy hair.

As a former youth leader and a current parent of teenagers, I know that moment makes the heart race a little more quickly. What are they going to say? Will they be honest? Melodramatic? Embarrassing? Will the truth embarrass me? Will they give great testimonies that bear no fruit a few weeks from now? Where is the nearest exit?

At the recent time I recount in this writing, both the youth of my church (Calvary Assembly of God in Flossmoor, Illinois) and my family were freshly home/back/down from mountaintop experiences. For the youth, it was camp. For us, it was the Branson Gospel Music Revival. Like the teens standing in front of me, I sat in the pew full, worn out, excited, exhausted, anxious, really tired, hopeful, beat. See a pattern?

As usual, each of the teens had a great, personal spin on his or her experience at camp... be it a timid "God was really there," a heartfelt, "God called me into ministry," or a humorous, "God is going to use

me, my messy hair, and my sarcasm to win the lost." My smile was big as they took turns sharing

their joy, and then my heart broke.

One of the young men whom I don't know very well took his turn. He didn't have any big thing he'd needed to be delivered from, nor did he receive any written message on the wall for what God wants to do with his life. What he did say was that he prayed, fervently, for God to renew his passion, excitement, and fire, and he knew God heard him.

As I sat listening, my eyes pouring from emotion and fatigue, I prayed for that boy. I prayed he would never give up on that prayer...because though God heard it, though He always does, I know it's a prayer we

must continually offer through our lives in service to Christ. I prayed also for my own passion, which was clouded by the whirlwind week I'd just had in Branson, where I experienced extreme highs and lows of life in ministry, in Christian brotherhood, and of self-employment.

I felt beaten down and confused, because after a mountaintop experi-

ence, a time set aside to focus on God and His wonders, shouldn't we be rejoicing? As I looked at this teenage boy, I saw a reflection of my own heart. The Christian life has supernatural elements, for sure, but it is full of choices. We are not always going to feel motivated, loved, useful, focused, equipped, special, pretty, appreciated, purposeful, strong, cared for, financially stable, or as if we have any clue what we are supposed to do next. But faith in God means we do

what we do anyway.

Later in that same service, our sweet pastor preached from Galatians 5. Many of us church kids know this as the fruit of the spirit chapter, but the verse Pastor Michael kept going back to was 25: "If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit."

That sounds simple in theory, but in practice, it means more

choices. It means when I don't feel like setting up for a Sunday night concert...when I don't feel like reading my kids David and Goliath for the fifth time...when I don't feel like giving the \$20 earmarked for dinner to the visiting missionary...when I don't feel like forgiving the fellow church member who was so hurtful to me... when I don't feel like putting together a magazine... when I don't feel like praying...when I don't feel like I can perform one more act through the filter of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentles, and/or self-control:

I must choose to do it anyway!


First, I give thanks to

I speak to you now as I spoke to you then: Live at peace with one another. Avoid foolish questions about genealogies and Sabbaths, and contentions about various translations. Let thy faith be visible to the entire world. Use all possible means within the arts to reach all, that you might by all means save some. Whether thou useth VeggieTales or *The Book of Eli*, make your case for the gospel known to all. Useth both hymns and hip-hop* to make Christ

Indeed, thou should use even those photoplays from the Gentiles to make your case. I hear of those who maketh a flickering-shadow story called *The Matrix*. These unbelievers

have crafted a tale filled with ungodly behavior and philosophies, yet with some truth about Savior therein. our Many saints and apostles hath used the good moments in this cinematic construction to further spread the gospel, and therein I do rejoice. Yea, some (such as our brethren

at Big Idea) preach Christ out of love; others (such as the makers of *The Matrix*) preach him in pretence, in order to achieve filthy lucre.** Notwithstanding, in every way Christ is preached, and I will therefore rejoice. (**Other ancient authorities read "to achieve strong box-office.")

But I must speak to you sternly for a moment, not to make thee ashamed, but to admonish thee as my beloved children. It is reported commonly that there is one among you who practices a kind of immorality that is not often found even among the pagans. For some time, he was exalted in your circles, for he hath made a stirring moving-picture portrait of the suffering of our Savior and Lord Jesus Christ, for whom I spent much time in chains.

But this man hath divorced his wife, then known another woman until she was with child, though she remains not his bride. Not only that, but he hath beaten her, called her names, and derided the Jews, as well as our brethren from Ethiopia and Spain! 'How to' become a gospel singer

I'm grateful to live in the advanced information age. Information covering every topic imaginable is at our fingertips via the Internet. Not just general information- but specific "how to" sites as well. Recently curiosity got the best of me I suppose, so I searched "How to become a gospel singer!" Many sites were helpful and some- well... One did claim that if you imitated church musicians and joined a music association, you'd be impressing your friends and family in no time! There's nothing wrong with impressing people, I suppose, but it's not exactly my number one goal.

"Gospel" is the "Good News of Jesus Christ." Gospel singers share

the good news of Christ through song- which technically makes us messengers. The task of a messenger of Christ is to teach and preach the gospel. Every gospel song teaches a Biblical lesson, story or principle in some way, thus making the one singing- the messenger! When all is said and done, we will stand before God and give an account for the ministries and talents He entrusted to us, holding those in authority to the highest standard.

Being accountable to God is serious and prompts me to strive to be the best I can be. Being the "best I can be" involves education, dedication and dependence upon the Holy Spirit. To me, being a gospel singer means more than just being a person that sings gospel songs; it's a privilege to be a minister of the gospel *through* song. Obviously, it's

important to become skilled in the area of music, but even more so to become skilled as a messenger of Jesus Christ.

It's fairly easy to improve music and performance skills. There are schools and private instructors that focus on training in the areas of vocals, performance, staging, music reading and presentation. There are helpful reading materials making navigating the industry much easier too. What I haven't found is a lot of information preparing the "Gospel Singer" in the areas of ministry training. Just as studying the art of music and the craft of songwriting is important, one must study the art of evangelism and the craft of discipleship to be effective as well.

As a pastor, I am disturbed when I read statistics claiming as many as 80% of people fall away from their faith. I'm not convinced 80% is accurate, but isn't 1% too many? The reason people fall away from their faith are that the full gospel message wasn't received, resulting in a superficial decision or there was a serious lack of discipleship.

As an artist, I am convinced we can do better to help people go beyond making superficial decisions to genuine conversions instead. My prayer is

to encourage my fellow "gospel singers" to invest as much time into the "Gospel" half of the term of Gospel Singer as the "Singer" half. Here are a few ways to improve the aspects of evangelism and discipleship of music ministry:

IMPROVE YOUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD - this means active dedication of pursuing spiritual maturity through submission and discipline. The benefit will be recognition of the voice of God which is essential to effective ministry. It is crucial to get in tune with the Holy Spirit to experience ministry that transforms lives. Learn to lean on the Holy Spirit's guidance for song selection, song writing, play lists and the exact words to say exactly at the right time. It is critically important to stay saturated in the word of God and to pray without ceasing. Our relationship with God must be elevated to and maintained as the highest priority of our lives.

ESTABLISH AN ACCOUNTABILITY TEAM Satan plays hardball, plays dirty and is on a mission to destroy credible ministries. Guard your heart, guard your mind, and surround yourself with godly, same sex friends in whom you can confide, confess, and depend.

WRITE A MISSION STATEMENT First, let the Holy Spirit define your purpose and calling- then put what your ministry is all about into writing. Nail down what God wants and then stay true to it as decisions are made. Example: "It is the mission of Rhonda Frye Music Ministries to lead people into a reconciled, relevant and real relationship with God through Jesus Christ."

STUDY EVANGELISM It is imperative to understand how people come to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. If anyone leads invitations, it's important to improve skills in this area. Often, information is inaccurate or the presentation is confusing. Genuine salvation requires repentance



of sin- there is absolutely no way around the sin and Lordship issue, but often people are misled into believing in the existence of God only. Many times, the concept of placing our faith in Christ is neglected. Haven't we all cringed during some altar calls? There have been a few times I felt I should dodge lightning bolts due to blatant lying and manipulative tactics. The goal is to make disciples, not pressure people into superficial decisions. The Way of the Master lists ways to "botch" an altar call: http://www.wayofthemaster.com/botchaltarcall.shtml There are many great articles available on the internet and great books concerning effective ways to lead children and adults to Christ.

BE PREPARED FOR "TABLE TALK" When ministering to a congregation, keep in mind you are ministering to marred victims of a fallen world in dress clothes! For some reason, some people find it difficult to confide in their church leadership, but they will bare their soul to the guest artist of the night. Generally speaking, the most common "table talk" discussions revolve around grief: over various losses, tragedy, or devastating illness. Hurting people are rampant! I think of Jesus making His way through the crowd when the woman pressed through the crowd to touch the hem of His garment. We are "Jesus" in their eyes as these desperate souls press through to be touched by us. Again, it is VITAL to be in tune with the Holy Spirit to know how to pray, what to say, and how to minister.

DISCIPLESHIP Remember one reason people fall away from their faith is lack of discipleship. Perhaps you're thinking, "That's the church's job." Yes, discipleship is the church's responsibility, but with planning and a little creativity, artists can help those making commitments get started on the right path. Basic discipleship encourages Bible Reading, Prayer, Baptism and Church Attendance. Artists could reserve a page on their websites that convey this message. Honestly, I was shocked recently after visiting MANY artist websites to find only a handful that includes



the plan of salvation. Often times, hearts are stirred, but for various reasons, a response isn't made right then. Reserving a page on the artist website for explaining salvation and basic discipleship steps could be an effective way to reach and disciple people long after artists are gone. I suggest adding links http://needhim.org/ or http://www.theinvitation.tv/ to point people to Christ simply because not everyone attending a concert is connected to a church.

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

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
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With the release of his solo, country project *Breathe Deep*, Guy Penrod is delivering a message with

Life, not labels.

Guy Penrod wants to tell you something: "Love God, live for Him, dream big."

He's not quoting a bumper sticker or a country song, but believes it's a message for our time. "I feel God wants me to say that to my fellow brothers and sisters in Christ right now," Guy said during a recent phone interview." Dream bigger, expand your faith, try things that you know you cannot accomplish unless God shows up."

This plan is working for Guy these days as he works his musical calling into new territory as a soloist with a mainstream country CD (after 14 years with the acclaimed Gaither Vocal Band) and plans his first solo tour to Europe this month.

Guy's exit from GVB last year came with mixed reaction. As the fan favorite sought to explore other nuances on his own, Bill Gaither comforted the audience by re-tooling the GVB and re-welcoming other fan-favorites Michael English, Mark Lowry, and David Phelps. Meanwhile, Guy released his first solo CD, Breathe Deep, on Servant Records, a division of Gaither Music, filled with songs that talk about family, God, and "growing up and growing older." And while you may not find a hymn on this project, you will get a clear message of Guy's heart and life. And while he still plans appearances at National Quartet Convention and church concerts, he also appeared - to a large crowd - at June's Country Music Association Fest.

This isn't a shift in musical genres, as Guys sees it, but more of a blur.

"For anybody that grows up in West Texas [as I did], country

music is part of your diet. I love the format of storytelling to get your truth across. I like real instruments: bass and drum and guitars, and I like major keys. Country music combines all of those things. "

And country, Guy attests, is a mindset. "Wholesome, hardwork ethic, strong family values, strong commitments to your loved ones – your wife, your kids, your friends, honesty. Those are the kinds of folks I grew up around," he recounts.

As a pastor's son, Guy honed his love for people at his father's side, retreating to the "vestibule" at the back of the church to greet people after services. It's a practice he continued after concerts with GVB, staying around and simply

talking to people. And what he found in both places: "Salt of the earth country folk," he says.

As Guy describes, "It's not a matter of where you live that makes you country. It doesn't matter if you live in downtown Chicago, downtown Nashville, out here in the woods south of Nashville or in West Texas...Country is a mindset to me. That's the kind of people I met after gospel concerts, and I found they are one in the same. They go to church on Sunday, they raise their kids to love God. They're not perfect, and neither am I."

The foray into country music has been a combination of tentative and seamless. Full of humility, Guy recalls that he didn't get a booth at CMA Fest this year ("We

> didn't know if I should be that bold and try that") but did manage to fill The Du-

rango (650 AM WSM/Durango Boots' "Acoustic Corner Stage") when he sang there.

Back when CMA Fest was known as Fan Fair, the Gaither Vocal Band made

appearances there, and Guy recounts that the now-defunct TNN (The Nash-

ville Network) cable channel used to be one of the largest sellers of Homecoming videos. So it was with amusement that Guy

watched some of his publicity staff members, strangers to gospel music but well-versed in country, react with great surprise as they saw the number of fans

reaching out to Guy at CMA Fest.

"They didn't realize how big the audience is for GVB and Homecoming stuff," Guy says. "I wasn't - not because I'm all that, but because a lot of that crowd is who comes to the Homecomings. I stacked the deck by having connected with these people through the years."

One such person, Mary Spratt from Peotone, Illinois, is having no problem connecting with Guy in his new role. "His passion for Jesus and his country style are what I enjoy so much about him," says the gospel fan. "He has always been a blessing and continues to be."

The transition into a country market is full of business decisions and marketing strategy, but when it comes to the music itself and its impact on audiences, Guy is both instructive and passionate about labels, songs, and the notion of selling-out.

"You cannot even begin to define [Christian country music] as selling out - that's ridiculous," he says. "That's what Jesus did. He lived his life in a way that was relevant to the people around Him; he said the things and did the things that worked in front of those people, and He loved them, and by doing that, he drew them to Him."

Melissa Flores, general manager for He's Alive Radio (hesalive.net) agrees, and has this to say from the radio perspective: "If we termed it'bridging over' rather than 'crossing over,' perhaps folks would have a greater appreciation for what [artists such as Guy] are endeavoring to do. Since God loves the saint and the sinner alike, wouldn't He send some of His finest to bridge that divide?"

Guy believes that the body of work he produced over his years with GVB states straight forwardly what he believes. "It's all out there, and I haven't changed one bit," he says. "I just wanted to take my Biblical view of the world

and wrap it in everyday, country kind of talk and throw it out there in the marketplace and hopefully have an influence on the culture.

"We're living in a time when truth has become relative in the culture, and in reality, truth is not relative: truth is the word of God. What He says is like fact: it's more like gravity. It happens the way He says, no discussion."

So why then, transition from straight-up gospel music to a more mainstream country recording? Guy has a big answer to this often-asked question.

With a laugh, Guy says, "I think we're the goobers for calling music 'gospel' or 'Christian.' You just get out there and do it, put it out there, and let the people who are listening to it call it what it is." And more somberly, he continues, "We weren't first called "Christians" by ourselves; we were called Christians because we are followers of Christ. We make narrow our own message sometimes. I want to broaden it; I want to kick those box walls down."

seems the kicks are penetrating, as Breathe Deep is currently at no. 64 on Billboard Magazine's Country **Albums** chart, and when released in February, debuted at #2 on Nielsen Sound-Scan's Christian/ Gospel-Christian chart. The single "Are You The One" is currently sitting on several charts, including the New Country Music Euro Chart. Clearly, Guy's current audi-

Radio's Melissa Flores: on the business of 'bridging over'

In order for an artist to bridge over successfully, he or she must maintain a Christian identity in both worlds. Believers will rejoice to see their brethren spotlighted in secular media, as long as he or she maintains a consistent witness. The body of the crossover work must also maintain moral integrity that is harmonious with Christian values. Finally, the artist must have accumulated enough social capital with their fanbase to expend on costly potential misgivings. We all know, the secular publicity machine can injure the innocent and sully the spotless. While it seems a difficult task to pull off, we must remember the Lord spent a great deal of time "crossing over." He was misunderstood, too.

ence is expanding beyond the breadth of American southern gospel.

Of late, there are mainstream country songs with decidedly Christian messages that have impacted the country charts and one hopes, the listening audience. Carrie Underwood's "Jesus Take the Wheel" and more recently her "Temporary Home" are prime examples, but artists such as Martina McBride, Brooks and Dunn, Tracy Lawrence, Craig Morgan, Brad Paisley, and Diamond Rio have done the same, and over the years, others like Johnny Cash, Oak Ridge Boys, Dolly Parton, and of course, Elvis, have made it a career standard to record and perform music from across genres, including gospel, and have done so to great success and longevity.

While there will always be traditionalists who outcry against the blurring of Christian and country (Editor's note: We heard from a few of them during the Diamond Awards voting process, and we respectfully disagree), Guy is part of a modern crop of those working and ministering in music who believe it can be used an evangelistic tool just as well, if not better, outside the confines of a Christian genre label.

"We as Christians are responsible to get out into the marketplace what we believe and how we live our lives. It's more poignant and more relevant to people's everyday existence then having all of our music be just

a philosophical, theological statement." Guy says. "That was our attempt with this record: to make a palatable piece of art that people could listen to and glean strength from and find answers in. Because at the end of the day, people are searching for truth, things that work. Even if they don't know Christ, if you hold up something that works and they give it a shot...you will be leading them to Jesus!"

Logistically, Guy views the latest chapter of his career as a work in progress, and the current progression has him, at the time of publication, embarking on his first European tour as a soloist. He will be having 12 concerts with a live band in places like Sweden, Holland, and Ireland, before returning home to his farm, his



family, and more concerts around the United States.


For this European trip, at least, the rest of the Penrods – including Guy's wife Angie and their eight children, whom they raise and homeschool in middle Tennessee, will cheer Guy on from home . "Ang will be gearing everyone up for a new school year," Guy says fondly. "She always says that when I'm working, I'm not as much fun to be with!"


It's hard to imagine this good-natured country guy as anything less than pleasant to be around, but easy to believe that the heart he exudes —one willing to work hard to reach a goal, one whose goal is to further the Kingdom of Christ in culture of lost people — can accomplish whatever is set before him.

"I believe we lay our plans and God directs our steps," Guy says matter-of-factly. " I can't see that far down the road, but He's given me enough light to see this step for today. He is so faithful."











FREEDOM: Born out of adversity

Liberty, independence and choice: is that your definition of Freedom? In the spring of 2010, a new trio called Freedom was formed and a new definition was created: Talent, experience, enthusiasm and commitment to sharing songs with a strong message of the Gospel. Josh Garner, Joel Trimble, and John Rulapaugh are now redefining the sound of trio Southern Gospel. Rulapaugh now speaks from his heart about choices, liberty and Freedom.

"Josh and I both traveled separately with other groups over the past 15 years," begins Rulapaugh. "I was with The Dove Brothers and then Palmetto State Quartet and Josh was with the Florida Boys and then had a solo ministry for a while. Following this, Josh and I traveled together for about a year with another group. Toward the end of that run we both met to discuss what we were going to do because we knew the situation we were in could not last very long. We didn't know then, but the Lord had ordained that meeting to prepare us for what was coming. Shortly after our meeting together we were informed that the group we were a part of was disbanding. We were given a month's notice and an apology."

"But what we didn't recognize then was that God's timing and providence are always perfect," continues Rulapaugh. "Historically speaking, 'freedom' is always born out of adversity. Josh and I both see the name 'Freedom' as having multiple meanings. Anyone who

knows me knows that I am a patriot. I love America. And at a time when it seems our freedoms are disappearing, the name seems to have great significance. The freedom for which we are most thankful in America is our freedom of religion, and we as Christians had better exercise this boldly lest it disappear as well.

"But the one freedom that can never be taken from us is our freedom in Christ, and this is the freedom that we proclaim from the stage every night. For Josh and I, Freedom is a unique experience because it is the first time we have sung without a bass singer. It's amazing how different it is too. I never realized just how comfortable I had become walking on a stage with three other guys. For the first several

concerts I made my way to the stage and kept looking for someone else to go with us!"

Freedom's self-titled debut CD, released on Homeland's Riversong label, has received a good response and has fans on Freedom's facebook page applauding.

Rulapaugh shares, "We're blessed with a great lineup of songs. Josh had been holding on to some great material for a long time, since his days with The Florida Boys, and I am glad he didn't let these get away from him. Our debut recording *Freedom* is packed with some of the strongest material that I've ever had the opportunity to sing. It's hard to say which song has the biggest impact on the audience."

He continues, "Because of the range of topics that we've covered, each song seems to have a different effect on the audience. With a song like 'When The

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Saints Go Marching In,' the impact is nostalgia and excitement. Then we sing a song like, 'If It Wasn't For That Cross' and people seem to reflect on where their lives may have ended up, if it wasn't for the cross of Christ. So it would be easy to say that one particular song really gets the crowd going based on tempo and energy, but we're more interested in what is making an impact that the audience will remember for a long time after they go home."

Rulapaugh continues, "My favorite song on the recording is, 'If It Wasn't For That Cross.' I've recently gone through a time in my life when I had to re-evaluate my priorities and focus. I have, within myself, really sought God's direction concerning my calling and what He would have me do. The first time I heard this song I remembered why I ever sang a Gospel song in the first place.

"If it wasn't for the Cross of Christ there is no telling where I might have ended up in life," shares Rulapaugh. "Lord knows, I've made so many mistakes and have failed in so many ways, all the while having the knowledge of Christ and knowing Him as my Savior. I cannot imagine what my life would have been without Jesus, without His nudging me along when I didn't know it and didn't care. It took several concerts for me to be

able to sing the song without becoming so introspective that I couldn't really get through it. My favorite line is: 'In my heart the scene returns to see the bridge sin couldn't burn.' Sin burns so many bridges in our lives including the destruction of self-confidence, friendships, and marriages, but there is one bridge that sin could not burn and that is the bridge that connects God and man: The Cross."

It is obvious that Rulapaugh has found personal freedom through his faith in the cross of Christ. He and the rest of Freedom sing out of a desire to see others find that same liberating faith.

"Gospel music is a calling for me," says Rulapaugh. "I've had people tell me that I could make it in other fields, but I don't know. I think my style and approach are best suited for this style of music and I know my heart is in tune with these songs. I wouldn't say that I will never sing anything but gospel because I really love country, jazz, and the pop music that artists like Michael Buble' have made famous again over the past

few years, and I'd enjoy singing that kind of stuff as well. But it could never satisfy my calling to share the gospel through song."

The strong calling on the lives of the members of Freedom also comes with a responsibility to be accountable. Rulapaugh says, "The pastor of my old home church in Maryland, Brian Mentzer, used to call me out of the blue and invite me to lunch. We'd go to Ripp's, a local restaurant and have the best crab melt sandwich in the world, and he'd give me a spiritual check up. I've never had anyone care enough about me before or since to take me out to lunch just to talk and encourage me to continue in my calling. He taught me the value of personal accountability, though I've not been the best at adhering to that practice, he certainly taught me well."

Family is another good source for personal accountability, and Rulapaugh talks about the role his wife has in his ministry. "Jennifer has always been of what I do, I think mainly because it is what brought us together in the first place," Rulapaugh shares. "I met Jennifer while singing with The Dove Brothers in Cape Girardeau, Missouri. After we were married she became the office manager for The Dove Brothers and through my time with Palmetto State, she always

helped with order fulfillment and the like. She still helps me with the day-to-day office stuff like she always has and continues to be my biggest source of strength and support. I couldn't do what I do if she didn't do what she does."

For Rulapaugh and the other trio members, along with family support, accountability also includes attending a local church when possible. "We recently became members of Sevier Heights Baptist Church in Knoxville,

Tennessee," says Rulapaugh. "It has been a long time since we have been excited about church membership, and we believe that God led us to Sevier Heights at this time in our lives because we needed a loving, caring, understanding, group of Christians who are living their faith, not just showing up on Sunday morning to show off their new clothes. As new members we are taking our time getting involved but I've been able to serve as an usher a time or two and we're enjoying attending Bible Fellowship along with the regular worship services."

As Freedom works and worships together, they are

learning other aspects about each member that is strengthening relationtheir ships. Rulapaugh says, "Josh is the biggest music fan that I know. He owns the largest and most diverse collection of music that you can imagine, and he memorized has the song list on most all of the al-

bums that he owns. The other day he said to me, 'I hear this Cathedrals' thing playing on XM and they said it was [whatever the name of the song, from whatever album], but it was a different arrangement than the one that I have because...', and he went on to describe in detail how the arrangement was different and who was singing a different note here and there. By the time he finished, I think I had dozed off. That's what makes him a great music director, arranger, and producer. He lives, eats, sleeps, and breathes this stuff.

"We're still getting to know Joel," continues Rulapaugh, "But I learned very early on that he has a heart of gold and will go out of his way to help anyone who needs it. He has quickly become a good friend. I'm looking forward to many years of singing and ministering together with him."

Even though John, Josh, and Joel have only been traveling together a short time, Freedom has already discovered its niche audience. "I think by default, having always been members of traditional Southern Gospel Quartets, Josh and I both have always appealed to the very traditional quartet lovers," says Rulapaugh. "That's no secret. Thankfully, those folks seem to enjoy us as a trio, though many of them still have recommendations as to who we should hire to complete our group. But we're seeing response from people who would normally never go to hear a traditional male quartet. That's an audience that I've never had the opportunity to reach on a large scale, so I'm really excited by that."

Rulapaugh himself has always been a quartet fan and says his favorite singer is the legendary tenor, Rosie Rozell. "Rosie had a style all his own," says Rulapaugh. "And no matter what [some] might think, no, Ernie Haase didn't invent 'Oh, What a Savior!' Actually, maybe he did, because before he started singing it, Rosie sang an incredibly similar tune known as 'What a Savior.' Rosie had a feel for a song that just cannot be duplicated and is often poorly emulated."

With 15 years and impressive quartet names to his credit, Rulapaugh is creating his own style and carving his own path in the Southern Gospel industry. However, he does have a list of other artists whose careers he respects. "As far as gospel music careers that I would like to emulate, that's a tough question as well, as I really look up to several people. Of the younger generation, Gerald Wolfe has always carried himself with a dignity that I admire. Michael Booth has a charisma that is contagious, and I'd really like to catch it. But my real 'heroes' are gospel music businessmen like Hovie Lister, Dr. Jerry Goff, Les Beasley, Charles Burke, Maurice Templeton, and many others that it would take pages to list."

Rulapaugh's appreciation of the legends in Southern Gospel is just one reason why he has such a love for the genre. Rulapaugh shares, "There is such a diverse group of musical styles and sub genres that fit under

the umbrella of Southern Gospel. We encompass everything from the Appalachian leanings of The McKameys and Inspirations, to the bluegrass stylings of The Primitives, to the family harmonies of The Lesters, Collingsworths, Crists, and Perrys, to the more traditional male quartets, progressive male quartets, trios, soloists, and now even a few popular duets. That's a pretty wide range of styles and yet they all fit into this little box that we call Southern Gospel. I think this in and of itself is a great attribute, that we all have different styles of music, performance, dress, etc., yet we still portray the same message to an increasingly diverse audience."


Rulapaugh remembers his first appearance before a diverse audience of Southern Gospel fans. "My first major concert performance in gospel music was at the Grand Ole Gospel Reunion in Greenville, South Carolina. I don't remember much about what we sang other than 'Get Away Jordan' five times. I thought it would never end and then when it was over I couldn't

remember it ever happening. It was a blur!"

John Rulapaugh has come a long way from that first stage in Greenville, and Freedom is a testament to his commitment and that of Josh Garner and Joel Trimble to excellence in their craft and faithfulness to the calling of Christ. The debut CD contains songs that offer hope, life and liberty to the listener.

The goal of Freedom is to share the good news of the Gospel and to set free those who are bound. Rulapaugh says his desire for their ministry stretches to the foundation of the United States. Freedom wants "to see souls saved, but also to reach out to those who have become disenfranchised from the church through one circumstance or another." Rulapaugh states, "Personally, I also have a deep desire to see a return to greatness in America, and I know that this can only be achieved through a nation wide revival where our citizens and our government recognize and affirm a dependence on God. To be used of God to help facilitate that would be my ultimate goal and desire."

Many times people will come up to us after a concert and say how they would love to do what we (my group McMillan and Life - my wife Liz, our friend Devin Brumfield, and and I) do: to ride around the country, seeing the sites, getting to dress up and sing every night. We often hear how glamorous it must be and how great it must be, not having to work a "real" job. I thought I would take a few minutes this month to stand in agreement with them by sharing just how what we do is "unlike" a "real" job.

Let's see, a few weeks ago we left on a five week trip. Before leaving I got to replace our motor home generator (thank you Mike Allen for your help), spend eleven hours on a ladder replacing rain gutters on the "Tune Buggy" (this job included two rather ridiculous but painful falls), and move a vast majority of our belongings in for the trip. This move always includes loading a portable office since booking, ship-

ping and all forms of office work wait for no man. Now what really makes this unlike a "real" job is that it was all done after office hours or on the weekend, and yet there was no over or double time involved.

Since we've been on the road there have been lots of long hours of driving, main engine oil changes, and three generator services. I know I should just spend the money and let someone do it for me, but once again unlike a real job there is no way to budget that cost into a salary.

This was a gift from them to our ministry. I love it when God's people can bless one another.

So then we had a roll of beautiful new carpet lying in the middle of the aisle and we had three more weeks before we would be home. Soooo, once again unlike a "real" job, Devin and I spent the next three days gutting and laying carpet in the Buggy in between concerts. (Ya'll pray cause again this job included several more falls!) Oh and did I mention it was 102 degrees with 85% humidity? That my friend, made it *glamourous*!

You will find a picture of me here in the middle of the job. I know it will be hard to recognize me without my standard stage attire but I am the one with my legs stretched skyward. Not sure how many business professionals (or in my age category WalMart greeters) would find themselves in this position.

Now at this point we need to remember that Liz is doing graphic design from the road. And when there are files to be uploaded to the internet, at times they are too large for her cellular wireless internet, so we find ourselves racing around towns looking for wireless service we can "borrow" to make one of her deadlines. So much for that magical router that follows us around the country.

Liz comes from a great heritage of gospel music. This gave her a very realistic view and knowledge of what was involved before she ever picked up the mantel. Her grandfather Alden Toney sang with the Blackwood Brothers in the late 1940's and early 50's. The stories he told of sleeping in the back seat of cars on top on records and sound equipment really made one what to leave behind all of their comforts and hit the road singing for Jesus. He missed the birth of one of his sons and lived through at least one horrible crash.

After leaving the Blackwoods he went home to Detroit where he started the Toney Brothers who are still in existence over 55 years later. While all of the early Toney Brothers worked jobs during the week, they sacrificed almost every weekend traveling and spreading the message of the gospel. Sometimes as much as I know we do as fulltime artists, I look at groups that work a fulltime "real" job plus sacrifice their weekends with a sense of awe and respect.

While Devin doesn't have an "outside" job he has the fulltime duty of assisting me in all of my follies and being the encouraging life of the party. I know that when he is standing and holding a flashlight for me to see by while repairing something at two in the morning, he is thinking how much easier and more glamorous this is than his former occupation as a church music director. His mind must drift back to the parting words of a church member when he left to join us on the road, one who told him how he "was making a big mistake" and how he was surely "simply blinded by the fame, glamour and riches of a career in gospel music." Next time you see Devin, ask him how that's all workin out for him.

Liz, Devin, and I as well as countless other gospel artists are so grateful for how God has seen fit to use us. There is NO other calling we would rather have, nor any other thing we would rather be doing. Please notice that I said "calling." That is what one must have to do this. If anyone reading this is considering a "career" in gospel music, please take a great

deal of time to pray and seek the Lord's will before making that decision. Be sure that it is indeed a calling and not simply a desire. Desire will fade. A calling will endure and sustain you through the tough times that WILL come.

As for me, this article is not meant as a complaint or to sound in any way ungrateful for the amazing blessing and honor of spreading the gospel in song. On the contrary I am amazed every day that God would chose to use a worn down broken vessel like me to play even a small roll in His master plan. I just thought some folks would like glimpse of what it looks like from center stage.

Note: I wrote this on the way to a concert in Brookeland, TX. Tonight's concert put this entire article into perspective with eternity. In addition to watching the Holy Spirit move throughout the entire service, a 15 year old girl gave her heart to the Lord! That is what this calling is all about. Like the old song says, "I wouldn't take NOTHIN' for my journey now!"

Recently, my husband Matthew and I went down to Grand Isle, Louisiana to do a concert at First Baptist. This was our third summer at First Baptist, but this visit was like no other. I believe all of our tour dates are divine appointments. There could not have been a more perfect time for us to go to Grand Isle. BP Oil has provided quite well for the people in Grand Isle, despite the bad press they have received. Shrimp boat captains' recent increased flow of income from clean-up relief is bitter sweet. One of our dear friends is a captain. He said he's making more money now than he ever has, but it is really tough not knowing how long it will take the waters to recover. Shrimping is his passion and is all he and his family have ever known. Such is the case for many on the island.

God is good, all the time. We may not understand, but He does. He is the restorer of hearts and oceans.

I had been kicked in the head for the last time. It would be the last time I trusted anyone in Gospel Music. With my finger in God's face, I yelled, "I'M FINISHED"! He immediately replied, "Good! Now I can get started". I got out of the driver's seat and gave complete control to God,





so he could take us where he wants us to go.

Since that day, I have sit across my kitchen table from a man who said, "Go find a new mode of transportation, and I'll write the check... then figure a budget for you and Nancy to do this full time till December, 2011 and I'll write you another check."

Today, I am overwhelmed by the dates that are coming in, and the big, red, beautiful coach that may be ours in the next couple weeks. Daddy passed away in 1998 and he always dreamed big. I sat in the driver's seat today and looked to my left at the switch that read, "kneel".

My Daddy's city bus was "state of the art", it would lower the front end inches from the ground so, people who couldn't step up high could get on the coach easier. Guess what they called that? My bus, just like my Daddy's bus, will "kneel".

Someone asked me just a minute ago, "what are you going to name your new bus?" Without a doubt, the big red bus or a different one, the name of The Keeton's new coach... "Shelby."

However, I believe that you died on the cross and rose again in three days to pay for my sin. I ask you to come into my heart, cleanse my sin, and make me one of your children. Thank you, Jesus. Amen.

Please remember that simply saying a prayer doesn't save you. You must believe this in your heart as well.

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Mountain-Moving Prayer: You can do it! "Christian Fitness" by Laurette Willis

The Lord gave us the perfect prayer outline in the 11th chapter of the book of Mark for removing mountains in our lives. Mountains are situations and conditions that stand between us the fulfillment of God's best for us.

Mountains standing in your way can be things such as lack, debt, or a bad report. A mountain can be a physical, emotional or mental limitation, relationship challenge or job situation.

Even if the mountain in your way appears to be a certain person, the enemy is not that person. "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places" (Ephesians 6:12).

Experiencing Attacks in the Area of Your GREATEST GIFT?

Have you noticed that the enemy always attacks you in the area of your greatest gift? For me, fear of people and worry over what they thought about me was a mountain that stood in the way of the gift of communication the Lord gave me. I had a desire to act, write, speak--to communicate in any form--but fear

kept me from taking action. I had to come against that mountainous "spirit of fear" that was not from God but from satan.

If you will look at the scripture in which the spirit of fear is mentioned (2 Timothy 1:6 and 7), Paul exhorts Timothy to "stir up the gift of God" within him. He reminds Timothy, "God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." God has given you power, love and a sound mind (also translated "discipline and self-control").

If you are afraid to express the desire of your heart, know that

is the spirit of fear sent against you from the enemy. He knows the lives you will touch and win to God by expressing your God-given gifts and talents, so he will try his utmost to stop you. He'll say things such as,

"You can't do it. You're just being conceited. No one in the family has ever done anything like that. People will talk about you. Who do you think you are?"

You may even have become so accustomed to that negative, accusatory voice that you think it's your own voice saying, "I'm scared. I can't do that. What will people think?"

If the Enemy CAN Stop You...

My friend, if satan can stop you, he will. YOU are the one who decides whether he can or not. Remember that "he walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour." He's not a roaring lion; he's only sounds like one. His teeth were knocked out by Jesus. YOU decide if he may try to devour you or not. May

I hope you shout a loud "NO!!!"

The temptation is to talk about the mountain that stands in our way. Jesus, however, did not tell us to talk about the mountain. He told us to talk to the mountain.

I've used this method of prayer for over 15 years now and have noticed an interesting thing. Each goal

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

Who's making new music... CD Reviews by Chad Hayes

Since the mid-1970s, sisters Heather Day, Kim Lord, and Valerie Ruppe have been in some way involved in Southern Gospel music. All of them at some time or another spent time singing with their mother, Brenda, as The Ruppes. This ladies' trio became known for some tight, beautiful harmonies and arrangements in an industry that was dominated my

The Ruppes went through many changes over the years as each of the girls, at one time or another, went their separate ways. However, the sisters have now reunited to form a ladies' trio called Sisters- a very apropos name. Healer Of My Heart is their first mainline studio album, and it's one that many people have been eagerly anticipating.

all-male or mixed groups.

Now, the moment you've all been waiting for: THE SONGS!

The album kicks off with a driving, up-tempo song called "I Can't Keep From Singing." It's apparent from

the start that the tight harmonies and blend that characterized The Ruppes' music is alive and well with Sisters. Interestingly, they almost sound like a mixed trio on this song. The information I got from Daywind lists this song as the first single to radio, but the promo flyer that came with it lists another song as the first single. I personally hope it's this one.

The tempo stays pretty much the same for the next song, "You Made My Day." This is another thoroughly enjoyable song that would do well at radio. Song no. 3, "God's Grace," is a mid-tempo song with an acoustic arrangement that provides a nice change-of-pace after the first two songs. The ladies do a fine job of switching from power-driven vocals to a smoother sound. "Everything You Do," the fourth song, is a mid-to-up-tempo song with a slight praise & worship feel.

The fifth song, "We All Came to the Cross," is the first ballad on the album. It's not really slow, though- it gets up to the mid-tempo range after the first verse. Still, it's a classic power ballad that the ladies pull off beautifully. The tempo speeds up just slightly for the next song, "Brothers And Sisters." This is an enjoyable

song, but there's a male guest vocalist here whose name is not mentioned anywhere in any of the information that I have. It's striking to hear the sisters in what is essentially a background vocal role on their own studio album! Next up is the CD's title track, "Healer Of My Heart." This is a slower ballad and features some straightforward harmonies that serve to get the mes-

sage across clearly. The tempo speeds back up again for song no. 8, "Unexpected Blessings." This one has a bit of a country flair to it, which is similar to the style that I remember from The Ruppes.


"Mercy Leads" is the ninth song. This is the one that was mentioned in the promo flyer I received as the first radio single instead of "I Can't Keep But Singing." This is a slower, lighter ballad with an arrangement that really shows off the vocal blend these ladies can pull off. Still, I don't think it

would work better as their second single off this project.

Next up is a mid-to-up-tempo song called "I'm Sure." Here the ladies get back to the more power-driven vocals found on the early part of the album, and the arrangement allows them to do some fun things vocally. The last full song on the album is another slower ballad called "You Always Answer Me." I refer to it this way because the album actually ends with a reprise of "Healer Of My Heart." Personally, I don't think the album needed this reprise. "You Always Answer Me" was a fine ending point to me.

I have to say that, without a doubt, I greatly enjoyed this album. The song selection fits these ladies perfectly, and there's a variety in the song styles and arrangements that will keep the attention of most any listener. Vocally, "Sisters" just picks up where "The Ruppes" left off. Any fan of The Ruppes will want to have this album in their collection as well. Overall, I give this album a rating of 9.5 out of 10 microphones!

Favorites: "I Can't Keep From Singing," "You Made My Day," and "We All Came To The Cross."





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
