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
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THE PEOPLE BEHIND THE MUSIC

FEATURE ON SHERI LAFONTAINE by ROB ESTEP

As a child, I remember tearing into new CD's and yes even cassettes and the first thing I would do was read about the songwriters, musicians, and producers. I always wondered who they were and exactly what their jobs entailed. Because of my curiosity, I have decided to start interviewing some of these "behind the scenes" people. This month, I'm going to start with Ms. Sheri LaFontaine. Sheri is loved and respected in the music industry. Heather Ruppe, of The Sisters, shares: "Sheri LaFontaine is, in my



opinion, one of Gospel Music's top writers. Sheri is also a very gifted singer. We always look forward to getting a new song from her. We have recorded many of her songs and I'm sure many more to come."

Rick Shelton says, "Sheri LaFontaine is truly one of the most multi-talented servants in the Kingdom. Her writing is original and effective. She sings with power and finesse. Her life is exemplary. Sheri's ministry is a blessing to all who have the opportunity to hear her songs, play her records,

listen to her radio show, or experience her in concert."

Take a few minutes to read this interview and learn more about Sheri's ministry.

Rob: "Sheri let's give the people a little history behind the person that is Sheri LaFonatine, let's start at the beginning."

Sheri: "I was born in Tucson, AZ and raised in Ontario Canada, Arkansas and Ohio.... yeah, I'm pretty traumatized from that. lol The baby of four very musical preacher's kids, I grew up singing. During the recording of my first solo CD, the piano player took one of my songs to The Ruppes, who cut it the next day. Jeff Easter, my producer, got me a job with Frank Arnold when I was 19. Touring with the Arnolds for

almost 4 years opened many doors for me as a singer and songwriter, including performing on a Gaither video. A songwriting lesson with Daryl Williams at



Stamps Baxter School of Music brought a surprise when I was asked to sign on the spot with Centergy Music. I later moved to Daywind Music Publishing at the request of my friend, Rick Shelton. I've been blessed to have so many wonderful groups record my songs and even chart them. In July of 2011, my first radio single, "New Every Morning," as a soloist reached #13 on the Singing News Top 80 Chart. Many divine appointments have brought me to where I am today and I pray God will continue to order my steps."

Rob: "Sheri, many writers start at a very young age, how old were you when you wrote your first song

and what was the title of it?"

Sheri: "I was 9 years old and it was called, "Yours Forever," my sister helped me write the verses, so I could record it on our Sunday school class CD. None of us had a clue how that CD would go all over the world. When I traveled to Germany for my high school senior trip, I was pleased to see it in their songbooks."

Rob: "What one artist would you say has the most influence on the way you write your songs?"



Sheri: "Because the Ruppes (Sisters) have recorded so many of my songs, many times I'll hear them singing it as I write. I am a huge fan of Chris Rice too. He gets me thinking out of the box."

Rob: "Sheri, many writers get there inspiration from many different

Rob: "If you could pick just one song out of the many you have written, what one would be your favorite and why?"

Sheri: "This is a hard question to answer, but two different songs pop into my head right now. "What Are You Doing Right Now?" that the Hoskins Family recorded is crafty, fun and yet, powerful. The other one is a song called, "You Always Answer Me," recorded by Sisters. This song came at a time in my life when everything seemed to be going wrong. A broken heart, my parent's poor health and failed occupations left me feeling that the heavens were closed to me. I was suffering from depression and losing my vision of ever hearing from God again. One day for some strange reason, I started singing this chorus, 'You always answer me, right in my hour of need. Not always how I think you should, but always for my good. You always answer me.' The song was a reminder to God of His promise... as if He needed one. The next service, God spoke to me through His Word. An unexpected visiting minister spoke about David and all the songwriters of the hymns down through the ages. He spoke of why they had to go through hard times and why they wrote of it."

Rob: "Many writers

Sheri: "I was sitting in the food court at the mall during lunch time. All the business men and women rushing by, in their designer clothes and styled hair,



always dream of writing with one of their heroes. If there was a writer, past or present that you could co-write a song with, who would it be and why?"

Sheri: "Well, as far as past, I would say Irving Berlin. He knew the heart of his audience and related well. In present day I would love to write with Wayne Haun. I write the lyric with the music and even arrange it while I go. I think he would get me."

Rob: "A song that really stuck out to me and has spoken to me every time I listen to it on your latest CD, Something More was "I Could Have Been Something." Can you tell me the story of how that song came to be written?"

glared at the young mother and her noisy son seated at a center table. It was evident that they were not just having a meal, they were having a moment. The little boy laughed loudly as they dunked their McNuggets and chatted about silly things. I book artists such as, Ivan Parker, Jeff & Sheri Easter, The Talleys, Selah, Woody Wright, Mark Schultz, Three Bridges, 33 Miles, Beyond the Ashes and more."

MEDIA & THE GOSPEL: BEING COURAGEOUS

Christian media has long been in the background of what is happening in the world. Like the old shoe in the closet, it has been pushed aside and only looked at when everything else is in use. this series we will look at those who sacrifice time, energy and funds to spread the love of Jesus and the message of the Gospel through print, web and visual media. From the movie industry



From magazines to radio to movies, media with a Christian focus has been criticized for its lack of quality, professionalism and relativity. However, several facets of this industry are taking the secular audience by storm and destroving pre-conceived notions by creating a product that is making the world take notice. They are doing it without compromise, without diluting the message and without listening to those who say it can't be done. They are doing it with courage and with excellence.


What is the heartbeat of Christian media? In

that seeks to portray the timeless story through new parables to the media that promotes Christian music, we look at the motivation and methods of those that broadcast and publish a statement that can be offensive, enraging or liberating. The statement that 'God so loved the world that He gave His Only Son' is the only message that our subjects find worthwhile to share with the world. They spend their lives giving their talents to ensure that all might hear this message. In Part One of this series, we focus on the Christian movie industry.

In an area held fast by Hollywood and its morals and world-view, Christian media has made great strides into the mainstream film industry. The "Passion Of the Christ", the Mel Gibson 2004 mega-hit, was a retelling of the last hours of Jesus' life and death that had believers and nonbelievers flocking to the theatres. Number one on its opening weekend, the movie arossed \$611,899,420 worldwide1. According to a Barna poll, only half of the viewing audience of Passion considered themselves born-again Christians2. This has lain to rest the criticism that only Christians will view Christian movies. Other popular releases have also shown that Christian films do not

the recent Soul Surfer. Fireproof, released in 2008 by Samuel Goldwyn Films and Affirm Films, became the highest-grossing independent film of that year. Sherwood Pictures produced this last film, a production company that is a ministry of Sherwood Baptist Church in Albany, Georgia. Sherwood Pictures brought a story of commitment and fidelity to 839 theatres nationwide4 with a budget of \$500,000 and using mostly volunteers and donated locations. The Christian grass-roots project reached viewers across the country and across the world. Sherwood Pictures has followed this popular film with a new release on September 30, 2011 entitled "Courageous." Releasing to 2,000

this police drama follows four men on and off the job, delving into their home lives and centering on fatherhood. Alex Kendrick, Director, Co-Writer and star of the film, talked to SGN Scoops prior to the release of this new film, about the courageous movie-making of **Sherwood Pictures** and its association with Sherwood Baptist Church.

"Sherwood is an "out-ofthe-box" church," said Kendrick. "Our Pastor. Michael Catt, believes in doing whatever is necessary to share God's truth with the world. Since God had given me a passion to use motion pictures as a ministry tool, Michael gave me his blessing to make a low-budget digital film in 2003. That \$20,000 effort was called "Flywheel," and played locally in our one theater. What happened next amazed us."

"Although we had prayed extensively over the project, we didn't think it would go beyond our city, but once we began selling DVDs of the movie, it took off. Today, over 600,000 copies have sold, and the film is now in 56 countries. We still hear from people each week that have been

touched and challenged by the story."

"That led us to our next film, Facing The Giants, which was shot in HD for \$100,000. Sony picked up the distribution rights, and put it in 441 theaters in 2006. It grossed \$10 million and sold over 3 million DVDs worldwide. Like Flywheel, the response was overwhelming." "Fireproof was next, which expanded to 800 theaters and 3.5 million DVDs. Now, Courageous is set to come out September 30th. We can't wait to see how God uses this movie to impact people! In a way, God has taken our limited efforts and has done more than we ever imagined." The Kendrick Brothers have increased their budget and their viewing audience with each release. Their evangelism may differ from that of a traveling preacher or musician, but they have the same goal of reaching the lost and encouraging the found. Kendrick said, "Jesus would tell stories in the form of parables to the masses. He used this method to engage them and to teach them truth. In like manner, we are telling stories to engage the audience and to share a message of truth

and hope. We're just using movie screens to do it."

"Since everyone loves a good story, it's an ideal way for us to touch millions of lives all around the world. As far as how well we do it, that's improving all the time. The technology is always changing, but the more education and experience we gain, then higher the level of excellence. For us, it starts with prayer, then research on the topic or theme. But when it comes to production, we're using the latest forms available, and we love the way technology is allowing us to do more and more."

The quality of the production and the depth of the storyline are increasing with every release of Sherwood Pictures. At a time when many would dilute their gospel message to make it more palatable to a larger audience, Kendrick sees their mission as the straightforward relating of Scriptural principals. "Making movies is like going to war," notes Kendrick. "An effective strategy doesn't involve just one attack point. In other words, we may send the army on land, the navy by sea, or the air force to gain a victory.

In Christian filmmaking, we need various stories that share truth from various angles. Ours are fairly bold and clearly evangelistic in their presentation. Others may make films that use a subtext message. But either way, the goal is the same."

"We desire to point people to a relationship with God through Christ. We would only ask other filmmakers to seek God wholeheartedly before making their film. When God's favor is on it, then vou will have fruit." Sherwood Pictures have gained acceptance into a large market despite their bold message. Kendrick says, "We don't ride the fence at all. Our first target is the church, and we're open about that. The reason we do that is because we're called to remind believers that we must be salt and light to the world. If they see no difference in our lives, marriages, and families, then our message is weakened." "Secondly, we realize

our audience will often contain those that don't know God in a personal way, so we purposely include the gospel. As a result, we've seen thousands of viewers come to Christ

after watching one of the films. So we start with the church, but acknowledge that the audience will include others too."

As an arm of the media that seeks to encourage believers and reach the lost. Sherwood Pictures is making great strides in film industry. With its fourth release, this courageous team of moviemakers is raising the bar for Christian films and for all of Christian media. Not satisfied with the status quo, the Kendrick Brothers keep pushing for excellence in their form of evangelism. "God has placed a drive in my heart to share His truth through stories," says Alex Kendrick. "I feel like I am obeying him when I do this. I sense His pleasure, and there's no better thing in the world that to obey the calling of God."

Alex Kendrick and Sherwood Pictures are proving that Christian filmmaking is rising above a level of mediocrity and making a mark in the mainstream movie industry. Christian media of all types should follow their example, pressing on toward excellence, following the calling, and aiming for the pleasure of their

When we speak of our family we think of mother, father, sisters, brothers, aunts, uncles and so forth. When Kim and Phil Collingsworth speak of family, they are speaking of being a part of a spiritual family; the Family of God, and their ministry is focused on that spiritual family. As a matter of fact, the title of their latest recording is PART OF THE FAMILY with emphasis on that spiritual family.

The Collingsworths; Phil, Kim, Brooklyn, Courtney, Phillip Jr. and Olivia have one of the best recordings they have ever created, with some of the best songs and arrangements you'll ever hear! We recently caught up with Phil Collingsworth to discuss his family, and all the things God has brought their way.

Having just returned from the SINGING NEWS AWARDS at Dollywood in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, Phil was playing catchup on phone calls and messages. He also was trying to keep his feet on the ground, since Courtney has just been awarded both the Favorite Young Artist and Horizon Individual Awards. "It's always

special to have your children recognized for their talent and Brooklyn won Favorite Young Artist last year. It was a surprise that Courtney won both this year," Phil explained.

This recognition of the Collingsworth young ladies from SINGING NEWS fans is a definite indication that the family is making their presence known in the world of Southern Gospel Music. Phil commented, "Since a lot of our music arrangements are not exactly what you would call traditional Southern Gospel, we are thrilled that the fans are enjoying our music."

Phil and Kim Collingsworth have just celebrated their twenty fifth wedding anniversary and Phil took a quick trip with us back through time. "Kim and I met while we were both in college," Phil reminisced. "I thought she was beautiful, and she was a preacher's daughter. She could play the piano, and I just knew God was bringing her into my life for me to love and for us to work together for Him. She was so talented! "

The Collingsworths

first appointment was working together as musicians at a church camp. Phil continued his story, "That was in 1986, and along with our wedding anniversary, we're also celebrating twenty five years in the music ministry. We have been privileged to work together as Ministers of Music, and in other music capacities throughout these twenty five years. We would often do extended revivals, church camps and other musical presentations at various churches across the country, and as the children came along, they would join us. This has always been a family affair for Kim and me," he concluded.

When the children began coming along, Phil and Kim were praying for direction with their music ministry. "We had talked about a concert ministry, and the Lord really seemed to be leading in that direction," Phil explained. "We were recording and traveling; not much different than we are now, but not being able to spend any quality time with our children just to enjoy them, because we were always coming or going or getting ready to go,"

In 2000 the Collingsworths' prayers came to fruition; they began a full-time concert ministry, limiting the number of dates they would perform. By the following year, they were booked for a year ahead, sometimes as much as a year and a half in advance. Phil explained, "The kids were growing up and had become a key part of the music ministry. Along with Kim playing the piano, I played the trumpet; both Brooklyn and Courtney were learning to play the violin, Phillip was learning to play the guitar and all three were learning to sing harmony." He further stated, "We were beginning to put together various combinations of voices. We could have a trio with the Kim and the two girls, or myself, Kim and one of the girls, or Phillip and the two girls, or the entire family group or Olivia singing solo (she has recorded two solo albums,) and it became a lot of fun for all of us."

By 2004 the family had a number of recordings to their credit and they were touring regularly. They signed a booking contract with Dominion Talent Agency. Michael

Davis began handling all their concert dates.

People have commented on the crowds of fans who attend the Collingsworth's concerts, so Phil described the work the family does to promote the concert schedule. "One thing that we've learned is that people can't come to your concert, if they don't know you're doing one," he said. "Several years ago we began building a data base of mail contacts, which has grown to more than forty five hundred mailing addresses. When we are booked into an area, we go into our computer data base and mail cards

and he does a wonderful job on this song," Phil stated. "This is just one of the great songs on the recording."

She sang it to Kim over the phone, and then told Kim that it was written by the father of one of their friends, Phillip Batten. "That's My Story, So What's Yours?"

"That's my story, so what's yours? Everyone has a story!" that question and brief statement caught me by surprise. In my 40 years of living no one had ever asked me outright what my story was. I had played music in front of thousands, written songs on charts, been an evangelist, a pastor, a worship director and been in prominent positions in high profile businesses. I instantly realized that in all of those platforms no one had ever asked me that question and I didn't even know where to begin.

I had been frequenting a little shop where several guys hung out while they had coffee or a soft drink and chatted about sports, politics, life, etc. I had recently befriended a gentleman who had just finished telling me the amazing story of his life, how he grew up in an orphanage, was sentenced to life in prison by the time he was eighteen years old, was miraculously freed and became a minister, national speaker and author. Now I found my mind racing through all of my life events trying

to formulate them into a two minute summary of "my story". I didn't even know where to begin or what to say. And most important of all, it was a low time in my life where I had gone through some major life changes and events and really didn't feel all that great about "my story".

I began to stumble through the highlights and lowlights of my life; over-explaining some things and underexplaining others. I felt a sense of pride when telling certain events and a sense of shame when mentioning others. I felt like I had lived five lives already so it was difficult for me to keep"my story" from sounding like a zigzagging ramble and have it somewhat arrive at an ultimate conclusion or direction. In fact, the difficult part was that I had lived all of this life and yet there were no conclusions or resolutions or ultimate successes..... in my mind. Seemingly just a life of ebbs and a flows, starts and stops, high's and low's, some successes and what felt like many failures. It felt odd and uncomfortable for me to verbalize my life story for the FIRST TIME, like I was trying

to recount some crazy dream I had the night before. So I basically spilled my guts and blurted out the life scenes that flashed across my mind!

James, my new friend,



listened graciously and finally said, "Wow, you have an amazing story!". Then he began to share Romans 8:28 with me, a verse I've heard, read, written songs about and even preached on myself! "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to His purpose." He begin to expound how God has a 'thesis' or 'prothesis' (the root meaning of the word "purpose" in Romans 8:28) for our lives. A composition or story that HE is the author of. How that we often have a hybrid of God's purpose that WE try to write for our own life or as he termed it; a 'hypothesis'. A

has a little of what we feel God's purpose is and a lot of what we'd like to see our purpose become. And how the enemy has an 'antithesis'. A story he would like to write for our lives that is completely the opposite of what God intends. That one encounter and conversation that day has opened my mind to the fact that we all have a story. Over the course of our reading we learn whether this main character is kind or harsh.

happy or sad, positive or negative, grounded or lost. What their mental state is, what are their strengths or weaknesses, what they struggle with or excel at, how they react and cope with each situation, even what their inner most thoughts are. Then the writer will introduce supporting characters to enable the theme or plot to take certain twists or turns, influencing the life of the main character and guiding the story to its final conclusion; allowing the reader to see how each event, each person, each action ultimately led the main character to a final conclusion and chapter. A journey to those last two words of the book, "The End". It's so easy to read books or watch movies and want to tell the main character to "watch out" or "stay away from that person, they're T-R-O-U-B-L-E" or "don't make THAT decision!". However; WE are our OWN main character in the story of our lives!

It's a great way to open a door and help someone follow the path God has for them in life.

the Lord on Friday, September 23rd, 2011. Charlie Burke, as he was affectionately known to all, passed away early Friday morning, after suffering what doctors have described as a brain aneurysm late Thursday night at his home in Maiden, North Carolina. Charlie and his wife Carolyn have been a major part of Southern Gospel Music for more than half a century.

It has been reported that Charlie was a "behind the scenes" participant in the industry, holding various offices and positions within the governing bodies of the industry. Southern Gospel Music Hall of Fame. As partial owner of the National Quartet Convention, and owner of the '80s sensational quartet, The Singing Americans, his expertise in managerial skills and quality quartet performance was sought by many. Along with his son Michael, he owned the very successful Tape Corporation Of America.

During the recent 2011 National Quartet Convention, Mr. Burke was recognized by his peers with the Southern Gospel Music Guild's Lifetime Achievement Honor. He celebrated his 75th birthday on Sunday, September 18th.

Without a doubt, Charles and Carolyn Burke have impacted the lives of countless individuals in Southern Gospel music. His legacy is the success these individuals attained through his support and encouragement. Mrs. Carolyn Burke spoke with us on Saturday morning, September 24th, thanking the industry and fans for their concern and support during this trying time for her family. "We respectfully ask that everyone continue to pray for us," she stated. "Charlie had been doing very well and enjoyed the week at the National Quartet Convention, visiting with everyone. The suddenness of his passing has been a shock and we appreciate the calls, prayers and cards that we are receiving. You're continued prayers mean so much."

"In 1986 I received the greatest phone call of my career. It was Dewayne Burke asking me to come play for the Singing Americans. Little did I know this was to be the greatest 5 1/2 years of my life. Charlie Burke taught me how to be a great quartet pianist. Even though he could not play piano himself, he knew

exactly what it took. The funniest moment I had with Charlie was when I missed the bus leaving convention headed to the next date. That wasn't the funny part. I missed it because I was saying goodbye to a girl from California, and Charlie had told me to leave her alone and stay focused on my job. Because I didn't listen, Charlie made me ride 2 1/2 hours in the back of his mini-van loaded down with convention items. He lectured me for the ENTIRE 2 1/2 hours. I thought he was going to fire me over it but thus began a great friendship. I was told that Charlie had just told this story to someone just hours before he passed away. He is probably telling God about it now. He was a boss, a friend and a father figure. He will be greatly missed. May the things that he did for all of us live on. Thank you, Charlie, for the GREATEST days of my life. By the way, you were the only one that I would let my wife kiss on the cheek every time you rode your scooter by our booth, except Miles Cooper who still remains Laura's boyfriend."

Steve Perkins, former long-time bass guitarist

for The Bishops:

"I met Charles Burke back in the mid-eighties, when the Singing **Americans Quartet** was the hottest thing going, and I was the Music Director at an FM Southern Gospel Radio Station in the Cincinnati/ Dayton market. My dream was to play bass guitar for a major fulltime Gospel group. Mr. Burke allowed me to ride the bus with the Americans, giving me a chance to see first-hand, just how "glamorous" road life was. He also advised me to learn all I could about the business side of Gospel Music, because he felt that bass players would one day be a luxury that most groups could not afford. When Mark Fain joined Gold City, Mr. Burke almost hired me for the Singing Americans, but felt that with keyboard and tracks, he could save the salary. He was one of the pioneers to go that route. After I joined the Bishops, he would always joke with me that his biggest mistake was not his failure to keep a consistent vocal line-up of his group, but his biggest mistake was not hiring me! We both knew that wasn't true, but it was his way

of encouraging me and acknowledging my success with The Bishops. Last week, he and I spoke for the last time. And like all the times before, we would talk "business" only after he asked about my family. When he befriended you, you were more than just a colleague in Gospel Music. He was interested in your life first and Gospel Music second. Charlie did so much for people that others are not aware of. There is a huge void in the Southern Gospel Music family with Mr. Burke's passing. His shoes, which we always teased him about, were quite large and will be impossible to fill."





Scarcely did he fathom, as a youngster, enjoying country and gospel music, that God was shaping his life for ministry. Little did he know that God was preparing him for and credits God for his success. At almost every concert, Crabb proclaims boldly through song; he'd rather have Jesus more than anything.

Up until 2007, Jason realized many accomplishments touring with his brothers and sisters. The Crabb Family is known for

From this album, Crabb received Dove Awards for Inspirational Recorded Song of the Year for "Joseph" and Traditional Gospel Recorded Song of the Year for "Go Tell It On The Mountain."



Extending his music ministry, Crabb released his first inspirational book, "Trusting God To Get You Through," in January 2010. Crabb takes the lyrics of the Crabb Family hit-"Through the Fire" and shares his personal life stories about how he has lived out the lyrics of the song.

That's a great reminder from Paul found in I Thessalonians 5:12 and that was before there was an official "Pastor's Appreciation Month!" October is the month set aside to express appreciation to pastors-but if we want to help them to FINISH WELL, let's honor them all year long!


I have been the Associate Pastor at my church for the past four years. Although I work with a great group of people and under a wonderful senior pastor, I have to say there have been days I've thought to myself, "I didn't sign up for this!" I have felt the weight of carrying a few secrets which has prompted me to wonder how many secrets a pastor will take to their grave? I have felt the sting of being mis-understood as well as many other emotions and I'm just getting my feet wet in the ministry. I'm just an associate pastor, but I have had my eyes opened to what it's really like to be a pastor and it's made me cringe over the times I

gave my previous pastor grief over little things.

Pastors carry a tremendous load. Many are juggling families, ministry and an outside job. Often, pastors do not have staff or volunteers and they do everything from cleaning the church, mowing the lawn and keeping up with

church finances. Speaking of which, many pastors are thrown into roles of business and office and unreasonable expectations, many pastors walk away from the ministry.

According to The Christian Post Website, Jonathan Falwell, Senior Pastor of Thomas Road Baptist Church noted during the 2010 Refuel Pastors Conference, "Half of pastors would



management and we all know seminary hardly teaches those skills! On top of the daily routines that come with being a pastor, perhaps the obligation that brings the most stress is the responsibility of the spiritual well-being of those in which the pastor is accountable. Rightly dividing the Word of Truth is an enormous task. With the stress of responsibilities

leave the ministry tomorrow if they could. Seventy percent are fighting depression and 90 percent can't cope with the challenge of ministry."The Christian Post reported that Falwell sited sources from Lifeway, Barna and Acts 29 by claiming as many as 1500 pastors exit the ministry because of moral failure, burnout, discouragement or depression. Falwell

claimed as many as 80% of Seminary and Bible School graduates leave within the first five years of ministry. There are many websites and studies available online confirming the fact that MANY pastors are leaving the ministry downhearted and defeated!

It's hard to imagine the person standing behind the pulpit could be fighting feelings of inadequacy, is lonely because they have very few friends, and often feels misunderstood. After all-this is the PASTOR we're talking about! If the pastor doesn't have it all together than who does? Good question! Making matters worse, the pastor lives in a fishbowl with the entire congregation watching the pastoral family and often expects perfection from all pastoral family members at all times.

The good news is, although being a pastor is tough, most can't imagine doing anything else! Our pastors just need more than a gift card to the Cracker Barrel every October, they need serious encouragement and support! Surely we can provide it. Don't

get me wrong- pastors appreciate gifts, but we can encourage our pastors all throughout the year, not just in the month of October. Here are a few things that top a Pastor's wish-list for Pastor's Appreciation Month and also some ideas of how we can help:

Love: Truly love your pastor using I Corinthians 13:4 as the standard. It's easy to say "I love my pastor," but do you love your pastor enough to not keep records of wrongs? Remember, love is patient, love is kind! Pastors need to be shown true Christian love like everyone else!

Acceptance: To

make your pastor feel accepted, become interested in their hobbies, hopes and dreams. Remember gossip and criticism will tear a pastor down quicker than anything! Remember, I Timothy 5:17 says, "The elders who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially those whose work is teaching and preaching." This recording leans more to a folksy sound or more of a praise sound, and it will touch each listener just the way you need it most! Dolly Parton's well-known song, "Coat Of Many Colors" features Allan, who sings this with so much sentiment. Amy is featured on the first verse of a "He'll Hold You," a song she wrote. It is the most encouraging and uplifting song I've heard in a while and will minister to anyone who is suffering from a crisis in their life.

A SINGING ENGLISH TEACHER by JEFF HAWES

I cannot believe that is has now been a little over a year since I first became a writer for Scoops. What an exciting year it has been, and I have loved being able to share my stories of roadlife experiences with you.

September is always one of the biggest and busiest months for New River--mainly because of the NQC and the Singing News Fan Awards. Each year as September approaches, my mind cannot help but drift back to the classroom I once taught in, the papers I once graded, and the high school football games I once attended. Now my world consists of church stages and concert halls I sing in, songs to choose, and the music conventions I now attend. Wow! Things do change in just a few short months.

For this issue of Scoops, rather than only describing my life on the road, I wanted to share with you a feature of someone who is perhaps by biggest supporter, my grandmother. Grandmothers are special ladies and prayer warriors. Just this February one of my grandmothers passed away and I really began to realize just how special grandmothers are. My grandmother Hawes lives right across the road from me and has always been my buddy. In fact when I entered the fifth grade, she offered to pay for piano lessons if I would take them. Eight years later when I finished as a senior in high school, **Grandmother Hawes** still paid for each lesson. Before I learned to drive she faithfully drove me back and forth to each

lesson--in rain, snow, sleet, or shine. In her old house (before it burned in 2001) she had a large upright black piano in her living room, and it became the instrument that became instrumental in the person I am today. It truly became my release from the sometimes tough days of middle school.

Grandma grew up in the middle of a family of eight children, almost always taking on multiple roles in every day tasks. When her mother suddenly died of a heart attack at an early age, Grandma stepped into motherly roles for her younger siblings. Having to guit school as a young girl, Grandma immediately knew she would have to rely on her common sense to be successful. As she entered her teen years, she would often work in the fields, prepare meals, and work as a maid for families in the city.

While in her 80's today, Grandma still relies on her common sense just as much as she did as a young girl. If you pass by her house on any given day it is common to see her working on her car, mowing the lawn, or

having a yard sale. Yes, she even follows New River on Facebook--dial up internet only. She loves Facebook and all the perks it provides. She keeps in touch with family, friends, church events, and most importantly, Karen Peck and New River. In fact, she usually knows my schedule better than I do. Even though she hasn't traveled to many states outside of the South, she imagines she has when she can log on to Facebook and look at the pictures and descriptions we post. In many ways, I feel like I am living this life for her as well.

Never as a fifth grader, did I or Grandma Zola ever think I would be traveling the world, using the talent God gave me to spread His gospel. I often wonder if she, as a young girl working in the field, ever thought she would play an instrumental part of a ministry that wasn't even established yet.

Sheri Easter is the dynamic female voice of Jeff and Sheri Easter, and HEAR MY **HEART** is Sheri's personal feelings about the events that have graced and challenged her life and shaped her into the Christian woman, wife, mother, daughter, sister and friend that she is todav.


Sheri describes the unspoiled years growing up in the Lewis Family, the renowned bluegrass performers from Georgia. She explains various events and decisions that impressed her at an early age, and what those events and the love of her family taught her about life. Sheri loved to write and kept journals of her thoughts all through her life.

In HEAR MY HEART
Sheri shares stories of
her days at elementary
school, the busy years of
high school, her years at
college and the things
that helped form her
structured existence. She
then relates how losing
her father when she was
only twenty years old

was the worst tragedy of her young existence and taught her the reality of life.

In Sheri's photo gallery, she included a photo of her as a little girl in her bedroom with her stuffed animals. This brings Sheri's mother. Those photos are priceless! One thing she emphasizes over and over is the love she grew up with and how that legacy has guided her throughout her life.

In the mid-eighties, Sheri and Jeff Easter were on the same program



commentary to life, as she describes her bedroom and the furnishings. She discusses various things that were the stepping stones in her life, and has added a number of photos of "stepping stones," as a little girl, a young woman, a wife and

at the Albert Brumley Sing; Sheri, performing with her family, The Lewis Family, and Jeff, son of James Easter of the famed Easter Brothers, playing bass guitar with The Singing Americans. This was a re-acquainting, since they had met earlier at another concert but really didn't know each other. Just one short year later, on June 18, 1985, they were married combining the talent of the two acclaimed performing families. For a time, Sheri and Jeff toured with her family, and in 1988, Jeff and Sheri stepped out on faith and began their own music ministry.

By 1988, this couple had recorded two albums; "A New Tradition" and "Homefolks," which they carried on the Lewis Family record table. Sheri and Jeff learned in mid-March, 1988 that they were expecting their first child. Sheri's comment is recorded, "It was one of the most difficult choices we ever made, but when I was eight months pregnant, we left the family with no dates of our own, no ideas, and no direction." In November of that year Jeff and Sheri welcomed a baby boy, Madison, to their family.

Their step of faith proved to be exactly what God ordained. Through the years, Sheri's comments in her journals, her writings for various magazines and her comments in many articles on the

on the ministry she shared with her husband, speaks of faith, prayer, love for and from family and friends. Each of those comments reinforced Sheri's belief in a loving, protective God. Like most everyone who keeps a diary or journal, Sheri would skip months-even a year or two, but would always come back to update her life events and thoughts.

Sheri records the birth of her second child. Morgan, in September, 1993. She shared the association she and Jeff shared with Bill and Gloria Gaither and the Homecoming Tours, and tells of the loss of her Grandmother and Grandfather Lewis. Sheri discusses her sadness upon learning of her Mother's diagnosis of Parkinsons, and of going back to school to earn her MBA in Business. Sheri is very open and talks honestly of many

other life-changing events.

The birth of a third child, Maura, in 2005 was a surprise for Sheri at the age of forty two years, just before she and Jeff celebrated their twentieth anniversary. She humorously records Jeff's reaction when she showed him the early pregnancy test. "I woke him up at 5:30 that morning saying 'It's got two lines! It's got two lines!' and handed him the test. As Jeff reached for his bifocals, he said, 'If you have to get your bifocals to read a pregnancy stick, you might be too old to have a baby!"

And then Sheri writes about her battle with breast cancer, and how she dealt with it. Again, it was an awesome challenge and her writings are compelling. Sheri leaned on the Lord, and her faith became

stronger.

These are only a few of the highlights of this talented lady's new book. I can assure you; I laughed, I cried (over and over again) and could not put the book down until I finished the final page. You will be encouraged, challenged and uplifted to soar to greater heights in your spiritual life by this lady as she reveals her innermost thoughts. **HEAR MY HEART is** a must read, and I especially urge you to do that during this month of October as we celebrate **Breast Cancer Awareness** Month.

I share one of Sheri's comments; "A writer can only write what is inside. Many times I've wondered whether I had anything of value to say to a reader, however the desire to write has never weakened or diminished. It grows stronger with each opportunity I

postponed. Therefore, I picked up a pen and began to jot down things that were in my heat. My prayer is that someone can take with them a similar memory, story or quote and find comfort in the words-the kind of comfort that brings a smile."

* Go to the Gym or Church Fitness Center with your son or daughter. Work out with light weights (not on the machines). Show your kids how it's done.

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
