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
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In a nut-shell, the Write About Jesus Songwriter's Workshop is a three day conference designed to equip writers with the necessary skills to become better songwriters. Eager registrants gathered from all over the country and beyond in St. Charles, Missouri on October 11-13, 2012. I was one of many students with an open mind and a teachable spirit gleaning wisdom and experience from the top Christians Songwriters of our day. It was truly an amazing experience for many reasons on many levels. I can honestly say, I came home a better writer with a spiritually renewed spirit. And-I came home with many connections to many new friends and potential co-writers. I found Write About Jesus to be a life-changing experience and a place where I found *My People*!

Write About Jesus was founded by John and Sue C. Smith in 2000. Sue is a five-time Dove award winning songwriter who has had cuts by Avalon, Jason Crabb, The Oak Ridge Boys, The Crabb Family, Sandi Patty, Guy Penrod, Travis Cottrell, Mark Harris, Larnelle Harris, The Martins, Janet Paschal, Pure NRG, Triumphant Quartet, Ernie Haase and Signature Sound, Karen Peck and New River, Brian Free and Assurance, The Hoppers, and many more. She won the Dove Award for Inspirational Recorded Song of the Year in 2004. Sue has written seven #1 songs, including AGM's award for this year's song of the year for "On The Banks of the Promised Land." Sue has written over 50 musicals for Brentwood-Benson Music Publishing.

Sue and her husband John, a motivational speaker and respected family and career counselor, work diligently to put together an all-star line-up of conference staff and instructors. This year's clinicians included: Lee Black, Gina Boe, Carl Cartee, Dennis Dearing, Stephen Duncan, Michael Farren, Simon Hawkins, Allie Lapointe, Joel Lindsey, Phil Mehrens, Jennie Lee Riddle, Rick Shelton, Belinda Smith,

Allison Speer, Benton Stokes, James Tealy, Kenna West, tony Wood, Guy Zabka, Holly Zabka.

Class Sessions on a variety of topics taught by the clinicians as well as private critiques were available throughout the weekend. Topics Included: Publishing, Co-Writing, Creativity, Pitching, Song Painting, Re-writing, Mentoring, Knowing Genres, Writing a Great Lyric, Writing a Great Melody, Demos, Great Ideas, Writing Across Cultures, Writing for Southern Gospel, Praise and Worship, CCM, Musicals, Pop, Country, Print, Kids and more! Honestly, there wasn't a subject involving the art, craft or business of songwriting un-touched!

The students had the opportunity to participate in the songwriter's contest. Applicants were divided into genres and were critiqued and judged accordingly. Although the critiques can be uncomfortable for the nervous songwriter, the criticism is necessary, constructive and beneficial. This year's grand prize winner was Allison Gilliam for "I Will Rest."

Each day, everyone gathered for a great time of spiritual encouragement, led by John Smith and for a time of worship led by different worship leaders each session. Wow! There are so many wonderful things to say about Write About Jesus- but the spirit of Christian love and community is almost indescribable. During the times of worship, the sweetest spirit filled the room as tears fell and hands lifted.

Perhaps the most wonderful time during the whole weekend was the "Writers In the Round" Concert. It was truly an amazing time of worship as clinicians performed in most cases, their latest composition. Again- it was a time of hands lifted, tears falling- and people rising to their feet with applause. Also during the concert, Sue shared a video to update the registrants regarding a WAJ mission trip to India and announced the possibility of a WAJ mission trip

to Japan. The participants were then given the opportunity to support this cause.

Sue shares: "Five of us went to India for 10 days. We did 3 different workshops in northeast India for about 300 songwriters. In the first and largest workshop, we taught people who came from many different people groups. Some of these do not have the whole Bible translated into their language. They don't have songs to worship God that come from their own culture, so they borrow songs from other religions and rewrite the words or they try to translate Western worship songs. Part of what we wanted to do was to help them write for their own churches songs



that grow from their tradition and culture... something in the "heart language" of their people. Twenty-eight songs were written while we were there. One of the "tribes" are a people who work on the tea plantations near the Chinese border. Their lives are very hard, but it was amazing to see their joy in the Lord! The pastor we worked with was raised in a Hindu home. He learned about Jesus through a lady who was one of the first Y-WAM volunteers. What a blessing that that lady had recently returned to India and came to the workshop!

The money to finance the workshop came in the form of a love offering we took at our 2011 Write About Jesus workshop. None of this offering money went to pay our travel expenses

It was an amazing opportunity. If God allows us to go to Japan, I would be so excited and grateful. Meanwhile, the offering received will allow us to send about \$1500 back to India to further the work that is going on there."



I am very grateful for the opportunity of participating in the 2012 Write About Jesus Conference and I'm looking forward to next year's conference. I'm pleased to say, I have *Found My People*! 

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Pilgrims & Prodigals:

Perspectives on Roaming, Redémption, and the Next Generation from the Annie Moses Band

As the blazing sun cast its blistering glow across the dry and dusty plantation fields of Texas, a young woman arched upwards to a kneeling position, rested on her knees, and lifted an arm to wipe away the beading drops of sweat streaming down her bronzed and tarnished face. The Great Depression was a difficult time for most and survival was the priority of the day. Work, when found, was cruel and ruthless. Life, if survived, was a tale of hardship and adversity. For Annie Moses, there was no exception. A hired field hand, she shaded her eyes with her arm and squinted as she stared across the vast cotton fields and watched as other workers moved wearily under the weight of the exhausting, afternoon heat. She bent her head down and coughed to clear her throat of the heavy, granular air, struggling to catch her next breath. Then she closed her eyes to rest. How could she go on like this? There was no progress. Life as a sharecropper was difficult and burdensome and the work nearly unbearable. But then her thoughts turned towards her children back in the old clapboard shack, especially her daughter Jane's musical gift, in

which she would sacrificially invest. Perhaps there was reason to go on. A flicker of hope kindled deep within her spirit and she opened her eyes, knelt over the next plant, and began to quietly hum the tune of a poor wayfaring pilgrim.

Decades later, on a black, rainy night in New York City, Annie Wolaver found herself sitting in a cab for the trip home. She wasn't paying attention to the bustling busyness along the avenues or the stream of traffic that could make the journey longer than it should. Her mind was in a million places and she had a real dilemma on her hands. The proposition was risky at best. Should she continue pursuing a solo career in classical music or would she squander the years of dedication, hard work, and the musical legacy left to her through her parents, her grandmother Jane, and her great-grandmother and namesake, Annie Moses for a chance at something she had viewed as a "sideline gig" or something she and her family did "just for fun"? Annie reminisced about her past; the long hours she and her

brothers and sisters had spent practicing and honing their skills and talents with their parents, at the Blair School of Music at Vanderbilt University, the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and Julliard. She thought about the times she and her family would perform together for family reunions or small events. Could they do something more? Could they successfully travel outside the boundaries of traditional classical music? Would it work? Could it work? Would they remain pilgrims or become prodigals?

Introducing The Annie Moses Band

In 2002, The Annie Moses Band embarked upon and initiated a musical renaissance unlike any other. Abandoning individual classical careers, Annie, along with her brothers and sisters, set out with their parents, noted songwriters and arrangers Bill and Robin Wolaver, for an exceptional journey with bold combinations of musical genres that remain unparalleled. Named in honor of their great-grandmother, Annie Moses, the band's philosophy and mission surround their family legacy and reclaim the arts by investing in the next generation of musicians to propagate the gospel of Christ.

Annie takes the lead on violin and performs most of the lead vocals. She is joined in this incredible fusion of musical styles and elements by brothers Alex (viola), Benjamin (cello), and Jeremiah (guitar), along with sisters Camille (harp and organ), and Gretchen (violin 2, and mandolin). While Annie's father Bill (piano and keyboards) and mother Robin (background vocals) have traditionally rounded out the group, the band has recently grown to include sister-in-law Berklee (Alex's wife and background vocalist) and musician Javier Santiago (drums.)



The pride of their heritage is evident, not only in name, but in their dedication to hard work and musical excellence. With eight musical CD and DVD projects (Legacy, Always Morning Somewhere, Bethlehem - House of Bread, Christmas Bright and Beautiful, Eden, Christmas with the Annie Moses Band, This Glorious Christmas, and Through the Looking Glass) and the song Love's Legacy - a tribute to Annie Moses, the band has enjoyed over a decade of growth and success, preparing them for the next chapter of an exciting adventure!

Pilgrims and Prodigals

Pilgrims and Prodigals is the latest project from the Annie Moses Band and in spite of their past success, Annie believes "this is really our first release because it represents a dream in the making and a new chapter in our lives." While the band has recorded numerous CDs and DVDs, Pilgrims and Prodigals represents the group's first self-produced, commercial release. "This project explores the timeless themes of roaming and redemption. Everyone is going somewhere," says Annie. "We are either finding our way back home or running away from it. The songs of this project tell one of those two stories."




While the *Pilgrims and Prodigals* project is available as a double disk, CD/DVD combination package, complete with an amazing mix of classical, jazz, folk, Celtic, and pop arrangements with studio and live performances, it also reflects references to timeless works of literature and poetry, painting a portrait of the narrow path of the pilgrim and the well-traveled path of the prodigal. The songs selected represent the works of talented writers and musicians from times past, including members of the Wolaver family, and provide a refreshing perspective for the road of life.

Poor Wayfaring Stranger tops the list on this project and according to Annie is "the quintessential song of the pilgrim." Described as a "slice of Americana, with a twist of Jazz," Annie credits her father with reinventing and infusing this traditional classic with a fresh new sound.

I've Got A Name brings back the familiar sounds of musician Jim Croce as the band receives a crash course in their parents' favorites and highlights the importance of identity. "Identity is central to the concept of the pilgrim. You have to know where you have been to know where you are going," says Annie.

Love's Legacy is perhaps the theme song for the Annie Moses Band and pays tribute to their great-grandmother, Annie Moses. According to Annie, "She had a hard life and the perspective of her life led from a cotton field to the grave, but the perspective of eternity is that she blazed a trail from the cotton field to the concert hall."

The Road Well Traveled (A Cautionary Tale), written by Alex Wolaver, is taken from the infamous Robert Frost poem Road Not Taken and invites the listener to once again take the road less traveled. The song features a vocal solo by Alex with a dynamic piano solo by Camille.



Blush is a call to traditional values, beauty and innocence. In addition to its performance on the CD/DVD project, the song is gaining additional exposure as the Annie Moses Band's first music video premieres for television and the internet.

Catcher in the Rye, Progress, Read Between the Lies, and My Room, take messages from great works of literature (Catcher in the Rye, and Pilgrim's Progress) and conveys the truth of hope in the midst of the pilgrim's search for belonging and home and is augmented by the invigorating instrumental performances of Toss The Feather, Fiddlesticks, Moffat Jig, Girl of Constant Sorrow, Trail Mix, Shenandoah, and Blarney Pilgrim.

Annie Moses Ministries

While the Annie Moses Band celebrates their latest project, moves to a new chapter in their lives, and performs in concerts across North America, their passion, like that of their great-grandmother Annie Moses, is to invest in the next generation of musicians. In 2010, the band formed Annie Moses Ministries, a ministry dedicated to promote the pursuits of young musicians by providing artistic experiences that will "enrich and equip the next generation to obey the Biblical mandate to make His praise glorious." Annie Moses Ministries includes The Fine Arts Summer Academy and the Annie Moses Conservatory.

The Fine Arts Summer Academy

The Fine Arts Summer Academy (FASA) is a two-week event held in Nashville, Tennessee for young artists, offering instruction in strings, brass, woodwinds, voice, dance, drama, guitar, piano, and percussion. Faculty include pedagogues and alumni from the Juilliard School, Cincinnati Conservatory, Berklee College of Music and other prestigious institutions. The

Academy culminates in two original Broadway-style shows, tailor written for attending students: the Younger Division Musical (ages 3-10) and the Upper Division Gala Show (age 10-college sophomores). The FASA Gala Show is held on an arena stage with professional lighting, videography, audio, and orchestral accompaniment. "It's Riverdance on steroids," says Annie.

Annie Moses Ministries impacts the lives of over 300 students a year, and over 1,500 since the FASA began in 2003. FASA students come from over 27 states and three countries, with Annie Moses Ministries awarding more than \$37,000 through FASA scholarship funds since 2010.

Applications for the 10th FASA are now available! This spectacular experience will take place at Lipscomb University July 13-27, 2013. Participants of the Academy will study and perform all styles of music and art, culminating in a Broadway-style extravaganza in the Allen Arena on July 27, 2013. This year, the Academy is proud to announce new tracks, including Composition, Creative Writing, Fine Arts, and Musical Theater for ages 10-13. Faith. You can't see it. You can't even touch it. But I can tell you from experience, I know beyond a shadow of a doubt that it is there. God's Word says, "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). Recently, I had the opportunity to exercise my own faith. 

Soul'd Out has been making great gospel music for twelve years, scooping up the 2010 Singing News Magazine Horizon Group of the Year Award in the process. The Ohiobased, Crossroads artist released *What The World Doesn't Know* in early 2012, with the singles, "Through The Blood", 'All Things Are Possible" and "Go Out And Get Him" doing well on the gospel charts. However, what made Soul'd Out the talk of the town this year was the acquisition of two of gospel music's leading vocalists, Bryan Hutson and Ian Owens.

People laugh about the revolving door of gospel music groups, referring to the number of changes in personnel that are experienced by this genre. However, in comparison to the national statistics of people with average secular jobs, Southern Gospel really isn't much different from the norm. The Department of Labor statistics say that the median number of years that workers had been with their current employer was 4.6 in January 2012. ¹ Also, the average person held 11.3 jobs from age 18 to age 46.²

It is quite likely that persons born after 1964 will hold more jobs in their working careers than their parents did, decreasing that median number of years per job. So when gospel fans see personnel changes in their favorite groups every two or three years, it is really not surprising, considering the demands of road travel and financial considerations. Soul'd Out's previous members who departed this year were long-term veterans of the group, in

relation to the general statistics. Tanner Stahl, the group's previous baritone, left the group after a five-year tenure. Bass singer Matt Fouch departed after eight years. The length of stay for both of these gentlemen is a tribute to the type of group Soul'd Out is and the bonds between the members.

Bryan Hutson came to Soul'd Out from the Kingsmen, having been with the group for ten years total, in two separate stints. Ian Owens arrived from Ernie Haase and Signature Sound (EHSS), where he traveled with the group for two years. Prior to EHSS, Owens had been with The Imperials for over seven years. These two gentlemen are both still loyal to their previous groups and knew that when God said it was time to move on, they needed to obey.

"I joined Soul'd Out in December of 2011," says Hutson. "I recorded 2 CD's with them before I actually sang on stage with them. My first official concert was in January of 2012. I became friends with Matt Rankin in 2007 and The Kingsmen worked with them a few times and I began to get to know the other members of Soul'd Out. I was impressed with their talent but their desire to see souls won for the Kingdom of God inspired me. When the opportunity came to come on board with them, Yvonne and I contacted our spiritual mentors and our prayer wasn't, "God let this happen," but instead it was, "God if this is Your will, open the door; if it's not, close this door." He opened it and we couldn't be happier."

Dusty Barrett sings tenor with the group and is thrilled with the new additions. He agrees with Hutson that the quartet's main desire is to have people drawn closer to the Lord. "Without question, Soul'd Out is a *ministry-first* group," says Barrett. "Although we absolutely love Southern Gospel, the guys of Soul'd Out are focused on seeing souls saved through our music. We also take the opportunity of being out on the road to witness to people at restaurants, truck stops and anywhere else the bus stops during the week.

emcee, etc. I love that each one is excellent at what they do, yet so humble. God truly has blessed me to allow me to be able to do what we do with such quality people."

"The guys all have such a heart for ministry," agrees Hutson. "So many times, we use the term *heart for ministry* and don't really mean it. However, these guys live it." Hutson continues, "The best part for me is that we are all of the same mindset; we give God our best, honor our family,



I know that there are a lot of other groups like that, but as I watch the lives of the guys I sing with, I'm so proud to be singing and traveling with them. I know that in the shadows, when there is no way anyone would ever know if they slip up, these guys are strong men of integrity; they truly sing and minister with all their hearts. The guys I share the stage with are not only my coworkers, but they're my prayer partners, my accountability partners, and my brothers."

When Matt Rankin, Soul'd Out's manager and lead singer, was asked to comment upon the current line-up, he found it difficult to express everything in his heart. "You don't have enough time for me to tell you all about my guys," Rankin says. "I love them dearly. They are each unique, yet all on the same page. I love the closeness. I love that I can ask them to pray about something and they do it! I love that they push me to be a better singer, songwriter,

focus on ministry and make good quality music. Also, Soul'd Out's schedule allows me much more time to be with my family."

Soul'd Out is recognized in the industry as truly being sold out to their faith and their commitment to ministry. Greg Bentley, head of Publishing at Crossroads, respects these men greatly. "I appreciate that they are real," says Bentley. "Their focus is not on being the top quartet in the industry, it's on ministering to the people they sing to. I have known Matt Rankin since he was a teenager; I know where he is coming from and I admire that he has stuck with his beliefs as the group has grown. Would they like to be considered one of the top quartets? Sure they would, but that is not their focus."

One of the industry's favorite musicians, Dr. Jerry

Goff, shares, "I can best give you a quote by quoting a friend of mine, Dr. Rhodes of the First General Baptist of Jackson, MO, who talked to me after Soul'd Out visited his church. 'Jerry,' he said, 'we had Soul'd Out last evening. They entertained us with their talents and they ministered to us with their commitment. Three people accepted Christ after their testimonies. They are the ultimate gospel quartet!""

Another industry fan is Aaron Wilburn. "Soul'd Out Quartet is always a great group of guys to work with!" Wilburn continues, "They love what they do and there's always support from them for other artists. Not only that, they know how to connect with the audience and bring smiles and joy to people! I'm anxious to hear the new sound with the addition of Ian Owens...what a great voice!! And he's short!" laughs Wilburn, who can relate to Owen's stature. "My one on one conversations with the group almost always end up with the topic of ministering, not entertaining. I truly believe their desire is to touch and change lives."

Continuing the legacy of touching lives while working through personnel changes cannot be an easy task for any Christian group. Bryan Hutson talks about former bass singer, Matt Fouch, who departed from the group this past Spring. "I told someone that 'Legacy Five hired a good singer, but they got a great man," says Hutson. "I respect Matt Fouch for his stance for living a godly life." Hutson says he will miss Fouch's quick wit. "It is difficult filling any position in any group, however, finding the right bass singer is a task. We heard some fine singers and made some lifelong friends through out the process, but we wanted God's peace about who to hire. I told the guys that I'd rather see us go as a trio than to just hire someone."

Matt Rankin talks about the seemingly long transition period. "Anytime a group is in transition it feels uncomfortable and abnormal, especially for us since we had been without a permanent bass singer for two-and-a-half months." Rankin continues, "However, our friends, fans and supporters who have been a part of the Soul'd Out extended family, have really shown us a lot of grace during these uncertain times. They have encouraged us and prayed for us."

Prayers and encouragement are so important in times of change, especially as the search for a new member can be a daunting task for a quartet. Hutson explained part of the process of finding that perfect fit. "I am friends with Butch Owens of the Blackwood Brothers, who is also Ian's Dad. He called Matt Rankin after Ian announced he was leaving EHSS. We all discussed him going with us one weekend. We all prayed for a few weeks before he ever got on the bus."

Rankin fills in some of the details. "From the time of the resignation of our previous bass singer, we decided that we would pray and seek God for wisdom in hiring the right person, even if it meant not filling the bass position at all. We auditioned several great guys. Most of them fit us in a few ways, but not in all. With absolutely nothing negative toward any of those people who tried out, we just didn't feel like it was the right fit with any of them. The same night we decided we were finished with auditions and that Soul'd Out would remain a trio, I got a call from Ian's dad asking if we had filled the position. Ian's dad, known as Butch, drove the bus for us before. Ian and I got in contact after that and it felt like the right thing. I felt like God was in it."



Hutson agrees that God was in this change and says, "Ian is a quick study and is a great singer, who just happens to sing low. Glen Payne told me years ago, 'Bryan, if you can't sing a note every night, don't sing it.' I have tried to live by that rule. A lot of bass singers try to sing outside their limitations. Ian has a great range and great solo voice. I'm excited about traveling with him." Hutson continues, "He strives to protect his integrity. I really respect him for that. Plus, he gets my humor." When asked about unique characteristics about the new singer, Hutson adds, "He is a comic book guy and I am too. Also, he loves eating at Japanese Steakhouses."

At the time of this interview, Owens had not been with the group very long. Dusty Barrett talks about the challenge to get to know a new member in a short span of time. "To be honest, we've only had one weekend to be on the road with Ian," says Barrett. "After we knew it was a possibility of him joining our team, all of the guys started to interact with him via text and Facebook, trying to get to know him as well as possible to get a feel for his personality. As our press release stated, we had decided to go trio before Ian contacted us. In order for him to fit and change our minds, he was really going to have to impress us, not only vocally but in all the other areas as well. From the minute he was on the bus, Ian seemed right at home, and he definitely brought it vocally. When we realized his heart for ministry and for people was right in line with ours, we all knew it was a perfect fit. I'm so excited to get to know him more and to share the stage with him every night."

Matt Rankin is thrilled with the fit of Owens within the team of Soul'd Out. "Ian is no doubt a great singer and I am excited about his abilities to communicate a solo verse as well as sing a rich bass line; however, that's not what I am excited about the most." Rankin continues, "The week he went on the road with us, I noticed him connecting with the audience before the program. He was shaking hands, hugging necks and loving on the people. I noticed it, because that's what I do! Our duty is not to just sing songs, but to communicate messages as well as live out what we are singing about. We truly want to reach the lost and encourage the broken and Ian falls right in line with that."

Ian Owens himself is enjoying getting to know the other guys in the group and learning how he fits into this strong team. "I am so excited about my future with Soul'd Out Quartet!" says Owens. "In my short time with them it is so evident that the men of Soul'd Out Quartet are fervently seeking God's face and are fighting to see souls won into the Kingdom. The five of us: Matt, Dusty, Michael, Bryan, and myself, are definitely equally yoked in our desires to evangelize, to spread the Good News, and to be flat out goofy!"

Bryan Hutson says the first few weeks after a major change is a time of adaptation. "It is really just getting to know the new member." Hutson explains, "We all have our little quirks and we are all on our best behavior for the first few weeks, so getting to know the real side of the new person is interesting." The group itself needs to allow the new member to find his own place within the quartet. Hutson says, "Through my many years of being in gospel music, you always want to get the new person his own identity. You need to record something with the new person as soon as possible. Fans will automatically compare the new guy to whoever was last in that position. So, getting the new person their own songs to sing makes it easier on the singer and group."

As Ian Owens adapts to his position in Soul'd Out and the current members learn all about his personality and comic-book quirks, he still retains good ties with Ernie Haase and Signature Sound. "My wife, Megan and I are expecting our third child so I needed a little bit *milder* tour schedule. I will miss my EHSS brothers. They are fantastic men and the past two years have been an incredible and invaluable experience, but I know my time with Soul'd Out Quartet is sure to be amazing!"

Dusty Barrett comments on the factors that cause singers to move to different groups and how quartets like theirs respond to these times of adjustment. "To be honest, nobody likes change," says Barrett. "And no matter how much you don't want it to happen and no matter how hard you try to avoid it, it's going to happen. I've been in full time ministry for 12 years and I've been blessed to only have been with two groups, Crystal River and Soul'd Out. But you realize that there are four other guys in the group who have families and lives away from the group. Sometimes those lives veer in another direction than where the group is headed. Sometimes God tells you to move, and you better move."

"There are a million different reasons for change, but in this business, flexibility and adaptability are good qualities to have." Barrett continues, "I think the key to making a good change is doing your homework on the front end before you hire someone and make sure it's right. There are a lot of things that have to fit in order for it to work, and the voice is probably the least of those."

Soul'd Out is privileged to have the voice and character of new bass singer Ian Owens, which rounds out the sound of a group that according to Arthur Rice of the Kingdom Heirs, have great potential for even bigger things ahead of them. "I've had the privilege to work with Soul'd Out for several years now," says Rice. "I actually worked with Dusty when he was with Crystal River so I've known him a while. I appreciate the way Matt treats his guys and his commitment to staying true to a quartet sound. Bryan has a

signature vocal sound and stage presence and Michael is a great pianist. It's always difficult to replace a member who's been with a group for a while but I think Ian has already solidified his place with the group." Rice continues, "These guys are always a treat to work with in the studio. They know their chops and ability but are always eager to stretch themselves to become better singers. I'm excited at what the Lord has in store for Soul'd Out's future."

As Dusty Barrett looks at the future of the group and it's direction, he says, "Soul'd Out is going to keep on the path we're on. I think we've all developed a sort of tunnel vision, just trying to find ways to minister, find ways to encourage the child of God, and find ways to tell the lost about the saving grace of Jesus. Sure, we'd like to see blessings as far furthering our reach, i.e. radio, more promoters using us, etc. But we just want to be used. And whatever God's definition of that is, that's fine with us. I've never been around a group of more awesomely talented people who are so absolutely humble and not self-seeking. If people never know our individual names, or even the name of Soul'd Out, but find a personal relationship with Jesus because of something we've sung, said or done, we're tickled to death with that, and it was worth leaving our families for that week."

Jeff Collins of Crossroads says Soul'd Out is a great quartet to work with in the studio. "I mainly deal with Matt Rankin of Soul'd Out when it comes to the business end and I really appreciate Matt's sensible approach to decision making," says Collins. "He makes sure of costs involved before scheduling new releases and keeps his account current. That alone tells me a lot! I've known Matt for quite a while now and he's a good guy with a heart for God and the Gospel through music. All of the members of Soul'd Out are ministry-minded and have their priorities in order, seeking God's direction in what they are doing. They are a producer's dream in the studio, as they actually let me produce, and have confidence that the Crossroads team and I will produce a first class recording for them."

When asked about Soul'd Out's new bass singer, Collins says, "It's too early for me too comment on Ian yet, but I'm sure he will be an asset to the group as he is a fine bass singer. I'm sure it will take time for him to learn to blend with this group of singers, to discover what works best for Soul'd Out. I look forward to producing him in the studio and getting to know him."

Greg Bentley agrees with co-worker Collins. "The guys are a blast to work with. On their latest recording titled *What The World Doesn't Know*, I got to work with them from the photo shoot on through the finished CD. These guys love having fun and cutting up. They had the photographer bent over laughing at times and they are the same way anytime you are around them. You can tell they really enjoy what they do. At the same time, they have that serious side too, and we have had some deep conversations about songs, performances, and the personal side of ministering at each date they do. I guess if I tried to sum this up, it would be

they are the *Real Deal*. I would not question recommending them to any church or promoter that I know."

Bryan Hutson talks about Soul'd Out's latest recording. "What The World Doesn't Know was released in January 2012 and all songs were written by members of Soul'd Out. That's pretty awesome. My favorite song is 'Thank You Lord', not because it features me, but because we so many times get caught up in asking God for this and that, that we fail to thank Him for what He's already done." Hutson says the audience's favorite song from that recording is "Worthy The Lamb Is He". Hutson explains, "It is a song of praise to God and people are moved when we all are praising God."

Soul'd Out fans looking forward to some new recordings with the current members will be thrilled to know that there are some releases coming soon. "We are actually working on three new recordings," says Hutson. "One will be a collection of classic quartet songs and hymns entitled *Soulace 2.*" *Soulace* was released in January of 2012. Hutson continues, "Then we are releasing two CD's that will feature 20 Soul'd Out Quartet favorites from previous albums. The new guys, Ian and myself, will be on these recordings." Fans can look for these new recordings in early 2013.

As Soul'd Out adjusts to the changes that have occurred this past year and move on into 2013 with a fresh sound, Matt Rankin says that some things just don't change. Soul'd Out will remain sold out to Christ. "Our main goal is to reach more people, win more souls, and keep lifting the name of our Savior as high as we can; to be better husbands and fathers, better church members and just better Christians." However, he says with a smile, "Our long term goals are classified."



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It seems at the mere mention of the phrase, "I know a secret," people react like the old EF Hutton commercial. For those of you younger than your 30's, there was a commercial for a financial company that came to a point where they said "When EF Hutton speaks...", then everyone in the commercial who had been conversing would suddenly freeze in their tracks and listen to what EF Hutton had to say. Secrets are usually like that, when someone says "Hey, I have a secret," people tend to look around to see if anyone else can overhear them then they draw close to hear the secret.

A **SECRET**, by definition, *is something that is hidden or concealed*. Secrets come in many forms, there are secrets that individuals have about themselves, and there are secret recipes, secret documents, secret locations and secrets about processes or ways to do things.

I don't know why I've never noticed this word in Philippians 4:12, but Paul used the word "SECRET" in this passage. He said "I have learned the **SECRET** of being content in every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or living in want." I've read that scripture more times than I can count but one day I read it and the word "SECRET" jumped off the page and Paul had my full attention. It was as if I were looking around to see if anyone could overhear us and I drew in and read a little further to see what this secret was, because by all means I have been in those

places in life and I wanted to know this secret that Paul had discovered.

In the very next verse Paul says "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me". Ah, so that's the BIG SECRET to contentment! Perhaps this word "SECRET" gets bypassed by such a favorite scripture of Christians throughout the ages. This is Philippians 4:13 and is one many cite as a favorite verse; "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." But so often with scripture, we isolate one verse and do not connect it with its entire context; I think we often miss keys to the application of a scripture or its full ramifications to our lives because we underline, highlight or isolate that one scripture that sounds so great. And it is great! We CAN do all things through Christ! However, this verse became more alive to me when I realized "it's a SECRET to life"!!! It's more than just a great promise; it is a KEY to living through all situations and circumstances in this life and finding contentment and strength while in the midst of them!

But wait, there's more to this SECRET of Paul's! Secrets are discovered, they are found out, we usually come by them through some previous experience or circumstance and they become revealed to us through these situations.

A few years earlier, Paul had written a few letters to the church at Corinth, (1 & 2 Corinthians). In 2nd Corinthians the 12th chapter Paul shared how he had been struggling with

a physical infirmity. He didn't say what it was but it must have been pretty serious because Paul prayed to God three times for this circumstance or situation to be removed. Remember, this is Paul, he had already seen many miracles and manifestations of God's miraculous answer to his requests. Not this time, Paul received his SECRET here in this moment, something that would prove more valuable than any other miracle Paul had been a part of. In 2 Corinthians 12:9 the Lord replied to Paul's many prayers with, "My grace is sufficient for your every need."

In other words, the grace of God given to us through Jesus Christ is more than just a way to salvation, it is our strength. Paul went on to say that he would boast all the more gladly about his weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on him. That is why for Christ's sake, Paul said he would delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, and in difficulties. Paul said, "For when I am weak, then I am strong." The saving grace of God does more than save us from our sins, it can be our salvation in every situation of life!

You see, our own will power and our own strength will never be enough to produce contentment or strength in all our situations. No matter how strong we think we are or how much resolve we have to our own human will power. There are many times in our life where we have to apply the power of God's grace to our circumstance. We have to pray, "God, I can't handle this situation in my own power, I need Your grace to be my strength today. I need you to give

me Your grace in this moment to face what I'm facing."

THAT is the SECRET to doing all things through Christ and finding strength and contentment in ALL circumstances of life. Allowing the grace of God to be our strength! And guess what, I've tried this SECRET and it works! It works much better than my own willpower and strength have worked in the past to try to make the best of circumstances or speak positive because we are limited in our humanity but there are no limits to what God's grace can do! The power of Christ and the grace it brings is truly amazing!

Now, typically when you know a secret you guard it and only tell a few trusted friends. In this case, this is a SECRET that needs to be shared with the world! A SECRET that tells us how to live through the high's and low's, up's and down's, and twists and turns of life! What a great SECRET ... I'm glad Paul shared it with me! ;)

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

Sitting on a piano bench at the young age of three years old, Gordon Mote began a journey that has literally taken him across the country and around the world. For even as a young boy, God began preparing Gordon for a journey far greater than he ever imagined possible. Now, he travels more than 150 dates per year and works on recording sessions for a wide array of Gospel and Country artists each week. He has become one of the most sought-after recording studio session players in Nashville, receiving the Academy of Country Music Award for Piano/Keyboard Player of the Year in 2009 and 2011. But through it all, Gordon keeps his eyes on the One who made it all possible: God. He gives God the glory for his music, his family, and his life.

"I'm sure it was a big influence in me even knowing [Gospel] music because I'm sure Mama and Daddy didn't listen to a whole lot of other at that time," Gordon said. "But I remember playing [piano] in church. My first memories of playing piano were mostly gospel songs. As I grew up, as a kid, I'd listen to all kinds of radio and I'd play

anything I heard, if it was a television commercial, or a country song, or a pop song, or a gospel song. But we grew up listening to Southern Gospel and as I got older, contemporary music."

While Gordon has ventured into several genres of music throughout his career, there is still a special place in his heart for the music that started it all. The timeless melodies and old familiar lyrics of the Gospel classics hold fond memories for Gordon.

"We had a radio station in our hometown, WGAD, in Gadsden," Gordon stated, "and they had a Sunday morning program called Songs of Inspiration. That's where we heard so many of the songs that my brother and I learned to sing. That's why the "Songs I Grew Up Singing" record I have out now is so important to me because it brings back a lot of great memories and it just proves that great lyrics and great songs can stand the test of time. You put a new face on it and it's like it's brand new again."

Gordon credits Bill Gaither for giving him the platform on which to begin his ministry. He said his six years traveling with the Gaither Homecoming tour was a memorable journey, one that he cherishes to this day. He still joins the tour on select dates whenever his schedule allows.

Speaking of the Gaither Homecoming Friends, Gordon said the best part of being at a taping for the Homecoming Video series is what people do not see on the videos. He says that the Homecoming Friends are like a big family. They share stories, tell jokes, and even argue a little bit. But at the end of the day, they care for each other and love each other like one big happy family.

Gordon is part of the younger generation of Gospel Music artists, so I asked him what it was like to follow in the footsteps of so many of the Gospel Music legends. His response was that it is "weird." He said people always come up to him at concerts, complimenting him and his ministry. And he said they say things about him like he would say of many of the legends. He humbly said that it seems odd at times that people will pay for a ticket just to come see him. But he said he enjoys talking to people and meeting new people, which is why he said his autograph line usually moves a bit slower than others nearby. Surely, this is a trait of someone who truly loves what they do and appreciates the people who come to hear him perform.

In addition to being a pianist, producer, songwriter, and serving in other facets of the music industry, Gordon is first and foremost a husband and father. He says, "Being a husband and father means everything to me." He and his wife Kimberly have been married 20 years now, and they have three children, Samantha, Parker, and Ashton. He says that he loves his wife more today than the day they were married. He says that Parker is his little athlete, while Samantha sings, plays the piano, and is a budding artist, and Ashton is his funny child, although Samantha can be a bit funny at times as well. He said Ashton will definitely be an entertainer when he grows up. Gordon said that he loves just being home and spending time with his family.

During the interview, I asked Gordon what he hoped his children would teach their children one day. He said they plan to spend Thanksgiving with their family, and he hopes they will want to come home to their house like he enjoys going to their

parents' homes. Above all, he hopes that his children will tell their children about Jesus.

Gordon is definitely a family man. When you speak to him, you can tell he beams with pride when he is talking about his family. He said, "The single greatest moment of my life was marrying my wife, as well as the day I got saved and the birth of my three children."

In life, we all face our share of challenges. But Gordon has had to face a daily challenge in his life since the day he was born: blindness. He said this has been the biggest challenge he has ever had to face. He said in school, there weren't always books on tape available, or braille books, so he had to make do with what materials were available. He said he was mainstreamed into public school when he was in third grade. He went on to graduate from high school with honors, and then he received a full scholarship to Jacksonville State University in Jacksonville, AL. Three years later, Gordon transferred to Belmont University in Nashville, TN. He graduated Cum Laude with a degree in music.

By the musical success he has garnered, it is evident that this music degree has definitely been worthwhile. Gordon has worked with renowned artists in Gospel Music and Country music as well, including Bill Gaither, Rascal Flatts, Steven Curtis Chapman, and Lee Greenwood. He was also named the Anthony Burger Instrumentalist of the Year at the 2012 Diamond Awards Show. He says, "I'm honored to receive this award, and I thank SGN Scoops for everything y'all are doing."

I asked Gordon what advice he would give to a young artist just starting out. He said that he would tell them to start by perfecting their craft, singing in their local area, and seeing where God leads. He said God may open a door for them to branch out, or He may have something for them to do right in their local area.

Gordon said in ten years, he hope to either be continuing to travel on the road if the Lord allows or staying close to home with his family. Either way, I know that Gordon will be following the road paved by God and God alone.

He said if he could talk to God face to face, he would probably not say anything. He said he would likely be rendered speechless, unable to

speak, in awe of God's awesome presence.

Even with his blindness and the other challenges he has encountered in life, Gordon says that he could sum up his life with one song: "Through It All." Through it all, he has learned to trust in Jesus. Through it all, he has learned to depend upon His word.

Gordon is excited about his new Christmas project titled "The Star Still Shines." This project combines Southern Gospel, inspirational, and country styles with a healthy mix of new and traditional Christmas songs and carols, including Michael W. 


SOMEDAY SOON


HELD IN HIS ARMS

Randy and Sherri Miller are accomplished Gospel artists who are singing, speaking and laughing their way across America. Randy is a Kingsmen alumni, a recipient of numerous Singing News and other Southern Gospel awards and a lifetime inductee of the Alabama Music Hall of Fame. Sherri sang with her family, The Kenny Parker Trio, before doing session and stage work with such artists as Dolly Parton, The Judds and Michael English. Today this couple has joined their accomplished vocals, love of life and ability to make others laugh as they share their music with audiences far and wide.

When Randy Miller left the Kingsmen, he began a solo

career and started Snippa Creek Studios. Sherri Parker Miller joins her husband in making music and laughter with their recently released *Randy Miller Comedy* album and the soon-tobe released *Where It All Comes From*. If something taps into your emotions, whether through humor or song, it will work its way into your heart; but it all comes from the Lord as far as the Millers are concerned

The title track of *Where It All Comes From* is sung by Sherri and written by Kenna Turner West, one of Southern Gospel's most prolific songwriters. The song is currently on Sound Cloud and showcases the versatility of this talented couple. Kenna says, "Sherri is an amazing vocal talent and all who know her appreciate her sweet, joyful spirit."

Dusty Wells, head of sales and marketing at Word Entertainment, shares, "I love Sherri! I remember the first time I met Sherri was at the National Quartet Convention years ago while sitting with Dottie Rambo at The Rambo's booth. I knew of her because her Daddy, Kenny Parker, was The Rambo's long time pianist. So when this blonde curly haired little beauty of a girl came to the booth, Dottie just went on and on about her and how special she was. Our friendship grew over the years."

"What I love about Sherri is that not only is she a wonderful singer and communicator, but she is a lover of people," says Wells. "She is always

consistent, always happy and always caring for others. I love her spirit and I love that God is using her. She is so special and I cherish her friendship!"

Another close friend of the couple is Johnathan Bond of Young Harmony. "I love Sherri and Randy because they practice what they preach, plus they are awesome to be around. Also, during a very dark period of my life, they offered a shoulder. They are Christians in action!"

Through the friendship of many in the Gospel music industry, Randy and Sherri have been able to make some of their dreams come true, such as their studios. "We recorded *Where It All Comes From* at Snippa Creek Studios," says Randy. "We've got a location in Alabama and in Nashville, but most of it has been done in Alabama which is our larger studio of the two. We bring the Nashville guys down and track down there." Studio players included Jeremy Metcalfe, Reggie Duncan, Danny Crawford and Scott Maynard.

"One of the songs that we recorded on *Where It All Comes From* is called "Make My Heart Your Home' and was written by my Dad, Kenny Parker," says Sherri. "It's a song that Janet Paschal recorded 25 years ago, maybe longer, when she was with Jimmy Swaggart. We decided that we would re-do that for many reasons, but it was very emotional for me and then for Mom to hear it too."

"As far as our background vocals, Sherri and I did pretty much everything because we've vocally schizophrenic," jokes Randy. "We thought, 'well it would be great to get so and so to sing on this project'; but it's hard to get people together with our schedules. To wait would delay the album a tremendous amount. So we just do it ourselves because Sherri and I both do background sessions for tons of people." Sherri laughs, "Plus, we're cheap! No, just kidding!"

"There's another song we're doing on the project called 'Bedtime Prayer' and it was written by a good friend, Joe Stephens who writes for our publishing company," says Randy. "It has just a drive about it," Randy continues. "The message is about being strong and telling the truth. It seems recently that maybe the Message has been watered down a little bit. I think it just speaks directly to the Truth; that we need to stand up and declare God's Truth and declare the Word."

"I take from it, 'don't forget what you're supposed to be doing and get out there and do it, and keep pushing on towards the prize" says Sherri. "Don't forget your bedtime prayers. There are several lines in the song that are strong to me but every time we sing it, it is just really powerful to me.

"Joe Stephens is a great writer from here in Murfreesboro and writes for us a good bit," says Randy. "He's a super writer, just a young kid, real goofy. He's a short little redhead and I call him the *Lucky Charms* guy. Birds of a feather flock together and I surround myself with funloving jokers," he laughs. "I think "Bedtime Prayers" is probably going to be released at the first of the year."

Randy and Sherri's fans look forward to new mu-

sic, but their audience really enjoys anything this couple brings to the stage. "There's a song that we do, it's called 'Faithful'; people really respond well to it," says Randy. "It's usually an outpouring of response because people go through trials and tribulations. I heard a fellow say once that we've either gone through a trial, we're in a trial, or we're about to go through one. But through it all we have to know that we have a Father Who is faithful through it all. It really hits home with a lot of people."

The Miller's music helps them connect with many people on the road and some who are privileged to call them *friends*. Brother Toby Hughes, Associate Pastor of New Zion Baptist Church in Covington, Louisiana, says, "Randy and Sherri Miller have blessed New Zion Baptist Church of Covington, L.A. over the past five years or more. Our church still marvels at the many God-given talents they have: multiple instruments and a range of styles, all presented in a humble, and at the same time, joyous and energetic way. They are God's live action team! We look forward to having them back in 2013."

Delmus Pinkard, Lay Minister of the House of Prayer Church of God in Oxford, Alabama says, "We had this couple at our church and they were a great blessing. They are truly anointed of God. We love their style of Southern Gospel music."

Other friends of the couple, Bob and Connie Scott, also enjoy the Miller's style of music. "Such a super talented couple that love God, they are what I would call just down-home friendly folks that I truly love to be around. I always look forward and anticipate seeing them; being with them and hearing them minister."

Along with traveling and ministering in churches, The Millers are busy by the Snippa Creek Studios work. "I built Snippa Creek Studios several years ago, says Randy. "We have two locations, one around the Auburn, Alabama area in Beulah, and a studio right outside of Nashville in Christiana, Tennessee. We have Nashville guys that we use and they don't mind traveling between the two places. These are guys that I've worked with throughout the years and throughout my music career. We'll go to BBQ's together and eat chicken and play frisbee and that kind of thing. We go back and forth; we keep the roads hot, between Tennessee and Alabama, working from one studio to the other."

"At the studio in Alabama, we have an apartment that is built onto it and we use that for clients who travel," Randy explains. "We've traveled all of our lives; we know that it takes money when you're out doing an album, when you're there for five days and you're paying for

five nights in a hotel. We've taken that into consideration so clients can stay in the apartment while they're recording." Randy is accomplished in the studio as well and has worked with many of the major talents in Gospel music including the Kingsmen, Gold City, Cathedrals, Gaithers, and Squire Parsons.



Randy is also a songwriter, although lately he says he's been writing more comedy songs than serious gospel tunes. Sherri says, "He likes to write funny songs about me, so he's been writing songs about my cooking, my driving and anything he can find to pick on me about. People end up really liking me by the end of the concert and are mad at him, so it works out good," she laughs.

"You know there are a lot of married couples out there and my comedy just talks about life pretty much," says Randy. "Mostly I'm making fun of just myself or Sherri. I just talk about her not cooking, as I do all the cooking and I like it and she doesn't have to cook. But I talk about trying to teach her how to cook something..." Sherri interrupts, "Or drive the car". Randy explains, "We bought a van. It was on a Wednesday night, we signed the papers and by Thursday morning Sherri had already wrecked it. We got it back from the body shop and she ran into somebody else. Then, just a couple of weeks ago, she ran into one of those little poles beside the gas pumps and locked it in there." By this time, both are laughing and Randy says, "So I've got some places to get humor from!"

"You learn to laugh at yourself and that's where most of the comedy comes from," Randy continues. "You know, songs about losing your car and how you can't find your car in the parking lot, or one song talks about the extreme price of coffee. You've paid \$6.00 for a latte, and I'm sure most people out there have paid four or five

dollars for a cup of coffee. You sit there and say no I'm not going to do that, but you had to have the coffee, it's so delicious. You can find humor in life; you just have to keep your eyes open."

Sherri loves her husband's songwriting and laughs along with the audience. "My favorite one Randy wrote is called 'Gone to Church Again," says Sherri. "It talks about when he was a little boy and how when he would stay with his grandma, she'd load him up for church every time the doors were open. One time he protested and didn't want to go and he had a 'come to Jesus' meeting with his grandma in the yard. He ended up going to church. And he didn't forget about it!"

Everywhere the Millers sing, people want to hear Randy's stories, so he decided he had to make a recording. "I played everything on the Comedy Album and I did all of it just by myself," says Randy. "I told Sherri on a Monday, 'I'm going to do a comedy album,' and by Friday we had product. I think they've heard so much bad news and gloom and doom, they want to laugh 'Happy is the man whose God is the Lord.' And I'm always laughing."

Randy and Sherri are more thankful than ever for family who keep them grounded and surrounded with support. "It's hard to balance everything but we do it," says Randy. "Thank God for grandparents! That's all I can say. They help and a lot of times the kids go with us on the road."

One of the Miller grandparents, Ann Miller, is Randy's mother and one of the couple's biggest fans.



"I guess the number one reason I love them so much is because they are my family," says Ann. "Another reason I love them is that they are so much fun to be around. Believe me, there is never a dull moment with these two. The third reason is that they are so talented. It is so amazing to watch them take the stage and minister in comedy, song and praise. They are a blessing to me!"



With their children growing up, the Millers are entering a new season of life. Sherri explains, "They're getting a lot older now, they're teenagers and driving and stuff like that. So they'll go with us if they can. They're really involved here at home in church and everything, so they sometimes have a lot going on and they'll stay home. But they like to be right in the middle of all our antics so a lot of times they go with us."

"They love music and aspire to do something in ministry involving music, singing and preaching and everything," says Sherri. "So we're proud of that, that God's got His Hand on their lives, and leading them into being crazy people like we are I guess! We have three kids. Our two boys, Parker and Preston, are 17 and 16 and Kirsten is 13. So we need all your prayers! That's all I can say—three teenagers..." Sherri laughs.

Randy says the teenagers are not really an official part of the traveling team. "Every once in a while they'll help unload some speakers or something like that but typi-

cally no, they don't do anything on stage."

Sherri says, "We're working them towards it though. The other night we had a couple of hours before one of our concerts and I found all of them in the back. They had some praise and worship songbooks and they were putting on their own little concert. Before it ended, the youth pastor and his kids and a bunch of other people were with them, just singing it up. So you never know, we might have the Miller Family Band traveling around, like the Partridge Family, or I don't know, the Klaudt Indian Family!"

The Miller family likes to be as active in their home church, New Vision in Murfreesboro Tennessee. "We're gone a lot though, so when we walk into the church we get visitors' cards," laughs Randy.

Sherri adds, "Our kids go constantly. But we're in and out so much it's hard to be plugged in all the time, but we do have a great support system."

"We go on Wednesday nights and I play with the worship team for the youth," says Randy. "There will probably be about 600 kids there that we're ministering to on Wednesday nights. We just enjoy it, we love our church"

For Randy and Sherri, remaining involved in their home church is only a part of their active spiritual life. They know that keeping their relationship fresh with the Lord through prayer and teaching as well, keeps their own relationship strong. "Sherri and I pray together and that's imperative to a ministry; to keep in contact with the Father, the One that you're working for, and to know His voice," says Randy. "I don't listen to a lot of music on the radio, I listen to pastors. One guy that I really love is Carl Gallops. He's a pastor down in Milton Florida, really great friend of mine and I love to hear him speak. I love T.D. Jakes as well."

"We'll be almost asleep, flipping through TV channels and we'll come across Swaggart Ministries," says Sherri. "I love their music and worship, I just feel an anointing out of that a lot. I also really enjoy our pastor from New Vision, Pastor Brady Cooper. He's an incredible speaker, gifted, and throws in a lot of humor. A lot of times when a pastor is speaking it's hard to stay focused. Pastor Cooper keeps you really interested in what he has to say and with humor gets you to hear the meat of what he's bringing in his message. We also hear a lot of great speakers in the local churches where we go and sing. I get so tickled because there are certain places I love to go back to sing, just to hear the pastor speak on Sunday mornings. That means a lot. It feeds us."



Explaining the importance of a personal prayer life, Randy reveals, "Everything that I've learned to play has been because of prayer and fasting. You have to put legs on those prayers and work, but when I started out trying to learn how to play harmonica which was my first instrument, I just couldn't get it. So I said, 'I'm getting really serious.' I got down on my face before God and said, 'I'm going on a fast here God and I want You to help me learn to play this thing.' I started missing those meals and praying every day and bugging everybody in the house trying to practice. Eventually it came, as well as all the other things I've learned to play."

"I didn't start singing until I was 19 and went from there to hearing parts and it was all because of prayer," continues Randy. "Individually, you have to stay in constant contact with the Father because you know His Voice when you're talking to Him all the time. It's like I could call my buddy in Kansas once a year, and if he calls me maybe one time out of the year, when I pick up the phone if I don't see his number pop up on the screen, chances are I don't know who it is. But if I talk to him every day, when he'd call all he'd have to say is 'Hey buddy' and I would know his voice."

"That's the same thing with God. If we stay in constant contact with Him, we're going to know His Voice; we're going to know what He's saying, how He's leading us and guiding us."

As Randy and Sherri continue to preach and pray and sing and laugh, the Millers are reaching many with

the Word of God. Randy says, "There's still evangelism in us right now. He told us in His Word to go into the highways and hedges." He pauses. "Gracious, I've been on the highways a long time! I told someone the other day, I'm ready to get in the hedges and be still for a little while."

It doesn't look like Randy and Sherri Miller are planning to slow down any time soon. As they continue to reach audiences with laughter, lyrics and love, the Millers are moving in the path God has laid out for them. "God is speaking to us that time is short; there's a harvest out there and we need to continue to press on," Randy continues. "We have just a narrow window to tell people about Christ's love. They have a Savior that loves them and if they don't know Him, they need to hear that today is the day of salvation for them and they can know Him."

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"When you sit down to eat with a ruler, consider carefully what is before you;

And put a knife to your throat if you are a man given to appetite.

Do not desire his delicacies, for they are deceptive food" (Proverbs 23:1-3 NKJV).

What can one little holiday dinner do? A lot. The average woman who eats 2,000 calories on a normal day may find herself indulging in 4,500 calories and over 200 grams of fat—at one huge meal! According to *The New England Journal of Medicine*, many Americans gain as much as five pounds between Thanksgiving and New Year's. Often that extra weight is likely to stay with us longer than it took to put it on.

Some nutritionists suggest starting around the beginning of December by cutting 100-300 calories per day so you can splurge a bit during the holidays and still fit into your clothes on January 1st! It can be as simple as not adding the extra cheese on a sandwich, or forgoing the afternoon coffee drink. Have an apple instead.

Seven Quick Eat-Smart Tips:

1. Decide you will not sample foods when cooking or wandering through the kitchen.

- 2. Don't cook on an empty stomach. Instead, enjoy a good breakfast first to stave off hunger.
- 3. Take your vitamins with a big glass of water after breakfast. Taking your supplements early in the day ensures your body is getting the nutrition it needs. Your body will be less apt to crave empty calories, and you'll have more energy, too.
- 4. Have water or seltzer water with flavored stevia handy as you start cooking. I like adding a few drops of vanilla flavored stevia sweetener to a glass of seltzer water. It tastes just like cream soda, but without the sugar, calories or chemicals.
- 5. During the day, pop some gum, a breath-freshener strip or brush your teeth to keep from snacking. One study showed that about 10% of the extra calories from holiday meals are consumed *before* the actual meal itself.
- 6. Peppermint oil helps curb your appetite. A recent study by Dr. Bryan Raudenbush at the Wheeling Jesuit University in West Virginia evaluated hunger levels and food intake of participants who inhaled peppermint oil and those who did not over a two-week period. Those who inhaled the peppermint oil consumed an average of 3,000 fewer calories per week (approximately 23% less than those who did not inhale the peppermint oil!). Those who used the oil indicated that their hunger levels were significantly lower,

- too. You can get peppermint oil at most health food stores (and toothpaste can work in a pinch).
- 7. At parties, go for the brightly colored vegetable and salmon appetizers and steer clear from dips, creamy sauces and anything light brown (usually means it's fried).

It's best not to announce to everyone what you're doing if you want to "eat smart" during the Christmas and New Year's festivities. It only makes them uncomfortable, and they may try to force you to eat something you know you'd be smart not to eat. This doesn't mean don't enjoy some of the special foods you only get to see once a year. Just be smart about it. It's said the first bite is usually the best, so choose carefully—and hopefully we won't need to put the butter knife to our throat in Proverbs 23 fashion!

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In the world of gospel music, the name "Phil Cross" has to be one of the most esteemed names around. Since Phil began songwriting, he has certainly blessed many with his gift. Unforgettable compositions such as "Champion of Love," "I am Redeemed" and "When I Get Carried Away" are just a few examples of songs that claimed the number one spot during his career. Respected by peers and loved by many, Phil has received numerous nominations and awards from Singing News, the GMA Dove Awards, Diamond Awards and the Southern Gospel Music Association.

In addition to songwriting, Phil has made significant contributions to the Gospel Music Industry and the church by singing, speaking, mentoring and producing. Phil tours as a soloist and with the group he founded, Poet Voices. It is safe to say, Phil lives out the mission statement of Cross Music Group and that is... "To use music to lead people to Christ and to encourage believers. Whether it is through touring or through our products it is our desire to share God as we proclaim Him and praise Him around the world."

While most of Phil's work has circled primarily in the southern gospel arena, God recently deposited a new desire into his heart. Obeying the Spirit of the Lord, Cross Music Group has created a new worship project entitled *BREAKTHROUGH*. This God- originated project has been written to minister to the church of today as well as to the heart of God.

"I've known for several months that I was supposed

to write a project for the church to use to worship musically," Phil shares, "So- I gathered some co-writers-Matthew Browder, Tim Lovelace and Lisa Young and started talking to them about this project and we started writing songs."

"I just knew as somebody that's been involved in Gospel music for years traveling a lot and going into churches, I see what's going on within the church and it's just heartbreaking," Phil explains. "The church is set up where you pick your style and go to church based on your favorite style of music. I don't think there is much we can do about that- it's just that this is where the present day church has moved. It's like going to Burger King, you can order your music style- you can have it your way- and if you're not getting your way, you can go to a church where they're doing it your way. It is heartbreaking to me that church has become 'have it your way' instead of 'have it God's way.' We should go to church and talk about God, worship God, sing about God and sing to God. For a writer that has been singing songs and writing songs about God, I thought it was time for me to just talk to God and thank Him for my life just like King David did in the Psalms. This {project} is just me talking to God with my friends who have joined this team. We are talking to God, doing music, not based on style, not based on trying to deliver that custom meal. We just threw that out the window and did this the way we feel we should do it naturallythat's what BREAKTHROUGH is about."

Phil continues, "We are hoping that churches who



have divided up their congregations by music style will come together at least for maybe one event and bring the whole church and that includes the young and old, the people who like hymns, and the people who like contemporary. People that have followed me over the years will think that I have jumped off a cliff or something, but that is not the case. This music came from my spirit and my heart. I love it! I think I've probably enjoyed this more than anything I've ever worked on."

The work on the project has been enjoyable to Phil because his dearest friends joined his efforts. "I love the team aspect," Phil says, "I could have done a *Phil Cross Sings Worship CD*, but I chose to involve the team of people and voices I love to work with here in this town and around. I have confidence in the work these people do and they are like family."

"Our team consists of three girls and three guys," Sheri Thrower Vice President of Marketing for CMG and vocalist shares. "We have Dan Callahan, from Poet Voices, Carrie Streets, another wonderful worship leader in Chattanooga, Lisa Young, formerly of Hillsong and Rob Alley, Worship Leader in Tennessee. The great thing is that we are all really good friends; we connect well that way and in the studio. Our voices naturally blend together, mine and Phil's has for years. I arrange for Cross Music Group, so I have worked with these people through the years. We have a bond. I think we all have the same heart for worship because we all are worship leaders."

Lisa Young agrees, "Considering the caliber in my mind- the fact we are all worship leaders- it is truly amazing to watch! There are no egos, no worship egoswe literally have a blast together and it just comes together naturally. It is really wonderful to watch, I love it."

"Out of all of us, Lisa is the one that has the most "real-big-time" worship experience," Phil interjects. "Her background is amazing. She's lived in Australia, worked at Hillsong and was there when Darlene Zschech wrote 'Shout To The Lord.' She comes from that place where she has lived to worship, so she brought that musicality and lyric to the project." Phil continues, "She brought several songs she had partially written and had enough confidence in me to wrap them up. Typically, she does things I would not do. She plays chords that we have to google!"



"I'm the worst piano player in the world," Lisa laughs, "I'm probably the most non- musical person in theory out of the group- that's the ironic part. But, we do have to google the chords I play because I really don't know any theory. I've done the worship thing, and the secular industry as well- but for me, I always come back to worship. That's where my heart and passion is. It is definitely writing worship, it is my heart for the Lord."



Putting together this team was more than finding vocalists to sing the songs, but everyone shares the same vision for the project as Phil. "I think we all have the same heart for worship because we all are worship

leaders so we're not just reading notes or singing notes and lyrics off the page," Sheri says, "You have that experience behind you so that you really feel the heart for people and the need for this project and that is bringing people together and re-connecting generations."



"I think this project is going to be an eye-opener for a lot of people," Rob Alley adds. "People like to compartmentalize worship music like it's *either-or* stylistically, but that's not true. God doesn't listen to Southern Gospel and reject *modern* worship, nor does he do the opposite. If it's Spirit and Truth, it's worship to Him."

"It was an honor to participate in the upcoming release from Phil Cross and to see firsthand how his songwriting and production talents extend far beyond the



Southern Gospel roots he's known for," Carrie Streets shares. "His music is worshipful; while not abandoning his roots, on this project, he has written and compiled a group of songs that will reach all generations with their truth. I'm excited for praise teams and churches across the country to be able to lead their congregations in worship using these great songs that Phil has put together."

The title of the album is surely an attention grabber. Who doesn't need a breakthrough of some kind? "I think everybody looks for a breakthrough in some area of their life whether you are praying for a friend, or your own personal breakthrough," Sheri describes. "Every person that listens to this project is going to relate to it because we all need that. The good thing is, not only does God promise us the light and hope of a breakthrough, but He *is* Hope, He *is* Light and He *is* the breakthrough. I think people are going to get that when they listen to it."

"And," Sheri continues, "I think for the church as a whole, musically this project is a breakthrough. It is going to unite people. I think that is one thing we all at Cross Music Group have is a passion to see unity in the churches because we are all out there in it and we see the division and it is time for us to all come together. That's a big breakthrough. I really believe God has anointed Phil, Lisa and the other writers to write this project for this time for this purpose- to bring unity within the body of Christ because the truth is, we are divided."

"I think a great way to demonstrate that this project really connects is by the very fact that God used Philsouthern Gospel to the max and me-being from Hillsong together," Lisa says. "We are two opposite ends of the spectrum as far a style goes."

Phil Cross says there is something on this project for everyone and says the music is sing-able for congregations. "There are not a lot of elaborate additions to the music. In gospel, we tend to put a lot of elaborate arrangements together with key changes, big endings- that's just gospel music, and I love it, but for this, we don't have any modulations, I don't think there's a high ending or anything like that- it is for everybody to sing."

"There is something on this project that speaks to everyone in terms of their walk in life. And it comes about naturally, none of this was forced. These songs literally just flowed out of us," Lisa says.

The music promises to be top-notch for several reasons, but one is that Jeremy Medkiff is involved. "There is an unbelievable set of musicians on this project, some of the best I think I've ever seen," Dan shares. "They put their minds together and came out with things that are amazing. Jeremy has done an unbelievable job of going through every measure, every line, and every bar and just extracted the highest quality that was appropriate for each song."



"All of the songs are just all unbelievable," Dan continues, "Of course, with Phil writing them, the lyrics are not going to be superficial – it's going to be the deep gospel message straight from words of scripture and that in combination with just great music just gets ya going."

"One song on the project is called, "I Love You," Sheri adds. "It's a song to the Lord. We hear a lot of songs about God loving us and those are good, but this song just says, 'I love you'. How often do we really say that? I think this song is going to teach people how to tell the Lord and say it more often."

"Next To You" is another selection. "The central truth of 'Next to You' is that when we stay close to God and delight ourselves in Him, He gives us our hearts' desires," Rob explains. "Jesus said it best in Matthew 6:33--that if we seek His Kingdom first, there's no need, situation, or enemy that can overtake us. It's really and truly the cry of a worshiper—'Lord, just let me be closer to You.'"

"It was on a Saturday night," Phil recalls, "I called Lisa and said, 'We need a song without the drums and guitars. We need a song with just a piano and celloone that we can do at communion.' Sunday morning, she sent me a chorus called "I Remember" it was beautiful. We recorded it with the piano and cello. It stripped away all the loudness. It is simple but yet a reminder of what Christ did for us on the cross. I don't know of a lot of songs you can sing at communion."

Most of the team has worked with Phil before, but this project was a new experience for Rob Alley. He shares: "The fact that I just worked with *Phil Cross* on a project is CRAZY. When I was a kid, my dad played bass for the Singing Celestials and the Tennesseans, and there was always this name I heard floating around, almost with reverence; Phil, to me, became kind of this legendary figure, even as a kid. So to be involved in this now is really surreal. The thing that I think I've been most amazed by during this recording is the amount of input Phil asks for from the team. Lord knows he doesn't have to, but he's very humble, and he's genuinely interested in doing whatever is best to serve the songs."

Phil Cross has a sincere desire in helping people worship the *subject* of the music and not the *style*. "When I consider "Fairest Lord Jesus" for example and consider the grammar and description of the Lord Jesus Christ, I have to value that," Phil explains. "And when I consider "Almighty God" and look at that grammar, I have to cherish that. Why can't we cherish the subject of the music rather than the style of the music? Honestly, shouldn't we be in love with the subject of the music- the Lord Jesus Christ and our Father God and not just the style? We've made it about style. NEWS-FLASH... Heaven is not going to be divided into the contemporary service and the traditional service. Heaven is going to be about worshiping a Subject – and that is the Lord Jesus Christ, the Light of Heaven. And so, that is why we need to breakthrough this problem that is in the body of Christ."


When asked if there is anything he would like our readers at SGNScoops to know, Phil responded: "I don't want to be misunderstood, as Phil Cross. I'm a gospel writer; I will be a gospel writer until I die! I love southern gospel music. I love my heritage there, I embrace it, I still love it and I will love it 'til I die. I don't want anyone to think that I am getting out of one box and jumping into another box. I still enjoy gospel and proclaiming the gospel through music. That's done well in southern gospel. I'm a big fan of that and I'm going to keep working hard to make an impact with that kind of music. I am simply "broad" as an artist and I like today's mainstream worship music too. I know God has led me to write and produce this project with my friends. Period. We do expect Him to bless it just like He always blesses things that honor Him. I just want everybody to understand that I'm not taking sides. If you have to take sides, that's between you and God. My side is- if it honors God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, that's the side I am on! I'm not creating a buffet. My life is not about creating a buffet of music where you can go to this line and gets this, or go through Phil's line and get that. There are two purposes for music that I feel like I'm involved in: I have to describe God, or I have to talk to God. I have to do music to please Godnot to please the preferences of the human race in this

year that we are living in. If we do music that pleases God, somebody out there is going to be drawn to that, we're going to lift up the Lord in that, He's going to draw people to himself through it, and that's really all this is.

Cross Music Group has high hopes for *BREAK-THROUGH* and plans to work hard to get the music into churches. Phil intends to share the project in concert and with worship music companies in Nashville as well as offer the music on his website. Sheri intends to share the music on tour in the US as well as in Ireland. Dan, Rob and Carrie are using the new music in their churches with great response. "We have this project," Phil explains, "Now what God does with it, we don't know, but we do know that we did the right thing. We'll continue to work hard and follow the Lord and the rest

is up to God."

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












Kevin Mills is a singer and songwriter based in Virginia Beach, Virginia. At the end of October this past year, he and his wife Amanda found themselves in the projected path of Hurricane Sandy, one of the largest and most dangerous storms to hit the New England coast in years. Kevin Mills has faced other storms in his life and as he faced Sandy, he knew that the Creator of the wind would protect him now as He had in times past.

Kevin Mills originally came from the Canadian west and has been in ministry for 15 years, although he began singing for his father at age eight. His parents were evangelists and Kevin himself was the associate pastor at the Prairie Community Church in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba for a time. He and his wife Amanda moved to Virginia Beach two years ago.

This young, versatile artist has experienced personal storms that temporarily halted his singing career. "My music ministry is just beginning again," explains Mills. "After a series of personal challenges, I put music aside beginning in 2008. My mother was terminally ill and it was just my father and I there to care for her. She passed away in the spring of 2010 and by then music had


become a distant memory. Later in 2010, a dear friend in Maple Ridge, British Columbia, asked me to emcee an evening of Southern Gospel music in the spring of 2011. I readily agreed and ended up meeting David Staton of Song Garden there. He was then with the LeFevre Quartet. He asked me to contact him if I ever decided to do another CD. In May of 2011, both Amanda and I felt the Lord's blessing and favor to go forward with a new project."

David Staton of Song Garden Music Group, who also currently travels with The Palmetto State Quartet, produced Kevin Mills' latest recording, Travelin' Through. Staton says, "Kevin has a voice and approach to his music that connects with people who love gospel and country music. With deep rich tones and musical style similar to artists like Josh Turner, Trace Adkins and Johnny Cash, Kevin is sure to be around for a long time."

Kevin Mills had a very positive experience at Song Garden during the recording of this CD. "We had the best of the best musicians working on it. All the individuals working on the project were very modest, consequently I won't list names of who they work with, but it's safe to say that all of them work intimately with some of

the biggest names in Country and Gospel." Mills continues, "All the songs are very unique. One of my favorites is "Walk on the Water." It's a conversation that the devil is having with God. It's really a modern retelling of Job."

Mills, like many people, may have felt like



Job when he was experiencing deep personal storms. However, he now appears to be on the other side of those challenges and is experiencing a time of God's favor as he and his wife complete their schooling at Regent University. He is a sought-after voice-over artist as well. Kevin and Amanda do all this as well as performing at selected Gospel music concerts throughout the region, bringing a Country music flavor to their Gospel songs.

"Currently I play banjo as my main instrument - people love it and it always brings a smile to everyone's face. Also, Amanda is beginning to sing with me more. Because we've just started again, we averaged about 12 concerts this year. But next year is already beginning to look busy."

The Mills' life sounds like a busy one, just as most people's lives were when Hurricane Sandy threatened the eastern seaboard of North America. Mills says that preparations included the collection of an emergency kit. "We bought lots of beans, Vienna sausages, and bottled water!"

Mills continues, "We've been through one major storm prior to Sandy. The biggest issue is to have non-perishable foods on hand and lots of water. It always pays to prepare, especially if the electricity goes out for extended periods. Buying a generator is definitely a must if a budget allows for it."

The Mills couple wasn't hit as badly as some others in the area. "We're about 20 minutes from the ocean, so the hurricane for us inland wasn't very bad at all," says Mills. "It felt more like a thunderstorm then anything. Our electricity only went out once for about two minutes. Businesses and houses along the coast had flooding and damage, but I think it's safe to say and assume that everyone here felt very, very fortunate that it wasn't any worse." Mills says they went out to see what the damage was like in their area, but it could have been a lot worse. "It was nothing even close to what New England has experienced."

"When we moved here we fully understood that hurricanes were just a part of life," Mills explains. "The biggest thing going for us is that we are far enough away to not be effected by storm-surges. Consequently it's just a matter of being prepared and then riding out the storm. Both Amanda and I feel very safe here and feel very fortunate and blessed to live in such a beautiful area."

In the aftermath of natural disasters, one common question people ask is, 'Why would God allow this to happen?" Mills answers, "The opposite question is just as legitimate: why wouldn't He allow them? Many people asked me why God allowed my mother to pass away from such a horrible illness and at a young age. She was an incredible woman, a good woman. But sometimes it pays to look at it another way. God's wisdom and ways are infinitely higher then ours; the question is really whether I trust His wisdom when He allows bad things to happen, sometimes to good people."

Personal storms affect everyone and each one reacts differently depending on their own personal preparations and past experiences. Kevin Mills says that many people are looking for a response to the unending question of 'why'. "Unfortunately there is no overarching formula that can be applied equally to all of life's storms and struggles," says Mills. "If there were we probably wouldn't need God. God is a relational God and the best thing we can do is take the time to foster that relationship. In North America we have become blindingly busy and for many this has reduced their spiritual life to a series of formulas and actions, i.e. read this devotional, volunteer for this ministry, etc., rather then a relationship."

Kevin and Amanda Mills have survived the personal and physical Hurricane Sandys in their life, and want to bring their message of hope and comfort to others going through life's challenges. "Take time alone with God and foster this relationship equally in good times as in bad," says Kevin. Getting to know the Maker of the wind and rain personally will help each one successfully navigate the storms of life.



Rob: Please give our readers some background about your past in southern gospel.

Patricia: My background in Southern Gospel Music began in May, 1976 when I answered an ad placed in the newspaper for an assistant in a publishing company. I was interviewed by a gentleman by the name of Bobby Howard. Bobby was working in the office for Dr. Jerry Goff at that time and called Jerry after our interview and stated to him that he wanted to hire me for the job. That was on Friday. Dr. Goff was supposed to be back in the office on Monday to make the final decision. I learned during the interview that Dr. Goff was a gospel music singer that owned the singing group, Jerry & The Singing Goffs and also owned Goff Publishing Company. I met Dr. Goff on that Monday and stayed working personally in the office for him for the next 12 years, booking him at churches and concerts, answering mail and mailing out orders, and always helping to further his career in Southern Gospel Music. I guess I have never really stopped working for him in some capacity since 1976. I have always been working or promoting Southern Gospel Music during and since my first day in 1976.

Patricia: My start in television work began when my husband, Jim, was transferred with his company, AT&T, from Nashville, TN to Greenville, SC. I had met Dr. James H. and Mrs. Joanne Thompson in 1977 through working for Dr. Goff. Dr. and Mrs. Thompson owned a television station in Greenville, SC. After they found out that I was moving to



their city, Mrs. Thompson called me and asked me to work for them since we were being transferred there. I worked for the Thompsons at WGGS TV 16 for the next 1½ years. Then my husband learned that he was being transferred to Atlanta, GA. After being in Atlanta for 12 years working for a society of engineers, Mrs. Thompson called me and stated that they were starting a television station in Atlanta and wanted me to help them with this station. That was 16 years ago. Today, after the passing of Dr. & Mrs. Thompson, at their previous request, I am now the Vice President of Community Television, Inc.

Rob: Tell us about the ministry of Channel 57

Rob: How did you get your start in TV?

Patricia: Community Television, Inc. (WATC TV57) is a faith-based 501©3 non-profit organization whose purpose is to produce and broadcast positive television programming for all ages to educate and inspire. As a Christian organization, WATC upholds the principles established by the Word of God. WATC's vision extends beyond broadcasting and includes reaching out to help those in need of food and clothing through its First Works outreach (Mark 16:15).

Rob: Which do you enjoy more- in front of the camera or behind the camera and why?

Patricia: I enjoy both working in front and behind the camera. Working in the office and making decisions that will help make the station prosper in order to help others is rewarding. To be given the opportunity to become a producer and host of a television program was a reward that came a few years later after starting work at the station. Interviewing and presenting senior citizen guests on my show, "Seniors Today," that are continuing to make a difference in society in their later years is a special opportunity that is greatly rewarding. Seniors are a blessing for our younger audience, as well as our elderly, to see how God is helping them to continue to be productive citizens.

Rob: What would you say is the Highlight of your career?

Patricia: The highlight of my career is the opportunity to be able to continue to present the Gospel of Jesus Christ to a wide variety of audience through word and song at WATC. This is accomplished by having great programs that presents the gospel in word and by having great singing programs, such as Southern Gospel Music.

Rob: Can you share a funny story about something that has happened on the set?

Patricia: No funny story that happened on the set comes to mind right now. We interviewed a 104 year old man. He was pretty funny and his reason for staying alive for so long was to go somewhere every day. One day a week he went bowling. He had a driver that drove him anywhere

he wanted to go and that made him happy.

Rob: For young people reading this, what advice would you give them about getting into broadcasting?

Patricia: Advice that I would give young people that want to get into broadcasting is that technology is changing almost daily. They need to learn all areas of television production, such as computers, camera work, lighting, makeup in the age of HD, social media, video streaming, as well as learning to be the "on air" personality. You are no longer a television producer but a content provider.

Rob: As we come to the close of 2012, what are your goals for 2013?

Patricia: My biggest goal for 2013 is to transition our station to high definition (HD), which will make our productions and programming even better and be competitive in the digital age of television.

Rob: What is your motivation to keep pressing forward?

Patricia: My motivation to keep pressing forward is my belief that God is taking me in many directions that helps me to be able to show that everyone needs Him in their lives. Every time I think I cannot do any more, He always shows me in His own wonderful way that I need to continue with what I am doing and that is to present the Gospel in Song, as well as Word, through great programming at WATC.

Rob: What has the Lord been teaching you lately?

Patricia: The Lord has been teaching me lately the importance of Christian television and how much it is needed. We offer prayer at the station, as well as good programming, and it is a blessing to be a part of something that changes people's lives. I look forward to seeing how God will open new doors for spreading the Gospel through Christian television.

cal career at a very young age as well. In fact her mom says she used to hum herself to sleep before she could speak.



SANDI'S ZESTY CHEESE STRAWS

1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, at room temperature

2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese, at room

temperature

1 1/2 cups cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (more or less, according to your taste preference).

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F.

In a food processor, add the butter, cheese, flour, salt and cayenne.

Process until a smooth dough is formed. Scoop it into your cookie press, fitted with a flat ridged tip. Pipe the dough in 2-inch strips onto a lightly greased cookie sheet.

(Alternatively, refrigerate the dough for 30 minutes and roll on a lightly floured surface into a 1/4 inch rectangle. Cut into smaller rectangles, about 2 by 3- inches, with a pizza wheel or sharp knife.) Bake for 10 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to racks to cool.

and we've been doing it ever since.

The most popular dish of these Christmas gettogethers has been Christina's Chili Mexico. It's easy and quick to make and after one taste, you'll see why the Eleton family loves it. Christina's dish had become popular at Christmas-time; she was getting recipe requests and questions about what she called it. Up until that point, she didn't have a name for it. I kept encouraging her to give it a name. Neither she or I had any original ideas that we liked, so I turned to my little girl for wisdom. I asked, "Chanler, what would you call Mommy's dish that we love?"

Without hesitation, Chanler replies in her cute little five-year-old voice, "Chili Mexico".

We smiled...it stuck...and that's what we've called it ever since.

ELETON'S CHILI MEXICO

2 - 8 oz. packets cream cheese

1 1/2 cups salsa

2 cups chili

2 cups shredded cheese

In a baking dish, spread out cream cheese first. Next, comes the layer of salsa, spread evenly. The third layer will be 1 cup of the shredded cheese. Now, pour in all of chili and spread evenly. Lastly, top it with remaining cup of shredded cheese - spread evenly of course.

Bake at 350 F for 30 minutes. Enjoy with your choice of nacho chips!

You can prep this the day before – don't cook, cover with foil and refrigerate. Then cook regular time the next day. This makes it even better, I think.

TAMMY'S CHRISTMAS LASAGNA

2 lb lean ground beef

1 lg onion (finely chopped) (optional)

2 (32 oz.) Prego or Ragu Spaghetti sauce (traditional)

1 – 2 (32 oz) jars water

1 pkg dry spaghetti mix

¼ cup sugar

1 box cream cheese

¾ cup milk

1 box lasagna noodles

1 lb. shredded cheddar cheese

1 lb. shredded mozzarella cheese

Saute' ground beef. Drain meat in colander, then rinse with water. Place meat back in pot and add onions (optional), spaghetti sauce, 32 oz water, dry spaghetti mix and sugar. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer 1 hour. Add rest of water and cook another hour.

In a separate bowl, mix cream cheese and milk. Microwave until blended 2-3 min., stopping to whisk every minute. Spray 9 X 13 baking dish with non-stick baking spray. Spoon in a few spoonfuls of sauce just to lightly cover the bottom of dish. Layer UNCOOKED noodles on bottom, covering pan. Cover with ½ of cooked spaghetti sauce, then drizzle a layer of ½ cream cheese mixture. Take fork and zig-zag mixture (marble in). Add layer of 8 oz cheddar cheese and 8 oz mozzarella cheese. REPEAT layers one more time. (I usually use a little more cheese) Cover with aluminum foil and bake at 350 degrees – 45 minutes. (This keeps cheese from turning to brown.) Remove foil and continue baking another 15 minutes or until golden brown.

As long as I can remember everybody loves mother's dressing. She has cooked it for their church Thanksgiving Dinner for over 45 years every year. You will return for a second helping!

SONJA'S CORNBREAD DRESSING

1 hen boiled

1 bunch of celery

1 large onion

1/2 stick butter

1 can cream of chicken soup

6 eggs boiled and peeled

3 raw eggs

2 tsp. poultry seasoning

1/2 tsp. black pepper

1 cup canned milk

4 Corn Kits Yellow Cornbread packages. Follow directions on package. Bake.

6 slices white unbleached bread, take off the edges Wash hen and remove parts inside hen. In a large pot add hen and water to cover the hen. The water should be well over the hen. Boil until tender, 2 hrs. or so Remove hen from pot to cool then remove bones from hen.

Using the broth in pot add poultry seasoning and stir, let set. Clean celery and onion chop into bite pieces add to 1/2 stick butter cover and cook over low heat until tender. In broth add 1 can chicken soup, white bread pieces, raw eggs mixed well, peel and chopped boiled eggs, can milk, celery and onions. Mix well then crumble cornbread into broth until thick stirring very well, add salt and pepper to taste. No liquid should be remaining on top. After you have de boned the hen place pieces of hen in a large baking pan pour the dressing over the hen. Bake at 325 until done light brown. The center will be set when a toothpick comes out clean. This uncooked mixture keeps and can be made the day before keep refrigerated. This recipe will feed 30. You can use this basic dressing recipe when cooking a turkey, or duck. Taste good with a ham also.

MICHAEL'S LATKES (6 servings) 1 medium onion, grated 3 large yukon gold potatoes, grated Kosher salt

6 finely chopped chives
3 T. plain matzo meal or breadcrumbs
2 large eggs, slightly beaten
Fresh pepper to taste
Oil for frying

Applesauce or sour cream

Combine first seven ingredients in bowl and gently mix. Pour enough oil in skillet to reach 1/4" depth; heat over medium-high heat. Form mixture into balls using about 1/4 cup for each. Place each ball into the hot oil, using a spatula to flatten into 3-4" round cakes. Fry, turning once, until golden brown and crisp (about 8 minutes). Transfer cakes to a paper towel lined plate to drain. Serve hot with applesauce or sour cream.

STEPHANIE'S TRADITIONAL SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

2 1/2 pounds sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes

3/4 cup packed Splenda brown sugar 1/4 cup light butter, softened

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup finely chopped pecans, divided

Cooking spray

Preheat oven to 375°.

Place the sweet potatoes in a Dutch oven, and cover with cold water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, and simmer for 15 minutes or until very tender. Drain; cool slightly.

Place potatoes in a large bowl. Add sugar and next 3 ingredients (through vanilla). Mash sweet potato mixture with a potato masher. Fold in 1/4 cup pecans. Scrape potato mixture into an even layer in an 11 x 7-inch baking dish coated with cooking spray. Sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup pecans; Bake at 375° for 25 minutes or until brown.

RANDY'S BAKED MACARONI AND CHEESE

1/2lb shredded cheddar cheese 1/2lb shredded colby cheese 1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese

2 cups

6 eggs

2 Tbsp butter

2 cups elbow macaroni

In large sauce pan, full with 2 quarts water. Add a splash of vegetable, canola, or olive oil. Bring to a boil. Add macaroni noodles, stirring occasionally to prevent noodles from sticking together. While noodles are boiling, in a large mixing bowl, combine cheeses, eggs, and milk and stir thoroughly. Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

When noodles are done cooking, drain and rinse with HOT water and drain off excess water. Add noodles to cheese mixture and mix well. Pour entire mixture into greased 9x12 glass baking dish. Place in oven and bake 30 - 45 minutes, until sides and to are turning golden. Remove from oven and let cool for a few minutes before serving.

Feeds a small army!

TIP for leftovers: Cut remaining mac & cheese into portion-size squares, wrap in wax paper, and freeze. To reheat a serving, remove wax paper while frozen, place in a microwave safe bowl and microwave for 1 minute, 30 seconds. Stir it up to loosen and microwave for another 60 seconds. Let cool for 2

minutes and enjoy!

1 tablespoon chopped garlic

2½ cups sugar

Pulse the cranberries in a food processor until coarsely chopped. Be careful not to over process because you don't want the berries pureed.

Add all the ingredients, except the cilantro, to a medium pot with a heavy bottom. Simmer, uncovered, for about 20 minutes, until thickened. Mix in the cilantro. Cool before serving.

4 cups icing sugar

½ cup cocoa

½ cup soft butter (not melted)

¼ cup milk

Other:

Foil for lining your cookie sheet

Sugared jelly candy (or fruit roll-ups) in red and green Cut foil 2 inches longer than cookie sheet. Fit on sheet and turn up ends and sides to make a collar around the pan. Pre-heat oven to 375F.

Beat eggs until thick. Add white sugar and beat again. Add water and vanilla and beat slowly. Put flour, baking powder and salt in a separate bowl and mix lightly with a fork. Add this to the egg mixture. Beat slowly until the batter is fairly smooth. Pour onto foil and spread evenly into the corners. Bake 12 minutes. While baking, spread a tea towel onto your counter and sprinkle with a few teaspoons of icing sugar the full size of the cookie pan. As soon as you remove cake from oven, lay cake upside down onto the towel and peel off the foil. Trim off any brown edges from the cake. While cake is still hot, roll up – with towel – and cool.

Make icing. Unroll cool cake and ice with half the icing spread onto the cake. Roll cake up. Cut off about a ½ inch of the roll from each end to use as 'stumps'. Place stumps on opposite sides of the roll, on either end. Spread remaining icing on the log and stumps. Use a fork to make icing look like bark. Make holly leaves and holly berries from the candy. For the holly leaves: If using the jellied candy, make sure it is sugar-coated (this is softer than a jujube). Spread some white sugar onto your pie sheet and use a rolling pin to roll the candy flat. Use additional sugar on surface to prevent it from sticking to the rolling pin. Once the green candy is flat, use a cookie cutter or a knife to cut into the shape of holly leaves. Use red candy, cut into smaller pieces and, using extra sugar to prevent stickiness, roll into red holly berries. Press 3 leaves lightly onto the top of the log near a stump and add the berries. You make also use fruit roll ups to make the holly leaves if this is easier for you. Holly berries could also be 'made' out of M&M s or other small round candy.

6 tablespoons of sugar

1/2 cup of flour

Preheat your oven to 375 degrees. Melt the chocolate

and butter and cool for 10 minutes. In a separate bowl, mix four eggs with sugar. Whisk. Then add flour and whisk. Add the remaining three eggs and add the egg mixture to the chocolate mixture. Pour this entire mixture into individual ramekins. Bake until just done, about 15-20 minutes (interior will be melting). Serve with vanilla ice cream.

BRENDA'S HUNGARIAN WEDDING COOKIES

5 cups flour

1 cup sugar

1 lb. butter sticks, softened

4 egg yolks (reserve egg whites for later use)

1 pound finely ground walnuts

Misc. jelly flavors

Powdered sugar

Mix flour, sugar, butter and egg yolks in large bowl with hands until well mixed.

Take a small amount of dough and roll out very thin on floured counter.

Using a small juice glass, cut circles out of dough that are about 2" wide.

Do this until you have one cookie sheet full of round cookies. Then cut out an equal number of circles, but with these, also use a thimble to cut out a circle in the center of each cookie. Brush the tops with egg whites and dip in the ground nuts.

Please on baking sheet. Bake each sheet at 350 until light brown (about 10 minutes)...

remove from cookie sheet onto cooling rack and let cool completely. Repeat this until

all the dough is used. Makes about 60 or 70 2-layer cookies. On each bottom layer,

place a small amount of jelly, then top with the cookie with the hole so that the jelly comes through. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve.

2/3 c. mashed pumpkin (Can use butternut squash that has been cooked in a microwave for 10 minutes.)

3/4 all purpose flour (plain, not self rising)

2 tsp. Cinnamon

1 tsp. Baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. Ginger

1 tsp. Nutmeg

1 1/4 cup confectioner's sugar

18 oz. Pkg. softened cream cheese

1/2 tsp. vanilla

Beat eggs 5 minutes at high speed. Gradually add sugar, beat well. Stir in pumpkin or squash and lemon juice. Combine flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt, ginger and nutmeg. Add to pumpkin; blend well. Spoon batter on greased and floured 15x10x1 pan or use cookie sheet. (Can use parchment paper, and you don't have to grease or flour.) Spread evenly to corners. Bake @375 degrees for 15 minutes.

Turn cake on to towel. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup of confectioner's sugar. Begin at small end and roll into towel and cool for several hours. Cream the cream cheese, butter, 1 cup confectioner's sugar, and vanilla. Beat until smooth and creamy. Unroll cake and spread with filling. Roll again and chill on edge.

RHONDA'S CHOCOLATE CRINKLE GINGER COOKIES

34 cup all-purpose flour

1/4 cup Dutch-process cocoa powder

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

1 ½ teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter at room temperature

7 ½ oz. Semi-sweet chocolate

1 cup granulated sugar

¼ cup packed dark brown sugar

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

¼ cup finely chopped crystallized ginger

Confectioners' sugar for rolling

Whisk together the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, salt, ginger, and cinnamon in a medium bowl.

Combine the butter and 3 ounces of the chocolate in a medium, heatproof bowl. Set the bowl over a saucepan filled with about 11/2 inches of simmering water (being sure not to let the bottom of the bowl touch the water) and stir occasionally until the chocolate and butter have melted and the mixture is smooth. Remove the bowl from the saucepan and set aside to cool slightly, about 10 minutes. (You can also melt the mixture in the microwave, heating it at about 20-second intervals and stirring periodically until it is melted and smooth.)

Stir the granulated and brown sugars into the melted chocolate mixture, using a wooden spoon or heatproof spatula. Drop in the eggs, one at a time, mixing briskly until smooth. Stir in the vanilla extract and gradually incorporate the flour mixture. Fold in the remaining 41/2 ounces of chocolate and the crystallized ginger. Cover the dough with plastic wrap and set in the refrigerator to chill for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Position a rack in the middle of the oven and preheat the oven to 350°F. Line baking sheets with parchment paper.

Shape the chilled dough into walnut-size balls, roll in confectioners' sugar, and arrange them about 2 inches apart on the prepared baking sheets. (If your kitchen is quite warm and the dough becomes too soft, return it to the refrigerator until chilled and fairly firm.) Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, or until the cookies have spread and the tops are cracked.

Cool the cookies on the baking sheets set on wire racks for about 2 minutes before removing them to the racks to cool completely. Store the cookies in an airtight container or in a zip-top

bag for up to 4 days. Makes 40 cookies.

Last year, I went to North Carolina to stay with our grandkids for a week while my daughter was recuperating from surgery. When I got there, she had all the ingredients to make banana bread. I made 21 loaves and put them in her freezer. Today, I make the loaves for the people who lovingly take care of my 100 year old mother, for my Gloryland Gospel Choir members and for the guys who pick up our trash every week and they look forward to their gift every year!. Here is the recipe:

BANANA BREAD

1/2 c. shortening

1 tsp. soda

1 c. sugar

3 large crushed bananas (very ripe)

2 eggs (unbeaten)

1/2 cup pecans or walnuts

2 c. flour

Blend sugar and shortening. Add eggs and mix well. Add soda to bananas and crush. Add flour and bananas all at once. Mix well and then add nuts. Spoon into loaf pan and bake 1 hour at 325 degrees. Note: I double and triple the recipe when making large amounts.

Cheesecake:

3 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened

1 cup white sugar

3 eggs

8 (1 ounce) squares semisweet chocolate

2 tablespoons whipping cream

1 cup sour cream

1/4 teaspoon salt

4 teaspoons instant coffee granules dissolved in 1/4 cup hot water

3 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Butter one 9 or 10 inch spring form pan.

Combine the wafer/cracker crumbs, softened butter, 2 tablespoons white sugar, and the cocoa. Mix well and press mixture into the buttered spring form pan. Cook crust for five minutes and then take out and set aside to cool while you finish mixing the cheesecake. In a medium sized bowl beat the softened cream cheese until smooth. Gradually add 1 cup white sugar mixing until well blended. Add eggs, one at a time. Beat at low speed until very smooth.

Melt the 8 ounces semisweet chocolate with 2 tablespoons whipping cream in a pan or bowl set over boiling water, stir until smooth. Add chocolate mixture to cream cheese mixture and blend well. Stir in sour cream, salt, coffee, and vanilla; beat until smooth. Pour mixture into prepared pan. Bake in the center of oven at 350 degrees F for 45 minutes. Center will be soft but will firm up when chilled. Do not over bake. Leave cake in oven with

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 ¼ cups all-purpose flour

1 ½ tsp baking powder

¼ tsp salt

½ cup milk

Preheat oven to 350F with a rack in the center. Rub the bottom and sides of an 8'' round cake pan with 2tbsp of butter. In a small bowl, whisk together $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar with the cinnamon and allspice. Sprinkle the mixture evenly over the bottom of the pan; arrange the cranberries in a single layer on top.

With electric mixer, cream remaining 6 tbsp butter and ½ cup sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla; beat until well combined. In another bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder and salt. With

mixer on low speed, add flour mixture to butter mixture in three batches, alternating with milk until well combined. Spoon batter over the cranberries in the pan and smooth the top. Place the pan on a baking sheet; bake the cake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes. Let cool on a wire rack for 20 minutes. Run a knife around the edge of the cake; invert onto a rimmed platter.

Melt 1 cup of butter with 1 cup of brown sugar together in the microwave until syrup like. Pour the syrup over the crackers, coating well.


Bake in a pre-heated oven 375 for 10 minutes. While this is baking, melt 400 grams of Jersey Milk or Hershey chocolate bars in a double boiler. When 10 minutes is done, remove the tray from the oven. Spread the chocolate over the crackers, carefully, coating well.

Freeze for at least an hour, more if you can. Tear off the foil and break into pieces.

Store pieces in an airtight container in fridge. Note: when I put the tray in my freezer, I make sure to set it on a tea towel so it isn't touching anything else in the freezer as it could melt a plastic bag, etc. Special thanks to Kathy Woodward who submitted a recipe we'd already received. Obviously, Oreo Balls are really good!
